Green Lake County Libraries Report for November 2017

Berlin - November brings many programs to the Berlin Public Library. We are proud to be collaborating with the Berlin Senior Center to host local author and historian, Jerry Apps, on November 16 at 1pm. He will be coming to the Senior Center to do a presentation directly following the Senior Center's holiday dinner.

The Children's Librarian has arranged for a program called Raptor Rescue to come to the library. Patricia Fisher does programming on birds of prey and several of the families in Berlin are looking forward to learning about them on November 11.

The Friends of the Library group has also been hard at work helping us raise money for the Children's Department update, and just purchased the library area rugs. During Berlin's Holiday Parade on Thursday, November 16, the Friends will be having a Bake Sale to correlate with the library's Open House. The Friends have also planned a "Paint Night" on November 18 to help raise more funds.

We are also looking to collaborate with the Green Lake Animal Shelter closer to the holidays to help get donations for them and have a potential pet meet-and-greet at the library. It's just a matter of time before we put up our annual large Christmas tree and set up our Angel Tree in the Library!

Green Lake – It may look like we're in a hundred year time warp this month with all our focus on World War One, but I promise there are 21st century things happening at the library, too. We're getting new books and movies every week, planning the 2018 summer reading program, and enjoying the return of our R.E.A.D. therapy dog, Tia.

We do have a lot of WWI centenary events this month – three more films, a display from the Wisconsin Veterans Museum, and six programs by folks from around the state. Too many things to go into detail here – I invite you to visit our library events calendar at www.greenlakelibrary.org

Our library knitting group is responsible for the very colorful display we have in the meeting room. The knitters have been working hard all year creating cozy hats and mittens for this year's Angel Tree recipients. We will host an artists reception on Saturday, November 11 from 10:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Then there are the continuing programs – Reading with Tia, the Constant Reader Book Club, Family History Fridays, and more. Details on all of these are available online. And before you know it holiday season will be upon us. The library will be closed on Thanksgiving Day, but open again as usual the day after and right up to Christmas Eve. Watch for special Christmas events on Saturday, December 2 and Thursday, December 14. More about those in next month's missive.

Kingston – Our "What's in Your Basket?" silent auction runs from Nov. 6th to the 18th. As of this writing we have a little over 30 baskets and I'm sure a few more will come in before the auction begins. Our Loosely Bound book club is working on titles for their 2018 reading list and will vote on them at their December meeting. The story hour children are embracing the Thanksgiving spirit. For the next month they will be working on projects to be handed out to the

seniors in our community when the Lioness Club hands out their winter baskets. The kids are very excited to be a part of this giving program. We've also been busy trying to keep Battle of the Books titles available for the older school children who will be in the battles starting in January. The statewide Battle of the Books program is designed to promote a love of reading among students. It encourages students to read a variety of books and remember information about the plots, characters, and settings of the books. Every question asked in a battle is answered by the title and author of the book and takes the form of: Name the book in which a horse and a boy are stranded on an island. It is a fun, academic-based competition that has been very successful in school districts throughout the state in encouraging students to read. Not all schools participate in this but Markesan District Schools do, so we try to keep a set of each years books available at all times. Also on Thursday, Nov. 9th from 1:00 to 3:30 pm the Green Lake County Elder Benefit Specialists will be at our library to help folks apply for energy assistance and also get help with their annual Medicare enrollment.

Markesan – The Markesan Public Library is about to start our series of holiday make and take workshops: "One for you, one for me" is a night of sewing fleece hats. One hat will be going to the local Gift Anonymous and one will be to keep. Other classes will be decorating a miniature Christmas tree, painting cardinals in a tree, a painted board, fancy cards, and homemade cards. Our book discussion is reading Mischling by Affinity Konar. This book is well written and the topic is both powerful and difficult. I expect there will be lots of discussion about it. The library is researching various building maintenance projects. We will also have a booth and be helping with the games and reading corner at the chamber's Homespun Holiday on Nov. 17 and 18 at Markesan Elementary School.

Princeton – Last weekend, the fundraising committee hosted the very successful program, a Night with President Lincoln. If you attended or sold tickets to this event, thank you. The financial committee never rests though and is currently asking for donations in the months of November and December to help with a \$5,000 Holiday Matching Gift from an anonymous family. All donations made from now until the end of the year are doubled. This includes the \$640 the library just received from American Family Insurance from their gift giving in the month of October. All in all the Library Expansion Project is currently at \$475,000 of its \$790,000

The Friends of the Princeton Library are getting ready for their Holiday Sale, running from Friday November 24 to December 9. The sale concludes with the Friends' Cookie Walk on the 9th.

The library will be joining in on some Christmas in Princeton celebrations as well. In addition to walking in the Christmas Parade on November 24, the library will be hosting kids' holiday crafts and a family matinee movie. On November 18, the library will be collaborating with the Health Unit arm of Green Lake County and will be presenting a Diabetes Prevention Workshop. We are hoping to help our patronage get a better handle in this disease affecting more and more Americans. Katie Gellings Green Lake County Family Living Educator October 2017

This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the Family Living Program in October of 2017. During the reporting period, the educator made 97 direct educational and professional contacts.

Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

Green Lake County Correctional Facility Financial Literacy Workshop, Green Lake

I taught three financial literacy workshops at the Green Lake County Correctional Facility for the female population. The topics were Rent Smart, banking basics, and credit and debt. The sessions were each held weekly for one hour. The following is based on the evaluation data I collected from the three workshops:

Money As You Grow – Boys & Girls Club of the Tri-County Area, Berlin

I taught a Money As You Grow program for thirteen children at the Boys & Girls Club of the Tri-County Area in Berlin. I read the story, *A Chair for My Mother*, and the children decorated a piggy bank for saving. The key concepts in the story focused on setting goals, earning, saving, and follow-through. We talked about what a goal is, how you make a plan to reach a goal, and how you follow the plan until you succeed. We also discussed how people can earn money and where we can keep the money we earn to save it.

Networking within UW Extension and Professional Development Opportunities

I made 194 contacts within the UW Extension system during the month of October. I continue to have a number of professional meetings scheduled with colleagues and mentors to continue to network and learn from my fellow Extension educators.

Rank Change from Instructor to Assistant Professor

On October 6, I met with the Standards Rank and Promotions (SRP) Committee in Stevens Point for review of my abbreviated portfolio for rank change from Instructor to Assistant Professor. My rank change was approved on a 5-0 vote, and takes effect immediately.

National Epsilon Sigma Phi (ESP) Conference, Wilmington, NC

As the WI Alpha Sigma Chapter President I attended the National ESP Conference in Wilmington, NC, in mid-October. I attended several great breakout sessions including "Reaching out to Latinos with Extension Programs: Lessons Learned in Cache County," "The Impact of Learn Grow Eat and Go! Curriculum on At-Risk Minority Students," and "Building Resilience in the Face of Adversity." I also accepted the Distinguished Team Award for the National ESP North Central Region. This award was for the Money As You Grow project with the Dollars During Development workgroup. Overall, it was a wonderful conference for networking and learning from other Extension professionals.



WI Summit on Financial Literacy, Green Bay

I attending a one-day conference on financial literacy sponsored by Economics Wisconsin. I learned that only 64% of high schools require students to take a personal finance class in WI. I attended the following breakout sessions: "Engaging Children In Economics & Financial Literacy," "Banking Resources For The Classroom and Beyond," and "Preparing Students For Life After High School". I was able to gain knowledge and resources that I can use in my financial management programming in Green Lake County.
