#### **MINUTES**

<u>CORRESPONDENCE</u> – Deputy Clerk Otto informed the committee that a letter was received from Aegis Corporation stating that the County will be receiving \$16,572.80 in a dividend check for the Workers Compensation Audit Adjustment. There was also a Public Hearing Notice from the Green Lake County Drainage Board for the purpose of hearing and considering assessments. The calculated assessment for Green Lake County is \$3.83 which is the same as last year.

#### GREEN LAKE MULTI USE TRAIL

Lauree Renaud, Green Lake Greenways volunteer, stated that the pre-engineering funds that have been collected are now exhausted and additional dollars will be needed to continue with the project. Renaud requested that someone from the P&I committee attend the next DOT meeting to provide verbal support for the project.

#### REVIEW BIDS FOR ROOFS OF FAIR BUILDINGS

Maintenance Supervisor Scott Weir stated that 3 building roofs at the fairgrounds are in need of repair. Options include painting, rubberizing, or accepting a bid previously submitted by Custofoam Corporation which provides Karnack coatings. Weir stated this would be the best option and they provide a 5 year warranty. Discussion held on various options and funding sources for the project. *Motion/second (Starshak/Trochinski)* to approve the bid of \$41,500 pending approval from the Finance Committee and appropriating funds to cover the costs. Motion carried.

#### JEFFERSON COUNTY SMOKE FREE AIR ACT (Ordinance No. 2003-06)

#### 1. INTRODUCTION.

- (a) This ordinance shall be known as the "Jefferson County Smoke Free Air Act." [am. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]
- (b) The smoking of tobacco products and other substances indoors causes recognized adverse health effects on not only the individuals smoking but also on others. Smoking indoors or near public entrances adversely affects among other things, health, safety, comfort, employee production and building maintenance expenses. [am. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]
- (c) While it is difficult to quantify exactly, smoking indoors also drives up publicly funded expenses in terms of increased health insurance premiums, increased sick leave use, increased building maintenance and decreased employee productivity. In addition, there is a public interest of taxpayers in an investment in county employees by paying their health insurance, and a need to maintain employee health to keep county costs from rising.

#### 2. PURPOSE, AUTHORITY AND INTENT.

(a) Reports from the Surgeon General, the Environmental Protection Agency and others show that smoking contributes to health problems of county employees and members of the public both directly through deliberate use of smoking materials and indirectly through exposure to second hand smoke. This ordinance is enacted to protect the health and comfort of the public and county employees through the regulation of smoking, according to the authority granted this County by Sec. 101.123 (2)(c), Stats. (The Wisconsin Clean Indoor Act) and Chapter 59, Statutes. [am. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]

#### 3. DEFINITION.

- (a) "Smoking" shall mean inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, or any other lighted or heated tobacco or plant product intended for inhalation, including hookahs and marijuana, whether natural or synthetic, in any manner or in any form. "Smoking" shall include the use of an electronic delivery device which creates an aerosol or vapor, in any manner or in any form, or the use of any oral smoking device for the purpose of circumventing the prohibition of smoking.
- (b) "E-Cigarette or Electronic Delivery Device" shall mean any product containing or delivering nicotine or any other substance intended for human consumption that may be used by a person to simulate smoking through inhalation of vapor or aerosol from the product. "Electronic Delivery Device" shall include any such device, whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an ecigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, e-hookah, or vape pen, or under any other product name or descriptor. [am. 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10; 06-09-2015, Ord. No. 2015-06]

#### 4. REGULATION OF SMOKING.

(a) No person may smoke indoors at any time in any county-owned, rented or leased building, including the Fair Park grandstand. [am. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]

- (b) No person may smoke within thirty (30) feet of a public entrance to any county-owned, rented or leased building. At the Fair Park, this subsection shall only apply to the front door of the Activity Center. [cr. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]
- (c) No person may smoke at any time inside of any county-owned, rented or leased vehicle. [renumbered 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]
- (d) No person may smoke on county property outside a designated smoking area if such property has notice posted of this regulation and designated smoking areas. Designated smoking areas for the Courthouse shall be adjacent to emergency exits at entrances 2 and 4. [cr. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]
- (1) The County Administrator or department head in charge of specific county property may designate smoking areas on such property. [cr. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]
- (2) Smoking shall not be allowed in park shelters or bathrooms, maintenance buildings or the Dog Park. [cr. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]
- (e) Department heads in all county-owned, rented, or leased buildings shall enforce a "No Smoking" policy consistent with Sec. 101.123, Stats. and this ordinance. (The Wisconsin Clean Indoor Air Act). [renumbered 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]
- (f) In the event of conflict between the provisions of this ordinance and Section 101.123, Stats., the more restrictive regulation shall apply. [renumbered 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]

#### 5. EXEMPTION FROM SMOKING PROHIBITION.

- (a) The following activities, facilities and vehicles are exempt from the prohibition of this ordinance:
- (1) With the consent of the Sheriff, and under supervision of a county detective, individuals under interrogation are permitted to smoke in designated interrogation rooms within the Sheriff's Department.
- (2) Vehicles owned, rented or leased for use by the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department. [renumbered 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10; renumbered 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]
- (3) In the presence of a bailiff, jurors may smoke in the area immediately adjacent to courthouse entrance 13. [created 01-08-08, Ord. 2007-32; renumbered 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]

#### 6. INCORPORATED STATUTORY PROVISIONS.

This ordinance shall incorporate the provisions of section 101.123, Wisconsin Statutes, as amended by 2009 Act 12, effective July 5, 2010. Any act required or prohibited by said statutory section shall be required or prohibited by this ordinance. [created 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]

#### 7. PENALTY. [renumbered 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]

- (a) Any person found guilty of violating this ordinance or any part of this ordinance, shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than \$100 nor more than \$250, together with the costs of prosecution, and in willful default of payment of such forfeiture and costs of prosecution, may be imprisoned in the County Jail as ordered by the Court, except as set forth below: [am. 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]
- 1. Any person who willfully violates incorporated 101.123(2)(ar), Wis. Stats., after being advised by an employee of the facility that smoking in the area is prohibited shall forfeit not more than \$50. [created 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]
- 2. Except as provided in incorporated paragraphs 101.123(dm) or (em), any person in charge who violates incorporated 101.123(2m)(b) to (d) shall be subject to a forfeiture of \$100 for each violation. [am. 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]
- (dm) For violations subject to the forfeiture under par. 7(a)(2), if the person in charge has not previously received a warning notice for a violation of incorporated 101.123(2m)(b) to (d), the law enforcement officer shall issue the person in charge a warning notice and may not issue a citation. [cr. 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]
- (em) No person in charge may be required under par. 7(a)(2) to forfeit more than \$100 in total for all violations of incorporated 101.123(2m)(b) to (d) occurring on a single day. [cr. 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]
- (b) Any person, firm, or corporation violating any of the subsections of this ordinance may stipulate to guilt or no contest and may pay to the Clerk of Court a bond according to a schedule established by ordinance. Such stipulation will make it unnecessary for the subject charged to appear in court, and will act as a basis for the court to enter judgment and order forfeiture of the bond.
- (c) Schedule of Deposits. Deposits shall be made in cash, money orders, or certified check to the Clerk of Jefferson County Circuit Court who shall provide a receipt therefore. The amount of the bond is hereby affixed at \$100 plus applicable statutory surcharges and assessments except for violations of incorporated 101.123(2)(ar), where the bond shall be \$50 plus applicable statutory surcharges and assessments. [am. 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]
- (d) Adoption of this ordinance does not preclude the County Board from adopting any other ordinance or providing for the enforcement of any other law or ordinance relating to the same or other matter. Issuance of a citation hereunder shall not preclude the County or any authorized officer from proceeding under any other ordinance or law by any other enforcement method to enforce any ordinance, regulation or order.
  - 8. NOTIFICATION TO PUBLIC. [renumbered 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]

- (a) The person in charge of each county building or his or her designee shall cause to be posted at the entryway of each county building, signs notifying the public of the fact that the building is a smoke-free building. Absence of such sign, however, shall not be a defense to the violation of this ordinance. [am. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]
- (b) The person in charge of each county building or his or her designee shall cause to be posted signs notifying the public of the prohibition against smoking within thirty (30) feet of a public entrance. [cr. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]
- (c) The person in charge of each county building or his or her designee shall cause to be posted on the property around such building notices limiting smoking to designated areas, if the department head or County Administrator has established designated smoking areas applicable to the grounds of that specific building. [cr. 09-11-07, Ord. 2007-10]

#### 8. ENFORCEMENT. [renumbered 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]

- (a) All Jefferson County law enforcement officials of the Jefferson County Sheriff's Dept. are hereby authorized in the name of the County of Jefferson to issue citations for prosecution for violations occurring under this chapter. In addition, such officials may delegate this authority to department heads and/or persons in charge of any county building.
- (b) Prosecutions under this chapter shall be made by the issuance of citations and the procedure to be followed shall be governed by Wisconsin Statutes Section 66.0113. The District Attorney shall, upon receipt of a complaint from the Sheriff's Department or other authorized individuals as allowed, institute appropriate legal proceedings against the alleged offender.

#### 9. EMPLOYEE DISCIPLINE. [renumbered 06-08-10, Ord. 2010-10]

- (a) In addition to or in lieu of enforcement of this ordinance by forfeiture, violations of this section by county employees and officers may be punished by appropriate discipline as a violation of a reasonable work rule as determined by the supervisor of the employee and/or the County Administrator.
- Section 2. Effective Date: This ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as required by law.

#### 23.03 ELECTION PRACTICES PROHIBITED.

Electioneering Prohibited. It shall be unlawful during voting hours on any public property on the day of any election within a radius of one hundred (100) feet of any entrance to any building containing any polling place within the City of Madison, for any person to engage in any electioneering or to distribute, place or cause to be distributed any written or printed matter, or to maintain, present or display any visible or audible announcement or advertisement in any form whatsoever, which is intended or tends to influence, directly or indirectly, the vote for or against any candidate or referendum question. This subsection does not apply to the placement of any material on the bumper of a motor vehicle that is located on such property on election day. (Am. by Ord. 10,920, 5-27-94)

Reserved for Future Use. (R. by Ord. 10,920, 5-27-94) (2)

Loud Speakers Prohibited. It shall be unlawful during voting hours on the day of any election for (3) any person to use or operate or cause to be used or operated any device, apparatus or instrument for the amplification of the human voice or any sound or noise, which amplification is directed to the general public and which is intended or tends to influence, directly or indirectly, the vote for or against any candidate or referendum question.

Any person convicted of violating this section shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than fifty (4)dollars (\$50) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200).

#### DISTRIBUTION OF COMMERCIAL HANDBILLS AND ADVERTISING MATTER 23.04 PROHIBITED.

- It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to distribute or to cause or permit to be (1)distributed in any public street or park thereof in the City of Madison any commercial handbills, samples, or advertising matter of any kind.
- It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation, except the owner, to place or cause to be (2) placed in or upon any automobile standing on the streets, alleys, or public places in the City of Madison for advertising purposes any commercial handbill, dodger, card, pamphlet, sticker, tag, or paper of any kind.

#### 23.05 SMOKING PROHIBITED IN CERTAIN AREAS.

Definitions. (1)

"Bed and breakfast establishment" has the meaning set forth in Wis. Stat. § 254.61(3). This definition shall become effective July 1, 2005. (Cr. by Ord. 13,604, 5-11-04)

"Childcare facility" means any state licensed or county certified child care facility including, but not limited to licensed family day care or licensed group day care centers, licensed day camps, certified school-age programs and Head Start programs.

"Chewing tobacco" means plug and twist tobacco; fine cut and other chewing tobaccos; snuff, snuff flour, Cavendish, plug and twist tobacco; refuse scraps, clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco and other kinds and forms of tobacco prepared in such manner as to be suitable for chewing. (Cr. by ORD-06-00033, 4-7-06)

"Cigarette" means any roll of tobacco wrapped in paper or any substance other than chewing tobacco or tobacco products. (Cr. by ORD-06-00033, 4-7-06)

"City buildings" means all City-owned and operated buildings and those portions of buildings leased and operated by the City. (Cr. by Ord. 12,832, 6-6-01)

"Common areas of buildings" means all areas not part of a tenant's leased premises, including but not limited to lobbies, community rooms, hallways, laundry rooms, stairwells, elevators, enclosed parking facilities, pool areas, and restrooms contiguous thereto. This definition shall become effective July 1, 2005. (Cr. by Ord. 13,604, 5-11-04)

"Common areas of malls" means those areas within a mall customarily accessible to patrons. (Cr. by Ord. 12,571, 5-3-00)

"Educational Facility" means any building used principally for educational purposes in which a school is located or a course of instruction or training program is offered that has been approved or licensed by a state agency or board. (Cr. by Ord. 11,091, 12-22-94)

"Electronic delivery device" means any product containing or delivering nicotine or any other substance intended for human consumption that may be used by a person to simulate smoking through inhalation of vapor or aerosol from the product. This includes any such device, whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, e-hookah, or vape pen, or under any other product name or descriptor. (Cr. by ORD-15-00007, 1-14-15)

"Employee" means any person who is employed by any employer for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit, including those full time, part-time, temporary or contracted for from a third party; employee also means any person who serves as a volunteer for a business or nonprofit entity.

"Employer" means any person, partnership, limited liability company, corporation, or other entity, including a public or non-profit entity who employs the services of one (1) or more individual persons.

"Enclosed Area" means all space between a floor and ceiling which is enclosed on all sides by solid walls or windows (exclusive of door or passage ways) which extend from floor to ceiling, including all space therein screened by partitions which do not extend to the ceiling or are not solid, 'other landscaping' or similar structures. (Cr. by Ord. 12,571, 5-3-00)

"Entrance" means a doorway, access area for vehicles and adjacent area which gives direct access to a building or City parking ramps from a contiguous street, plaza, sidewalk or parking lot. (Cr. by Ord. 12,832, 6-6-01; ORD-10-00122, 12-23-10)

"Food" means a raw, cooked, or processed edible substance or ingredient used or intended for use or for sale in whole or in part for human consumption. It does not include ice, beverage or chewing gum. (Cr. by ORD-06-00033, 4-7-06)

"Health Care Facility" has the meaning set forth in Wis. Stat. § 155.01(6). (Cr. by Ord. 12,571, 5-3-00)

"Hotel and motel" has the meaning set forth in Wis. Stat. § 254.61(3).

"Mall" means an enclosed, indoor area containing common areas and discrete businesses primarily devoted to the retail sale of goods and services. (Cr. by Ord. 12,571, 5-3-00)

"Medical Services" has the meaning set forth in Wis. Stat. § 647.01(6). (Cr. by Ord. 12,571, 5-3-00)

"NonSmoking" means smoking is prohibited. (Cr. by Ord. 12,571, 5-3-00)

"Outdoor air intake" means an opening or inlet through a wall louver or vent by which outside air is brought into an air-conditioning system or into a boiler room, also, known as a fresh-air intake. (Cr. by ORD-13-00139, 8-14-13)

"Person in Charge" means the person who ultimately controls, governs or directs the activities aboard a public conveyance or within or at a place where smoking is regulated under this section, regardless of the person's status as owner or lessee. (Cr. by Ord. 12,571, 5-3-00)

"Place of employment" means an enclosed area controlled by the employer, which employees normally frequent during the course of employment, including, but not limited to, work areas, employee lounges and restrooms, conference and classrooms, employee cafeterias and hallways. A private residence is not a 'place of employment' within the meaning of this ordinance unless used as a childcare facility.

"Private Club" means an organization, whether incorporated or not, which is the owner, lessee or occupant of a building or portion thereof used exclusively for club purposes at all times, which is operated solely for a recreational, fraternal, social, patriotic, political, benevolent or athletic purpose but not for pecuniary gain and which only sells alcohol beverages incidental to its operation. The affairs and management of the private club are conducted by a board of directors, executive committee or similar body chosen by the members at an annual meeting. The private club has established bylaws and/or a constitution to govern the club's activities. The private club has been granted an exemption from the payment of federal income tax as a club under 26 U.S.C.A. section 501. This definition shall become effective July 1, 2005. "Private residence" means premises owned, rented or leased for temporary or permanent habitation. (Cr. by Ord. 12,571, 5-3-00)

"Public place" means any enclosed area to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted. A private residence is not a public place. (Cr. by Ord. 12,571, 5-3-00)

"Restaurant" means an establishment defined in Wis. Stat. § 254.61(5), whose sale of alcohol beverages accounts for fifty percent (50%) or less of the establishment's gross receipts of the most recent alcohol licensing year, but does not mean churches, religious, fraternal, youth or patriotic organizations, service clubs and civic organizations which prepare and serve or sell meals to members and guests only. This includes restaurants within a mall and adjacent seating. This definition is effective January 2, 2003. (Am. by Ord. 11,558, 3-29-96, 4-4-96; Ord. 13,195, 12-10-02)

"Retail electronic delivery device store" means a retail establishment that does not have a "Class B" or "Class A" intoxicating liquor license or a Class "B" or Class "A" fermented malt beverages license and that generates seventy-five percent (75%) or more of its gross annual income from the retail sale of electronic delivery devices and accessories. (Cr. by ORD-15-00007, 1-14-15)

"Retail tobacco store" means a retail establishment that does not have a "Class B" intoxicating liquor license or a Class "B" fermented malt beverages license and that generates 75 percent or more of its gross annual income from the retail sale of tobacco products and accessories. (Am. by ORD-10-00067, 7-13-10)

"Room" means a space within a building completely enclosed with walls, partitions, floor and ceiling, except for openings for light, ventilation, ingress and egress.

"School Board" means the school board in charge of the public schools, grades K-12, of a school district. (Cr. by Ord. 11,091, 12-22-94)

"Smokefree" means absence from the ambient air of the smoke by-product from the burning, inhaling, exhaling, or carrying of a lighted cigarette, cigar, pipe, weed, plant, or other combustible substance in any manner in any form.

"Smoking" means to smoke or carry a lighted pipe, cigar, cigarette or tobacco-related products in any form. Smoking also includes the use of an electronic delivery device which creates an aerosol or vapor, in any manner or in any form, or the use of any oral smoking device. (Am. by ORD-15-00007, 1-14-15)

"Sports Arena" means sports pavilions, stadiums, gymnasiums, health spas, boxing arenas, swimming pools, roller and indoor ice rinks, and bowling centers. This definition shall become effective on July 1, 2005. (Cr. by Ord. 13,604, 5-11-04)

"Tavern" means any establishment with a full service bar in which fermented malt beverages or intoxicating liquors are sold for consumption upon said premises and whose sale of alcohol beverages accounts for more than fifty percent (50%) of the establishment's gross receipts of the most recent licensing year as specified in Chapter 38 of these ordinances. "Tobacco bar" means a tavern, which generates fifteen percent (15%) or more of its total annual gross income from the on-site sale of cigars and tobacco for pipes, not including any sales from vending machines. (Cr by ORD-06-00033, 4-7-06; Am. by ORD-10-00067, 7-13-10)

"Tobacco Product" means cigars; cheroots; stogies; periques; granulated, plug cut, crimp cut, ready-rubbed and other smoking tobacco; shorts; refuse scraps, clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco and other kinds and forms of tobacco prepared in such a manner, as to be suitable for smoking in a pipe or otherwise smoking; but "tobacco product" does not include cigarettes or chewing tobacco. "Use Tobacco Products" means to consume by means other than smoking including, but not limited to, the chewing, spitting, swallowing, snorting, inhaling or ingesting of any tobacco product. (Cr. by Ord. 10,679, 6-11-93)

#### (2) <u>Intent and Purpose</u>.

- (a) The Common Council of the City of Madison hereby finds that:
  - 1. It is recognized that smoking of cigarettes and tobacco products is hazardous to an individual's health and may affect the health of nonsmokers when they are involuntarily in the presence of smoking.
  - 2. Numerous scientific studies have found that tobacco smoke is a major contributor to indoor air pollution.
  - 3. Reliable scientific studies, including studies conducted by the Surgeon General of the United States, have shown that breathing sidestream or secondhand smoke is a significant health hazard to nonsmokers; particularly to children, elderly people, individuals with cardiovascular disease, and individuals with impaired respiratory function, including asthmatics and those with obstructive airway disease.
  - 4. Health hazards induced by breathing sidestream or secondhand smoke include lung cancer, respiratory infection, decreased respiratory function, decreased exercise tolerance, bronchoconstriction and bronchospasm.
  - 5. Reliable scientific studies assessed by the California Environmental Protection Agency have found that sidestream and secondhand tobacco smoke is a leading cause of premature death and disability among non-smokers.
  - 6. Air pollution caused by smoking is an offensive annoyance and irritant. Smoking results in serious and significant physical discomfort to nonsmokers.
  - 7. Electronic delivery devices are currently unregulated and have been proven to emit nicotine, ultra-fine particles, volatile organic compounds and other toxins. Inhalation of nicotine is proven to be dangerous to everyone, especially children and pregnant women. Exposure to ultrafine particles may exacerbate respiratory illnesses, such as asthma and may constrict arteries which could trigger a heart attack. The volatile organic compounds, such as formaldehyde and benzene, found in electronic smoking device aerosols, as well as conventional cigarette smoke, are proven carcinogens. - (b) This ordinance is adopted for the purpose of protecting the public health, safety, comfort and general welfare of the people of the City of Madison, especially recognizing the rights of nonsmokers who constitute a majority of the population; educating citizens affected by this ordinance; and assisting owners, operators; and managers in maintaining compliance.

To qualify for an annual exemption the tobacco bar must provide written proof subscribed to and sworn by a Certified Public Accountant certifying that fifteen percent (15%) or more of the tobacco bar's total gross income from the preceding year was from the on-site sale of tobacco products, not including any sales from vending machines:

#### (12) Clean Indoor Air.

- (a) Intent and Construction. The City of Madison finds that it is in the interests of the health, safety and welfare of the community to adopt by reference Wis. Stat. § 101.123, and subsequent amendments, additions and recodifications. It is the intent of the Common Council that where there may be conflict between Wis. Stat. § 101.123 and Sec. 23.05, MGO, that the most restrictive section shall apply. This ordinance shall not be construed to mean that progressive discipline of City employees for violations of laws, rules, and regulations is only authorized where explicitly provided by ordinance.
- (b) Penalty. The penalties provided by Wis. Stat. § 101.123 shall be in addition to the penalties provided for violation of Sec. 23.05 when a person has violated both laws. In addition to the penalties provided by Sec. 23.05 and Wis. Stat. § 101.123, any City employee who violates any provision of Sec. 23.05 or Wis. Stat. § 101.123, may also be subject to progressive discipline by his or her employer.

#### 23.06 DAMAGE TO PROPERTY.

- (1) <u>Definitions</u>. In this section:
  - (a) "Intentionally" shall mean that the actor either has a purpose to do the thing or cause the result specified, or is aware that her or his conduct is practically certain to cause that result. In addition, the actor must have knowledge of those facts which are necessary to make their conduct unlawful and which are set forth after the word "intentionally".
  - (b) "Graffiti" shall mean any writing, printing, marks, signs, symbols, figures, designs, inscriptions, or other drawings which are scrawled, painted, drawn or otherwise placed on any surface of a building, wall, fence, sidewalk, curb or other structure on public or private property which have the effect of defacing the property, but shall not include scratchiti as defined in Section 23.065. (Am. by ORD-06-00032, 4-7-06)
- (2) It shall be unlawful for any person to intentionally cause damage to any physical property of another without the person's consent.
- (3) If more than one item of property is damaged under a single intent and design, the damage to all of the property may be prosecuted as a single offense.
- In any case of unlawful damage involving more than one act of unlawful damage, but prosecuted as a single offense, it is sufficient to allege generally that unlawful damage to property was committed between certain dates. At the trial, evidence may be given of any such unlawful damage that was committed on or between the dates alleged.
- (5) It shall be unlawful for any person to intentionally place graffiti on any surface located on public or private property.

The chief of the fire department shall designate specific safe locations, if necessary, in any building, structure or place in which smoking may be permitted.  $\underline{2.90.010}$  Definitions. When used in this chapter, the following words have the following meanings:

- (a) "City-owned facility" means a city-owned structure and any and all stairways and approaches to that structure, and specifically includes all park shelters located in city parks.
- (b) "City-owned vehicle" means any motor vehicle or commercial motor vehicle as those words are defined in Section 340.01 of the Wisconsin Statutes, which has on the title the city of Wausau as owner of that vehicle.
- (c) "Electronic delivery device" means any product containing or delivering nicotine or other similar substance intended for human consumption that may be used by a person to simulate smoking through inhalation of vapor or aerosol from the product. Electronic delivery device includes any device manufactured, distributed, marketed or sold as an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, e-hookah, or vape pen, or under any other product name or description, or any component part of such product whether or not sold separately. Electronic delivery device does not include any product that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product and is being marketed and sold solely for such an approved purpose.
- (d) "Smoke" or "smoking" means burning, holding, inhaling, exhaling or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe or heated tobacco or plant product intended for inhalation, whether natural, or synthetic, in any manner or form. Smoking includes the use of an electronic delivery device which creates an aerosol or vapor, in any manner or form, or the use of any oral smoking device.
- (e) "Cigarette" means any roll of tobacco wrapped in paper or any substance other than tobacco.
- (f) "Tobacco products" means cigars; cheroots; stogies; periques; granulated, plug cut, crimp cut, ready-rubbed and other smoking tobacco; snuff; snuff flour; cavendish; plug and twist tobacco; fine cut and other chewing tobaccos; shorts; refuse scraps, clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco and other kinds and forms of tobacco prepared in such manner as to be suitable for chewing or smoking in a pipe or otherwise, or both for chewing and smoking; but "tobacco products" does not include cigarettes, as defined under Section 139.30(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

- (g) "Smokeless tobacco" means any tobacco which is used by means other than smoking. (Ord. 61-5694 §1(part), 2016; Ord. 61-4828 §1(part), 1994; Ord. 61-4672 §1(part), 1989.)
- 2.90.020 Smoking prohibited. No person may smoke, use smokeless tobacco, or use tobacco products within any city-owned facility except for those areas that are specifically leased to private entities, and specifically excluding Athletic Park when it is being utilized for Wausau Woodchucks baseball games. No person may smoke, use smokeless tobacco, or use tobacco products within any city-owned vehicle. (Ord. 61-5694 §2(part), 2016; Ord. 61-4828 §1(part), 1994; Ord. 61-4770 §1, 1992; Ord. 61-4694 §1, 1989; Ord. 61-4672 §1(part), 1989.)
- 2.90.030 Penalty. The penalty for violation of any provision of this chapter shall be a forfeiture of not more than two hundred dollars for each separate incident, and the municipal bail bond forfeiture shall be twenty-five dollars plus all assessments and costs. (Ord. 61-4828 §1(part), 1994; Ord. 61-4672 §1(part), 1989.)

- 2.95.020 Policy statement. All buildings, grounds, and other property owned or rented by the Wausau School District, are declared to be nonsmoking areas in which no smoking or use of smokeless tobacco or any other tobacco product, as defined in this chapter, shall be used. (Ord. 61-4725 §1(part), 1990; Ord. 61-4617 §1(part), 1987.)
- 2.95.030 Smoking prohibited. No person may smoke or use any other tobacco product on any property presently owned, rented by and/or titled in the Wausau School District or upon which the Wausau School District has direct control and authority over, except that the school board may allow the use of tobacco products on premises owned by the school district and rented to another for noneducational purposes. #### ORDINANCE NO. 2015-609

An Ordinance prohibiting the use of electronic smoking devices and smoking in or near certain City and School District property with penalties as set forth in newly created J.G.O. 8.76.040 and 8.74.070.

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JANESVILLE DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION I.** Chapter 8.76 of the Code of General Ordinances of the City of Janesville is hereby created to read as follows:

#### Chapter 8.76

#### PROHIBITION ON USE OF ELECTRONIC SMOKING DEVICES

#### Sections:

8.76.010	Intent and purpose
8.76.020	Definitions
8.76.030	Prohibition on Use of Electronic Smoking Devices
8.76.040	Violation – Penalty

8.76.010 Intent and purpose. The Common Council of the City of Janesville hereby find that:

- A. While electronic smoking devices are currently unregulated by the United States Food and Drug Administration, the use by and sale to children of electronic smoking devices containing nicotine ("nicotine products") is prohibited by Wisconsin law and Janesville ordinance.
- B. Several other states, counties, and municipalities have already taken action to prohibit the use of electronic smoking devices in certain locations.
- C. This Chapter incorporates by reference as if fully set forth herein verbatim the factual findings of the states, counties, and municipalities that have investigated, documented, and/or made independent findings and conclusions concerning the health effects and concerns arising from and/or pertaining to the use of electronic smoking devices.
- D. The American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network advocates for smoke-free laws, including electronic smoking devices and supposed nicotine-free electronic smoking devices, in all workplaces to protect workers and the public form the harmful effects of secondhand exposure and states that preliminary studies indicate that nonusers can be exposed to the same potentially harmful chemicals as users, including nicotine, ultrafine particles and volatile organic compounds, which could be especially problematic for children, pregnant women, and people with heart disease.
- E. A 2009 study by the United States Food and Drug Administration found cancercausing substances in several of the electronic smoking devices tested and found nicotine in some electronic smoking devices that claimed to contain no nicotine.

- **F.** This ordinance is adopted for the purpose of protecting the public health, safety, comfort and general welfare of the people of the City of Janesville, especially recognizing the rights of those who do not use electronic smoking devices, who constitute a majority of the population; educating citizens affected by this ordinance; and assisting individuals in maintaining compliance.
  - **8.76.020 Definitions**. For the purposes of this chapter:
- A. "Electronic smoking device" means any product containing or delivering nicotine or any other substance intended for human consumption that may be used by a person to simulate smoking through inhalation of vapor or aerosol from the product. This includes any such device whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, e-hookah, or vape pen, or under any other product name or descriptor.
  - B. "School buildings" are buildings under the control of a school board.
- **8.76.030** Prohibition on Use of Electronic Smoking Devices No person may use an electronic smoking device in any of the following locations:
  - 1. City or School buildings or within 25 feet of an entrance to a City or School

building.

2. Anywhere on the property of the Janesville Senior Center or Hedberg Public

Library.

- 3. City bus shelters.
- 4. City buses.
- 5. City pools, which shall include the entire fenced in area around the pools.
- 6. City splash pads, which includes the wet and dry deck.
- 7. City skate park, which shall include the entire cement area around the skate park.
- 8.76.040 Violation--Penalty. Any person who violates any provision of this Chapter shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than One Hundred Dollars (\$100) nor more than Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) for each violation together with the costs of prosecution, for each offense, or, in default of payment of such penalty shall be imprisoned for no more than sixty days for each violation in addition to such other penalties, remedies, sanctions and relief as may be, from time to time, provided by law.
- **SECTION II.** Section 8.74.040(B) of the Code of General Ordinances of the City of Janesville is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### 8.74.040 Prohibition Against Smoking.

- B. No person may smoke at any of the following outdoor locations:
- 1. Anywhere on the premises of a child care center when children who are receiving child care services are present.
  - 2. Anywhere on the grounds of a Type 1 juvenile correctional facility.
- 3. A location that is 25 feet or less from a residence hall or dormitory that is owned or operated by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System.
- 4. A location that is 25 feet or less from an entrance to a City building or anywhere on the property of the Janesville Senior Center or Hedberg Public Library. If a

restaurant, tavern, private club, or retail establishment is located within this area the person in charge of such establishment may designate an outside area that is a reasonable distance from any entrance to the establishment where customers, employees, or persons associated with the establishment may smoke.

5. At a City splash pad, which includes the wet and dry deck, or at the City skate park, which shall include the entire cement area around the skate park. If a restaurant, tavern, private club, or retail establishment is located within this area the person in charge of such establishment may designate an outside area that is a reasonable distance from any entrance to the establishment where customers, employees, or persons associated with the establishment may smoke.

#### 34.06 SAFETY AT SPORTING EVENTS. (1) As used in this section, the following words and phrases have the meanings indicated:

- (a) Alcohol beverages means fermented malt beverages and intoxicating liquor.
- (b) Facility means building or stadium in Dane County.
- (c) Fermented malt beverages has the meaning designated in s. 125.02(6), Wis. Stats.
- (d) Intoxicating liquor has the meaning designated in s. 125.02(8), Wis. Stats.
- (e) Passing includes pushing, pulling, throwing and moving.
- (f) Sports facility means a facility where sporting events are held, regardless of whether that is the exclusive use of the facility.
- (2) A spectator at a sporting event at a sports facility shall not participate in the process of passing another person above the floor or ground from one location to another.

- (3) A spectator at a sporting event at a sports facility shall not participate in the process of passing bleachers, seats or other objects in a manner which threatens the safety of other persons.
- (4) A spectator shall not bring alcohol beverages into a sports facility where there is a sporting event at the sports facility.
- (5) A spectator shall not consume alcohol beverages at a sporting event at a sports facility if the alcohol beverages were brought to the facility as specified in subsection (4).
- (6) Subsections (4) and (5) do not apply to any vendor or other person who brings alcohol beverages into a sports facility with the authorization of the person in charge of the facility.

### 34.07 SMOKING PROHIBITED IN CERTAIN AREAS. (1) Purpose and intent. (a) The Dane County Board of Supervisors hereby finds that:

- 1. It is recognized that smoking of cigarettes and tobacco products is hazardous to an individual's health and may affect the health of non-smokers when they are involuntarily in the presence of smoking.
- 2. Numerous scientific studies have found that tobacco smoke is a major contributor to indoor air pollution.
- 3. Reliable scientific findings, including those by the Surgeon General of the United States, have shown that breathing sidestream or secondhand smoke is a significant health hazard to non-smokers; particularly to children, elderly people, individuals with cardiovascular disease and individuals with impaired respiratory function, including asthmatics and those with obstructive airway disease.
- 4. Health hazards induced by breathing sidestream or secondhand smoke include lung cancer, respiratory infection, decreased respiratory function, decreased exercise tolerance, bronchoconstriction and bronchospasm.
- 5. Reliable scientific studies assessed by the California Environmental Protection Agency have found that sidestream and secondhand tobacco smoke is a leading cause of premature death and disability among non-smokers.
- 6. Air pollution caused by smoking is an offensive annoyance and irritant. Smoking

results in serious and significant physical discomfort to non-smokers.

- 7. Electronic delivery devices are currently unregulated and have been proven to emit nicotine, ultra-fine particles, volatile organic compounds and other toxins. Inhalation of nicotine is proven to be dangerous to everyone, especially children and pregnant women. Exposure to ultra-fine particles may exacerbate respiratory illnesses, such as asthma and may constrict arteries which could trigger a heart attack. The volatile organic compounds, such as formaldehyde and benzene, found in electronic smoking device aerosols, as well as conventional cigarette smoke, are proven carcinogens.
- (b) This ordinance is adopted for the purpose of protecting the public health, safety, comfort and general welfare of the people of Dane County, especially recognizing the rights of non-smokers, who constitute a majority of the population; educating citizens affected by this ordinance; and assisting owners, operators and managers in maintaining compliance.
- (2) Authority. This ordinance is enacted under the authority of sections 59.03, 59.51 and 101.123 of the Wisconsin Statutes.
- (3) Definitions. As used in this section, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings indicated:
- (a) Bed and breakfast establishment has the meaning set forth in sec. 254.61(3), Wis. Stats.
- (b) Childcare facility means any state licensed or county certified child care facility including, but not limited to, licensed family day care or licensed group day care centers, licensed day camps, certified school-age programs and Head Start programs.
- (c) Cigarette means any roll of tobacco wrapped in paper or any substance other than chewing tobacco or tobacco products.
- (d) County buildings means all County-owned and operated buildings and those portions of buildings leased and operated by the County.
- (e) Common areas of buildings means all areas not part of a tenant's leased premises including, but not limited to, lobbies, community rooms, hallways, laundry rooms, stairwells, elevators, enclosed parking facilities, pool areas and restrooms contiguous thereto.
- (f) Common areas of malls means those areas within a mall customarily accessible to patrons.

- (g) Educational facility means any building used principally for educational purposes in which a school is located or a course of instruction or training program is offered that has been approved or licensed by a state agency or board.
- (gm) Electronic delivery device means any product containing or delivering nicotine or any other substance intended for human consumption that may be used by a person to simulate smoking through inhalation of vapor or aerosol from the product. This includes any such device, whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, e-hookah, or vape pen, or under any other product name or descriptor.
- (h) Employee means any person who is employed by any employer for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit including those full-time, part-time, temporary or contracted for from a third party. Employee also means any person who serves as a volunteer for a business or nonprofit entity.
- (i) Employer means any person, partnership, limited liability company, corporation or other entity, including a public or non-profit entity who employs the services of one (1) or more individual persons.
- (j) Enclosed area means all space between a floor and ceiling which is enclosed on all sides by solid walls or windows (exclusive of door or passage ways) which extend from floor to ceiling, including all space therein screened by partitions which do not extend to the ceiling or are not solid, 'other landscaping' or similar structures.
- (k) Entrance means a doorway and adjacent area which gives direct access to a building from a contiguous street, plaza, sidewalk or parking lot.
- **(L)** Food means a raw, cooked or processed edible substance or ingredient used or intended for use or for sale in whole or in part for human consumption. It does not include ice, beverages or chewing gum.
- (m) Health care facility has the meaning set forth in sec. 155.01(6), Wis. Stats.
- (n) Hotel and motel has the meaning set forth in sec. 254.61(3), Wis. Stats.
- (o) Mall means an enclosed, indoor area containing common areas and discrete businesses primarily devoted to the retail sale of goods and services.

- (p) Medical services has the meaning set forth in sec. 647.01(6), Wis. Stats.
- (q) Non-smoking means smoking is prohibited.
- (r) Person in charge means the person who ultimately controls, governs or directs the activities aboard a public conveyance or within or at a place where smoking is regulated under this section, regardless of the person's status as owner or lessee.
- (s) Place of employment means an enclosed area controlled by the employer, which employees normally frequent during the course of employment including, but not limited to, work areas, employee lounges and restrooms, conference and classrooms, employee cafeterias and hallways. A private residence is not considered a place of employment within the meaning of this ordinance unless used as a childcare facility.
- (t) Private residence means premises owned, rented or leased for temporary or permanent habitation.
- (u) Public place means any enclosed area to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted. A private residence is not a public place.
- (v) Restaurant means an establishment defined in sec. 254.61(5), Wis. Stats., in which the sale of alcohol beverages accounts for fifty percent (50%) or less of the establishment's gross receipts of the most recent alcohol licensing year, but does not mean churches, religious, fraternal, youth or patriotic organizations, service clubs and civic organizations which prepare and serve or sell meals to members and guests only. This includes restaurants within a mall and adjacent seating.
- (vm) Retail electronic delivery device store means a retail establishment that does not have a "Class B" or "Class A" intoxicating liquor license or a "Class B" or "Class A" fermented malt beverages license and that generates seventy-five (75%) or more of its gross annual income from the retail sale of electronic delivery devices and accessories.
- (w) Room means a space within a building completely enclosed with walls, partitions, floor and ceiling, except for openings for light, ventilation, ingress and egress.
- (x) Smoke free means absence from the ambient air of the smoke by-product from the burning, inhaling, exhaling, using or carrying of an electronic delivery device, lighted cigarette,

- cigar, pipe, weed, plant or other combustible substance, in any manner in any form.
- (y) Smoking means to smoke or carry a lighted pipe, cigar, cigarette or tobacco-related product in any form. Smoking also includes the use of an electronic delivery device which creates an aerosol or vapor, in any manner or in any form, or the use of any oral smoking device.
- (z) Sports arena means sports pavilions, stadiums, gymnasiums, health spas, boxing arenas, swimming pools, roller and indoor ice rinks and bowling centers.
- (aa) Tavern means any establishment with a full service bar in which fermented malt beverages or intoxicating liquors are sold for consumption upon said premises and whose sale of alcohol beverages accounts for more than fifty percent (50%) of the establishment's gross receipts of the most recent licensing year.
- (bb) Tobacco product means cigars; cheroots; stogies; periques; granulated, plug cut, crimp cut, ready-rubbed and other smoking tobacco; shorts; refuse scraps, clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco; and other kinds and forms of tobacco prepared in such a manner as to be suitable for smoking in a pipe or otherwise smoking; but tobacco product does not include cigarettes or chewing tobacco.
- (cc) Tobacco bar means a tavern, which generates fifteen percent (15%) or more of its total annual gross income from the on-site sale of tobacco products, not including any sales from vending machines.
- (4) Prohibition of smoking in public places. Except as otherwise provided, it shall be unlawful for any person to smoke or use tobacco products in public places including, but not limited to, the following:
- (a) Elevators and enclosed stairwells of County parking ramps.
- (b) Public forms of transportation including, but not limited to, motor buses, taxicabs or other public passenger vehicles.
- (c) Theatres, libraries, museums, auditoriums and convention halls.
- (d) Childcare facilities. Incorporated herein by reference are the following Wisconsin statutory and administrative code sections and any amendments or renumbering thereof: Sec. 101.123(1)(ad) and (2)(bm), Wis. Stats.; Secs. HFS 45.02(4), 45.06(8)(g), 46.03(13), 46.06 (2)(h) and 46.08(2)(c), Wis. Admin. Code.

- (e) Retail stores.
- (f) Health care facilities.
- (g) Waiting rooms, hallways and rooms of health care laboratories.
- **(h)** Waiting rooms, hallways and rooms in offices of any physician, dentist, psychologist, chiropractor, optometrist or optician, or other medical services provider.
- (i) Meeting and conference rooms in which people gather for educational, business, professional, union, governmental, recreational, political or social purposes.
- (j) Polling places.
- (k) Service lobbies, waiting areas and the common areas open to the public of financial institutions, business and professional offices and multi-unit commercial facilities.
- (L) Self-service laundry facilities.
- (m) Enclosed, indoor areas of restaurants.
- (n) Common areas of malls.
- (o) Public bus and transfer point shelters.
- (p) Common areas of buildings which contain three or more rental units. Written rental agreements shall include reference to this subsection. Subsection (9)(b) shall not apply to this subsection.
- (q) County buildings.
- (r) County-owned or leased motor vehicles.
- (s) Sports arenas.
- (t) Taverns.
- (u) Common areas in bed and breakfast establishments, hotels and motels, and at least 75% of rooms that are rented to guests.
- (v) Educational facilities.
- (5) Prohibition of smoking in outdoor areas. It shall be unlawful for any person to smoke or use tobacco products in the following outdoor areas:
- (a) Within a distance of 15 feet outside entrances, operable windows and ventilation systems of enclosed areas where smoking is prohibited, so as to insure that tobacco smoke does not enter those areas.
- **1.** Every building where smoking is prohibited shall have at least one entrance which is smoke-free.
- (b) County parks and beaches as posted and so designated by the Park Commission.
- (c) Anywhere on the grounds of the Badger Prairie Health Care Center. This facility and all of its grounds are designated entirely "Smoke Free."

- (6) Prohibition of smoking in places of employment. It shall be unlawful for any person to smoke in all places of employment.
- (7) Smoking paraphernalia. Ashtrays, cigarette vending machines and other smoking paraphernalia shall not be located in areas where smoking is prohibited by this ordinance.
- (8) Exceptions. The following areas shall not be subject to the restrictions of this section:
- (a) Bed and breakfast, hotel and motel rooms that are rented to guests and are designated as smoking rooms, provided that not more than twenty-five percent (25%) of rooms may be so designated.
- **(b)** Private residences, except when used as a childcare or health care facility.
- (c) Tobacco bars, subject to all of the following:
- 1. Smoking of tobacco products is permitted.
- 2. Smoking of cigarettes and cigars is not permitted.
- **3.** Fifteen percent (15%) or more of the tobacco bar's total gross income from the previous fiscal year was from the on-site sale of tobacco products, not including any sales from vending machines.
- 4. To qualify for this exemption the owner must file written proof subscribed and sworn to by a certified public accountant certifying the tobacco bar's total gross income and the percentage of tobacco product sales from the tobacco bar. The director of Public Health may request further information, including an audit of the tobacco bar's records, if there is reason to believe the financial data may not be accurate.
- 5. This exemption is only in effect from the date of initial application until the following June 30<sup>th</sup>, and then from July 1<sup>st</sup> to June 30<sup>th</sup> of each year thereafter, upon application. An application for this exemption must be made annually by April 15<sup>th</sup> of the application year.
- **6.** A tobacco bar that has not previously qualified under this subdivision, may qualify for an exemption if it provides written proof subscribed and sworn to by a certified public accountant certifying that during the previous six (6) months, fifteen percent (15%) or more of the tobacco bar's total gross income was from the on-site sale of tobacco products, not including any sales from vending machines. To qualify under this paragraph, the required certification must be filed no later than ninety (90) days after the above-mentioned six (6)

months. This exemption will be in effect through the next full licensing year. After that point in time, the tobacco bar must qualify on a yearly basis for the exemption.

- 7. Tobacco bars shall display signs, in accordance with the standards in sub. (9), that state that pipes may be smoked in the tobacco bar, that cigarettes may not be smoked in the tobacco bar, and warning of the dangers of secondhand smoke, in language and form as approved by the director of Public Health.
- **(d)** Retail electronic delivery device stores subject to the following:
- 1. The store may provide electronic delivery devices and accessories for the purposes of sampling;
- 2. The store must have an entrance opening directly to the outside;
- Smoking of tobacco products is prohibited;
- 4. Service of food is not permitted.
- (9) Signage. (a) "No Smoking" signs or the international "No Smoking" symbol (consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it) shall be clearly and conspicuously posted in every public place and place of employment where smoking is prohibited by this section, said signage being posted by the owner, operator, manager or other person in control of the place.
- (b) Restaurants and taverns shall post, in a conspicuous place at each entrance normally used by the public, a sign not smaller than eleven inches by eight and one-half inches (11"  $\times$  8½") stating that smoking is prohibited. The signage lettering shall be in bold and the lettering shall be a minimum of two (2) inches in height. Each sign shall contain the telephone number for the City-County Health Department and the non-emergency number for the Dane County Sheriff's Office.
- (c) It shall be unlawful for any person to remove, deface or destroy any sign required by this section.
- (10) Enforcement. (a) The Director of Public Health or his or her designee and the Sheriff or his or her designee shall have the authority to enter upon the premises named in this section to ascertain compliance with this ordinance. Each day that a violation exists shall constitute a separate offense. Enforcement may be by citation, as permitted by s. 2.02(10), or through referral to the corporation counsel's office for

prosecution for injunctive relief and daily forfeitures.

- (b) The proprietor, employer or other person in charge of premises regulated hereunder, upon either observing or being advised of a violation, shall make reasonable efforts to prevent smoking in prohibited areas by:
- 1. Approaching smokers who fail to voluntarily comply with this section and requesting that they extinguish their cigarette or tobacco product and refrain from smoking, or
- **2.** Refusing service to anyone smoking in a prohibited area, or
- **3.** Contacting local law enforcement if the person refuses to comply if actions in 1. and 2. above are unsuccessful.
- (11) Retaliation prohibited. No person shall discharge, refuse to hire, refuse to serve, or in any manner retaliate against any employee, applicant for employment, customer, service user, business patron or any other person who exercises any rights afforded by this section.
- (12) Penalties. (a) A person who smokes in an area where smoking is prohibited by the provisions of this section shall be subject to a forfeiture of not more than one hundred dollars (\$100).
- **(b)** A person who owns, manages, operates or otherwise controls a public place or place of employment and who fails to comply with the provisions of this section shall be subject to a forfeiture as follows:
- 1. not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) for a first violation;
- 2. not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200) for a second violation within one (1) year; and
- 3. not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) for each additional violation within one (1) year.
- (13) Severability. Should any subsection, clause or provision of this section be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the section as a whole or to any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.


