Green Lake County Libraries Report for September 2016

Markesan – We have a busy summer season behind us and look forward to fall. The first day of school was typical of years past—we get a lot of kids in the library at about 3:30. I am certain that some adults breathe a sigh of relief when they come in during the day time. September will bring a program called, “Life in East Africa” by Bishop Nelson Wesamoyo on September 19 at 6:30. A week later we will have Jay Dampier talk about trees on September 27 at 1:30. Story hour for children under 5 will be every Thursday at 10:30. We continue with our lively book discussions ever month. Soon we will be making the final arrangements for our holiday make and take workshops. The Library is working on getting donations for security cameras for both inside and outside the building. Sometimes we have vandalism around the library. Fortunately, so far it has been minor and things we can easily remedy. We hope that the mere presence of cameras in and around the building and alley will deter any thoughts of shenanigans and/or assist police in the event of something happening.

Princeton – The Princeton Library is getting back into its regular rhythm after a wonderful busy summer season. The summer reading program concluded with a Pizza and Ice Cream Party for all of our 70 participants. We are concluding our summer book sale, where we sold the last of VHS. We also had our Golf Outing last month to raise money for the expansion project. Princeton, the town, is gearing up for Crane Fest, September 10th and the library is currently a spot for the Bingo Program for the participants. Our front window is also on display for all things crane. The mystery book club, coloring club and game night will all return in September. Storytime will be taking the month off, but will return in October at a new day and time: Thursdays at 10am. Our big program for the month is historical reenactor, Laura Keyes, returning to the Princeton Library on Saturday September 24. Join us at 10am, as Keyes portrays a young Mary Todd Lincoln who is reflecting on the family’s recent move to Washington DC where he husband is serving his first term as senator.

This report briefly describes work completed during August 2016 within the Community Natural Resources and Economic Development (CNRED) Program. During the reporting period, I made 29 direct educational / professional contacts.

Organizational Development and Capacity Building

Strategic Plan: Chamber of Commerce I am continuing to facilitate strategic planning processes for two chambers of commerce operating within the county. Work I conducted this month is related to synthesizing participant responses which will be used in the next phase of the project.

TREDC Fall Summit Planning The Tri-county Economic Development Corporation (Green Lake, Marquette and Waushara) is planning its Fall Summit and I am participating on the planning committee. Tentatively the summit is scheduled for November 3rd. With the retirement of the Marquette County CNRED Educator, Waushara County CNRED Educator and I will be providing UW-Extension educational support for the summit.

Green Lake County Fair With the support of Kim, I provided some leadership with the demolition derby at the Fair this year. I also provided photography at the fair again this year. These photos will be used in future marketing efforts for the Fair.

Natural Resource Stewardship

Lawn Care / Water Quality I along with Ali our summer intern completed the remaining site visits. During August, project partners at Green Lake Association conducted visits as well. Soil test and site assessment results for the 50 participants are being compiled and will be sent out during the next reporting period. Printing of the Lawn Care Water Quality Almanac has been ordered and costs will be covered by the NC Innovation Grant which was awarded to me.

Educational Programming, Outreach and Promotion

Intercounty Coordinating Committee (ICC) Green Lake County hosted the August meeting of the ICC. I coordinated the educational portion of the meeting which covered the topic of "Stretching road building and maintenance costs." James Hughes (WI Highway Maintenance and Roadside Management Section Chief) and Amy Brooks (Green Lake Highway Commissioner) both presented.

Research and Studies Committee In my role as Secretary of the Research and Studies Committee, I am providing support for the Department Symposium.

Professional Development

Understanding Local Hispanic Populations I coordinated a staff tour with the agency UMOS in order to better understand potential Hispanic audiences within Green Lake County. The intention was to gain insight into this small yet growing population within Green Lake County, so our staff can be better equipped to serve diverse audiences.

Qualitative Data Analysis Training I attended this training with a UW-Extension Local Government Center colleague in order to gain additional analytical skills which I plan to use in my practice relating to governmental and organizational analysis. The registration fees were covered by the Local Government Center.

Administration

Budget I invested time during the reporting period to learn about the budgeting process, both for the County-side, as well as the UW-Extension side. I am also working with the County Clerk office as well as UW-Extension Finance to ensure accuracy in the budgeting process.

Neogov and Position Descriptions During the reporting period, I was asked (along with other Department Heads) by the County Clerk, as well as the Committee Chair to review and update the Program Specialist position descriptions. I also invested time learning the county's staff evaluation system neogov.com, and plan to ensure consistency between the position descriptions and the annual review evaluation criteria.

LEGO Lab at the Boys and Girls Club

I completed the LEGO LAB program at the Boys and Girls Club in Berlin on August 15, 2016. The LEGO LAB provided a hands-on learning opportunity where:

- problem solving and critical thinking skills were developed
- creativity and self-confidence were fostered
- architecture and engineering concepts were explored

The LEGO LAB was open to all youth 5 – 12 years in age and typically has between 8-16 participants per session. LEGO Lab was conducted at the same time as Girl Club which was facilitated by Katie Gellings, Green Lake County Family Living Educator. Both programs were well received by both youth and adult staff members.

Youth Exhibit Committee

I coordinated the Youth Exhibit Committee meeting on Thursday, August 18, 2016. The Youth Exhibit Committee has two purposes:

- to interpret and enforce the rules and regulations contained in the Official Premium List for the Green Lake County Fair.
- to identify problems/issues relating to youth exhibits and make recommendations to the Fair Committee to resolve/prevent these problems/issues in the future.



Agenda items included: Green Lake County Fair entry deadline discussion and recommendation, Youth Exhibit Committee Bylaws discussion and recommendation, Exhibitor Pen Fees discussion and recommendation and Open Dairy discussion and recommendation. In addition to these items, the Youth Exhibit Committee also elected a Vice Chair and Secretary.

4-H Club at UMOS Summer Camp

I worked with UW-Extension Summer Intern, Ali McNamara, to continue to coordinate a summer 4-H Club experience for the youth participating in the UMOS (United Migrant Opportunity Services) summer camp program. We focused our programming efforts on STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) and offered a variety of hands-on learning experiences. The program concluded with a field to the Green Lake County Fair to celebrate their efforts. Over 40 youth participated in the three week program.



Did you know... *Roles of the 4-H Youth Development Educator*

Educator Role

- Provides leadership and support for the county 4-H Youth Development program
- Serves as the link to the larger 4-H Youth Development and UW-Extension system
- Provides resources and information for 4-H groups in organizational decision making
- Teaches content in youth development, organization building, and volunteer development through informal conversations, phone calls, newsletters, group presentations, participation in meetings and development of educational materials

Educational Administrator Role

- Responsible for assuring that all programs bearing the 4-H name and emblem are consistent with the mission and goals of Cooperative Extension's 4-H program
- Ensures compliance with state and national 4-H policies, procedures and expectations
- Ensures that local 4-H program decisions comply with federal and state nondiscrimination laws and policies
- Provides education and management for financial accountability for county 4-H clubs and groups so they meet federal and state tax requirements and receive ongoing approval of tax-exempt status

Volunteer Manager Role

- Implements the Wisconsin 4-H Youth Protection Program
- Establishes and maintains a comprehensive 4-H volunteer development and management system that includes selection, orientation and training, utilization, recognition, and evaluation of volunteers
- Provides educational leadership and support to volunteers in delivery of the 4-H community club program

This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the Family Living Program in August of 2016. During the reporting period, the educator made 308 direct educational and professional contacts.

Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

Girl Power – United Migrant Opportunity Services (UMOS), Berlin

In August I finished teaching the Girl Power program at the UMOS childcare site in Berlin with the Waushara County Family Living Educator, Mary Ann Schilling. Each lesson was 60 minutes in length. There were a total of 13 girls who participated in the program over five weeks. Participants reported feeling, “happy and glad” during the Girl Power classes, and learned “people are beautiful from the inside” and to “be kind, be a friend.”



UMOS Field Trip – Green Lake County Fair

On the morning of August 5, the children who attended UMOS Child Care took a field trip to the Green Lake County Fair. The children got their pictures taken with the Fairest of the Fair, decorated a picture frame for their picture, played Bingo, got a tour of the fair from the Fairest of the Fair and the Jr. Fairest of the Fair, got their 4-H projects judged, and ate a pizza lunch at the fairgrounds. This program was made possible by the combined effort of the 4-H Youth Development Educator, Summer Intern, and me. In its success, we are looking to offer the opportunity again next year during the fair, and the Country Clovers 4-H Club has offered to provide breakfast to the children next year.



Money Olympics – Green Lake County Fair

I partnered with Amy Vetrone at 1st National Bank to offer a financial education program to children at the Green Lake County Fair. We had 23 children participate in the Saturday morning program, called Money Olympics. Participants took part in three activities: a coin relay race, money bag toss, and cookie decorating. My portion of the program included the coin relay race. Participants had to run to a bucket of sand, find a real coin among several fake gold coins, run back to the start and match the coin in the correct corresponding bucket. All participants received a piggy bank, paint brush, and paint set to decorate their own piggy bank.



Canning Salsa – Berlin Public Library

On the evening of August 11, I taught a canning salsa class at the Berlin Public Library for 27 individuals. I demonstrated how to make fresh vegetable salsa, and how I would go about canning it. This class was the final part of a three part series. I have had four phone calls from attendees since the series took place. The calls were questions from those who began canning for the first time!

UMOS Parent Meeting - Auroraville

In mid-August, I taught a mini lesson on organizing financial and important papers to a group of 17 UMOs parents at the Aurora Center in Auroraville. A majority of the parents work on farms and canning companies in Green Lake County. I discussed which important papers to keep, and where to keep them. I also talked about the importance of shredding documents when they are no longer needed. Handouts were available in both Spanish and English, and a Spanish translator was able to translate for me.

Introduction to Canning – Edgewater Apartments, Berlin

I taught nine residents at Edgewater Apartments in Berlin about safely preserving food through canning. Edgewater Apartments is an affordable housing community located in Berlin. The hour long lesson included an educational presentation, and a hands-on jam making demonstration. Three residents were still using canning procedures from several years ago, which are now deemed unsafe. It was a very worthwhile program!

Meet Chris Clover!

I have the privilege of being Chris Clover, the Green Lake County 4-H mascot, for the “Where’s Chris Clover?” portion of the 4-H newsletter. Club members guess where Chris Clover is based on the picture in the newsletter, and the first two correct answers get a prize! On our first trip in Green Lake, we spotted some very cute special guests, Dave’s grandchildren!



Networking within UW Extension and Professional Development Opportunities

I made 57 contacts within the UW Extension system during the month of August. I continue to have a number of professional meetings scheduled with colleagues and mentors to continue to network and learn from my fellow Extension educators. I expect these meetings to continue to assist in my growth within my role in Green Lake County.

Stronger Together Training – Madison

I attended a professional development training for a newly developed program, called Stronger Together, in Madison on August 22. Stronger Together is a partner physical activity program developed as a way for people to have built-in social support while participating in physical activity. Social support has been identified as a factor in behavior modification and lifestyle changes. By including social support within a physical activity program, participants are more likely to adhere to the program and see results. I am looking forward to implementing this program in Green Lake County in the future.



Safe and Healthy Food Pantries Project Training – Madison

I attended a two day training for the Safe and Healthy Food Pantry Project (SHFPP) in Madison. The SHFPP was developed to improve access to and availability of adequate, appropriate, safe & nutritious food for low- income people who utilize food pantries. I am hoping to utilize the information from the training at the food pantries within Green Lake County.

Educational Contacts

In the month of July, a total of 35 educational contacts were made with extension clients. Of the total contacts, face to face contacts were 22 (meetings, walk-in, farm visits). Remaining contacts were phone calls, emails, and mailings. Of the total contacts, females were 11. The main areas of concern during that period were vegetable disease and insects, home horticulture, and vegetable crop nutrients.

Tri-County Produce Auction

County Board Chair and Extension Committee Chair Visit:

The Green Lake County Board Chair Harley Reabe and UW-Extension Committee Chair Joanne Guden visited the Tri-County Produce Auction in Dalton. While their visit, they learned about the day to day operation of the auction from two Auction Board members Norman Miller and William Beechy. They also discussed how UW-Extension agricultural education services are helping growers to produce better crops and what are the challenges of the auction. The auction floor manager Earnest Bontrager provide the tour of the auction to Harley and Joanne. They also observed the auction of the produce and talk to few buyers.

Soil Health Day

The agent attended soil health day in Omro, WI. The event was organized by USDA-NRCS and Winnebago County UW-Extension. There were many important educational message were provided to attendees during the session. Difference in soil layers and compaction as a result of no-till and tradition tillage practices were discussed with the attendees. The main attraction of the event was ‘rainfall simulator’ to demonstrate how cover crop reduces the soil erosion, nutrient loss and maintains more soil moisture for the crop.

Wisconsin Nutrition Education Program

Fond du Lac and Green Lake Counties

The Wisconsin Nutrition Education Program (WNEP) continues to partner with Fox River Industries to provide nutrition education to its sheltered workshop clients. WNEP taught a 6 session series to 2 groups (total 12 times.)

WNEP provided an introduction to MyPlate, including what it is and why it's important for a healthy diet. The group divided MyPlate by breakfast, lunch and dinner plates. Main nutrition messages included choosing more red/orange and leafy green fruits and vegetables, whole grains, low-fat dairy products and lean meats. After the initial MyPlate session, the following classes focused in on each of the five food groups (Grains, Vegetable, Fruit, Dairy and Protein Groups.)

Each class involved a basic food preparation for the participants to sample foods from all of the five food groups. All materials are appropriate for Fox River Industries clientele, including picture recipes (in lieu of a list of ingredients and instructions.) Group home workers and family members have commented on making the healthy recipes sent home with the Fox River Industries clients.

To decrease the chance of food-borne illness, the importance of food safety and how to properly wash hands before preparing foods was addressed at each class.

WNEP understands that it is not enough to teach about healthy behavior choices, but to make "the healthy choice the easy choice" by creating a healthier environment for those taught. A survey was conducted on the snacks available at Fox River Industries. 'Unhealthier' snacks and beverages have now been replaced with healthier options, including nuts, raisins, water and less sugary drinks.
