Green Lake County Library Activities Report for December 2018

Berlin: At the Berlin Library, we are busy getting ready for the upcoming Holiday Season with decorating our live tree, putting up our historic 12 Days of Christmas display and adding a festive look to our library. We have several holiday programs to add to the festive atmosphere. We have an adult Holiday Decorating program, kid's crafts and movies for all ages. We are very excited to have Mr. and Mrs. Claus visit for a special story time on December 20. After enjoying stories, games and crafts, kids will be able to tell Santa what they want for Christmas and pose for pictures.

We are excited to host a live performance of Laura Ingalls Wilder's Christmas Memories, on Monday, December 10. Laura will reminisce about her family from her childhood days and will bring along some of her beloved Christmas gifts. This is sure to be a wonderful program for all ages.

As the colder weather comes, we remind patrons that we offer home delivery to shut-ins in the Berlin area. We have several patrons who are thankful to get books during the long winter days and our staff enjoys taking the library to them.

Green Lake: Breakfast with Santa and the Friends Book and Cookie Sales were this past Saturday, and were a smashing success. I am so grateful for volunteers (and husbands) who made multiple trips to replenish supplies as needed. And for the patience of breakfasters!

We have some other programs still coming this month. Tuesday, December 4, local space enthusiast Mike Nofz is giving a talk celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Apollo 8 mission, called *Christmas at the Moon*. The program begins at 6:30. We will have a couple of weeks of "Merry Matinees" – Christmas movies at 1:00 on Thursdays December 6 and 13. Flip o' the Coin, a local group specializing in Irish music, will give a concert in front of the fireplace on Saturday, December 8, at 10:00 a.m. Pat Dobrinska will be here that morning, too, talking with folks after the concert about her latest picture book. And we wrap up our Year of the Bird celebrations with a program by Bill Mueller, Director of the Western Great Lakes Bird and Bat Observatory. Bill will be here on Tuesday, December 11, to talk about the birds who stick through the Wisconsin winter with us, and also to give us information on participating in the Christmas Bird Count, the longest ongoing citizen science initiative. Bill's talk begins at 6:30 p.m.

Markesan: Markesan Public Library is finishing up the last two session of our holiday make and take workshops. Some of the workshops were so successful that we had to have second sessions. We are looking forward to our open house on Friday Dec 7 from 5:00 pm to 6 pm, with music provided by Micah Sommersmith of Princeton. There will be cookies! We are working toward planning our workshops for the rest of the winter and spring. We finished our National Novel Writing Month activities. We were happy to have one person actually start writing a novel and keep it up the whole month! Rumor has it there is another writer working on a novel but could not make it to our final party. If you have ever been interested in doing research using Ancestry, come to our library and use it. We will have it available through June 2019. Also, if you are looking for continuing education, check out the Gale Courses available at all the county library's websites for no cost. We have had many positive comments from teens to adults. There is a wide variety of topics available—definitely worth checking out.

Princeton: The Friends of the Library are currently running their Christmas Sale, which ends on December 8. This coincides with the Friends Cookie Walk, which includes \$5 cookie dozens. Patrons can select from a variety of homemade cookies. And because we can't get away from the festive fun, the library has their Gingerbread Houses craft on December 15, and a cozy pajama Storytime on December 18. The front window of the library is also decorated with holiday cheer. Over the Thanksgiving weekend, the library hosted family movies, crafts, and gave away hundreds of children's books after the Christmas in Princeton Parade.

This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the Family Living Program in November of 2018. During the reporting period, the educator made 68 direct educational and professional contacts.

Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

Kids in the Kitchen, Boys & Girls Club, Berlin

As part of the fall/winter programming at the Boys & Girls Club in Berlin, I am teaching a Kids in the Kitchen cooking program. The Kids in the Kitchen program teaches kids how to cook simple, healthy snacks by learning basic cooking skills and developing healthy eating habits. I am teaching a class for each age group (K-1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th-5th grade). Each program runs for 1 hour in length with a group of 20 participants. The food that we cook depends on the age group and ability level. We have made fruit salad, apple pizza, black bean salsa & homemade tortilla chips, and fruit kabobs.



Fermentation 101, Berlin Public Library

On a mid-November evening I taught a fermentation program at the Berlin Library for 13 participants. We covered food safety and proper recipes for safe and healthy fermenting of foods. This program was a follow-up request to the canning basics program I did at the Berlin Library earlier this fall.



Community Support Program (CSP) Basic Budgeting Workshop

I was asked to teach a short basic budgeting workshop to CSP clients during their regularly scheduled session. I talked about the importance of having a budget, how to set up a budget, tracking spending, and how to limit holiday spending with 5 CSP clients.

Networking within UW Extension and Professional Development Opportunities

I made 72 contacts within the UW Extension system during the month of November. I continue to have a number of professional meetings scheduled with colleagues and mentors to continue to network and learn from my fellow Extension educators.

Taking Care of You Facilitator Training, Stevens Point

I attended the Taking Care of You training last week to become a trained facilitator. The Taking Care of You program is a four-session, community-based group program that is designed for adults of any age



and involves discussions, experiential exercises, and lessons. Participants who attend the Taking Care of You program will increase their knowledge of healthy strategies and skills to manage their stress levels and will be better able to take care of their overall health. Participants' improved ability to take care of mental, physical, and spiritual health will prevent future health conditions, reduce health care use, lower health care costs and improve community well-being. I plan to teach a least on Taking Care of You program this winter.

Report for November 2018

During this period the educator made 67 professional and educational contacts.

Farm Succession Meeting Richland Center

I was invited to present a financial tool that I had developed to other ag agents who are part of the Farm Management Team. It was a chance for me to get some feedback from my peers before I present this to the farmers of Green Lake County at the end of January.

BSE Bootcamp

Spent two days in Dane County learning about the latest technological advancements in agriculture. Topics covered were robotics, drones, greenhouse energy use, vegetable storage, bunker silos, and tractor safety.

Healthy Soils

Learned about improving soil health and water quality through use of cover crops. Discussed what cover crops to use and when also talked about how cover crops compared with commercial fertilizers. Also discussed were the pros and cons of different test methods as well as proper sampling.









<u>Green Lake County 4-H Club and Group Charters</u>—Green Lake County has nine 4-H clubs and six group charters. These clubs and groups are required by the state to fill out a charter each year and report their financials along with yearly goals. These are uploaded to the state and reviewed. This is a 4-H educator advisor role, along with support staff.

<u>4-H Horse Council Meeting, November 5</u>—7:00 pm. I attended this meeting as the 4-H representative. The president compiles the agenda. They discussed fundraising ideas for the coming year, and a possible tour of the WI Equine in Oconomowoc. They congratulated several youth for their awards at Gymkhana & the State Horse Expo. *This is a chartered 4-H club and is usually attended by the 4-H educator.*

4-H Youth Awards Program—November 11—4:00 pm. This is the county wide recognition awards program for their year end achievements. I organize the program, mail out the invitations, along with ordering awards and printing certificates. I also advise the 4-H Ambassadors on their specific tasks for hosting it. This is usually attended by the 4-H educator.



4-H Archery Project Meeting—November 13—7:00

pm. This group is very busy planning new things for

the upcoming year. They have some fundraising ideas, along with contacting some local organizations for donations. There are a couple of adults who wish to become certified instructors, which is held in April 2019. They are also brainstorming for year end recognition awards. *This is a chartered 4-H group and is usually attended by the 4-H educator.*
