The County Board of Supervisors of Green Lake County, Green Lake, Wisconsin, duly assembled at its regular meeting begun on the 17<sup>th</sup> of February 2015, does resolve as follows:

**WHEREAS**, in an effort to maximize the current workforce within the Health Unit and retain experienced staff; and

**WHEREAS**, a Public Health Nurse position will be vacating in February 2015 with the retirement of Judith Kasuboski; and

**WHEREAS**, by utilizing the funding from that vacant position, it is recommended to:

- 1) Decrease this Public Health Nurse 23 hours per week;
- 2) Increase our Community Health Educator from 12 to 23 hours per week; and
- 3) Create a Public Health Specialist position at 23 hours/week.; and

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the current full-time Public Health Nurse position at 35 hours per week be decreased to 23 hours per week, that the Community Health Educator position be upgraded and increased from 12 to 23 hours per week and that a Public Health Program Specialist position be created at 23 hours per week;

The Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual amend General Guidelines letter (d) paragraph in Appendix H of the Vehicle Usage Policy as follow (all changes in ***bold italic***):

- d. Personal use of County owned vehicles is prohibited with the exception of commuting to and from work (to the extent an employee is authorized to take a vehicle home in connection with their employment) and “de minimis” personal use, such as a stop for a personal errand on the way between a business delivery and the employee’s home (as defined by IRS regulations). Personal use of County vehicles for non-business destinations is prohibited even if the employee is in an “on-call” status, with the exception of Law Enforcement personnel, whose usage will be taxed per IRS rules. ~~Only those employees who reside in the County will be allowed to take a County vehicle home, unless an exception is granted by the Personnel Committee with recommendation by the governing committee.~~ ***An employee “on call” may take a County vehicle to his/her home if he/she resides within the required response time as set by his/her Department Head and Governing Committee in accordance with his/her job description.***

#### RESOLUTION NUMBER 3-2015

#### Relating to Providing Adequate Resources to Support County Land Conservation and Cost-Sharing for Farmers and Other Land Users

The County Board of Supervisors of Green Lake County, Green Lake, Wisconsin, duly assembled at its regular meeting begun on the 21<sup>st</sup> day of April 2015, does resolve as follows:

**WHEREAS**, the Green Lake County Land Conservation Department is the necessary local delivery mechanism for a wide range of natural resource management programs including non-point pollution control, lakes protection, invasive species control, woodland management; and

**WHEREAS**, the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation:

- Supports the concept of credit trading and adaptive management between municipalities and the agriculture community to reduce phosphorus discharge
- Urges the state to stop the spread of invasive species into Wisconsin
- Supports adequate funding to local units of government to implement the nonpoint program, provided that local regulations do not exceed state standards

**WHEREAS**, the Wisconsin Board of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection acknowledges the counties' statutory role in coordinating and implementing farm conservation standards at the local level, and supports efforts to ensure that adequate resources are available for counties to do their job; and

**WHEREAS**, County Land Conservation staff supported by state grants have decreased since the program began, and

**WHEREAS**, the Governor's budget has not requested maintenance of the staff funding allocations that were included in the 2013-15 biennial budget, thus reducing the funding to \$8 million annually in the 2015-17 budget, down from the 2001 to 2011 average of \$9.3 million; and

**WHEREAS**, the Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA) 2015 statewide policy recognizes the value of the work County Land Conservation Departments provide to farmers and Wisconsin citizens by supporting adequate resources to implement maintaining this base level of funding; and

**WHEREAS**, the inability to adequately fund local, voluntarily accepted farm conservation practices has led to environmental problems and increasing citizen suits and court decisions against farmers; now

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Green Lake County Board of Supervisors urge the Governor of the State of Wisconsin and all elected representatives in the Wisconsin State Legislature to return to the \$9.3 million appropriation for state aid to counties, recognizing the invaluable service that county conservation employees provide in helping Wisconsin farmers grow our state's agriculture while preserving the state's land and water resources for future generations.

#### **RESOLUTION NUMBER 4 - 2015**

#### **IN SUPPORT OF RETAINING AND EXPANDING WISCONSIN'S CURRENT LONG TERM CARE SYSTEM OF FAMILY CARE, IRIS, PARTNERSHIP, AND AGING AND DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTERS**

The County Board of Supervisors of Green Lake County, Green Lake, Wisconsin, duly assembled at its regular meeting begun on the 21<sup>st</sup> of April 2015, does resolve as follows:

**WHEREAS**, Governor Walker's 2015-2017 budget proposal would dismantle Wisconsin's nationally admired long term care (LTC) system currently serving nearly 55,000 older adults and individuals with disabilities; and

**WHEREAS**, The governor's budget would eliminate IRIS; replace Family Care and existing managed care organizations (MCOs) with 2-3 private health insurance companies providing both health care and LTC services; and give authority to the Department of Health Services (DHS) to privatize county-run Aging and Disability Resource

Centers (ADRCs) by contracting out many of their functions; and

**WHEREAS**, these proposals were initiated with no input from people receiving LTC services or their families, aging or disability advocates, local officials, MCOs, ADRCs, provider agencies, or legislators; and

**WHEREAS**, the current LTC system was the outgrowth of four years of intensive LTC Reform planning in the 1990's involving LTC consumers and families, aging and disability advocates, counties and state officials, resulting in strong bi-partisan support for a LTC-only version of Family Care; and

**WHEREAS**, the hoped-for reforms have actually been produced by the current system: reducing nursing home utilization, "bending the curve" on Medicaid spending, reducing the portion of Medicaid spent on LTC, and creating locally-based ADRCs to provide prevention and 1-stop information on LTC for all citizens; and

**WHEREAS**, the current LTC system has created huge saving for taxpayers while maintaining quality: reducing the Medicaid portion of the budget from 53% in 2002 to 43% in 2011, reducing the nursing home population by 9,000 people, keeping administrative costs for Family Care down to 4.2% and limiting MCO surpluses to 2%; and

**WHEREAS**, the IRIS program was started in 2008 to provide a non-managed care alternative for people who want to self-direct all of their services and this popular, unique and flexible program has grown rapidly to its current enrollment of 11,500 people; and

**WHEREAS**, ADRCs have become a nationally recognized model and one of the most important roles of county government to meet a variety of needs and reduce the cost of growing LTC population; and

**WHEREAS**, all of the projected \$14 million in saving in state and federal funds in the 2015-2017 budget are the result of current expansion of the existing LTC system into 7 northeast counties;

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Green Lake County Board of Supervisors that Wisconsin should retain its existing successful and cost-effective Models of Family Care, IRIS, Partnership and ADRCs, and should expand those models statewide to eliminate waiting lists, sustain quality, and achieve further savings; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the County Clerk shall forward a copy of this resolution to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, the Wisconsin Counties Association, and Green Lake County's Legislative Representatives with the request that they assist in this endeavor.

## INTRODUCTION

Green Lake County is a rural county with an abundance of natural areas. The county recognized in 1969 when it prepared its first outdoor recreation plan, that although it didn't have the tensions and stressors of a big-city life, the benefits from planning for public recreation and open space areas were still important.

Public recreation areas in rural counties can increase a sense of community and shared experience just as in urban areas. The diversity of recreational desires in sparsely populated areas is just as great as in denser urban areas. An outdoor recreation plan for rural counties, then, becomes critical in determining how a county with a smaller population, fewer financial resources and greater distance barriers to recreational areas can best accommodate the recreational needs of its residents. Decisions have to be made determining the scale, number, and location of facilities.

This plan will inventory what is available for outdoor recreational activities within Green Lake County, and from this information, to project and recommend what is still needed. It is a review and update of the plan done in 2009

Outdoor recreational facilities and resources provide a wide range of activities, including hunting, fishing, hiking, cycling, athletic events, camping, boating, swimming, picnicking, and ice fishing. With more leisure time and more people, the interest and needs of outdoor recreation become increasingly important. The primary purpose would be to recommend and eventually implement a program of acquisition and development that will fulfill the needs of the present, as well as the future. It is necessary to consider the needs of the tourist and the local citizens.

Duplication of facilities provided by state, municipal, and school systems should be avoided. A coordinated county-wide recreation plan is needed. Recommendations must be flexible enough to permit variation and to fit local conditions and opportunities.

The primary purpose of this plan is to recommend a sound program of land acquisition and park development that will fulfill local demands and needs. Within this recommended broad framework, the county and local municipalities can continue to proceed in an orderly manner in this parks and recreation program, knowing that all recommendations are flexible enough to permit variations accorded by local opportunities and conditions.

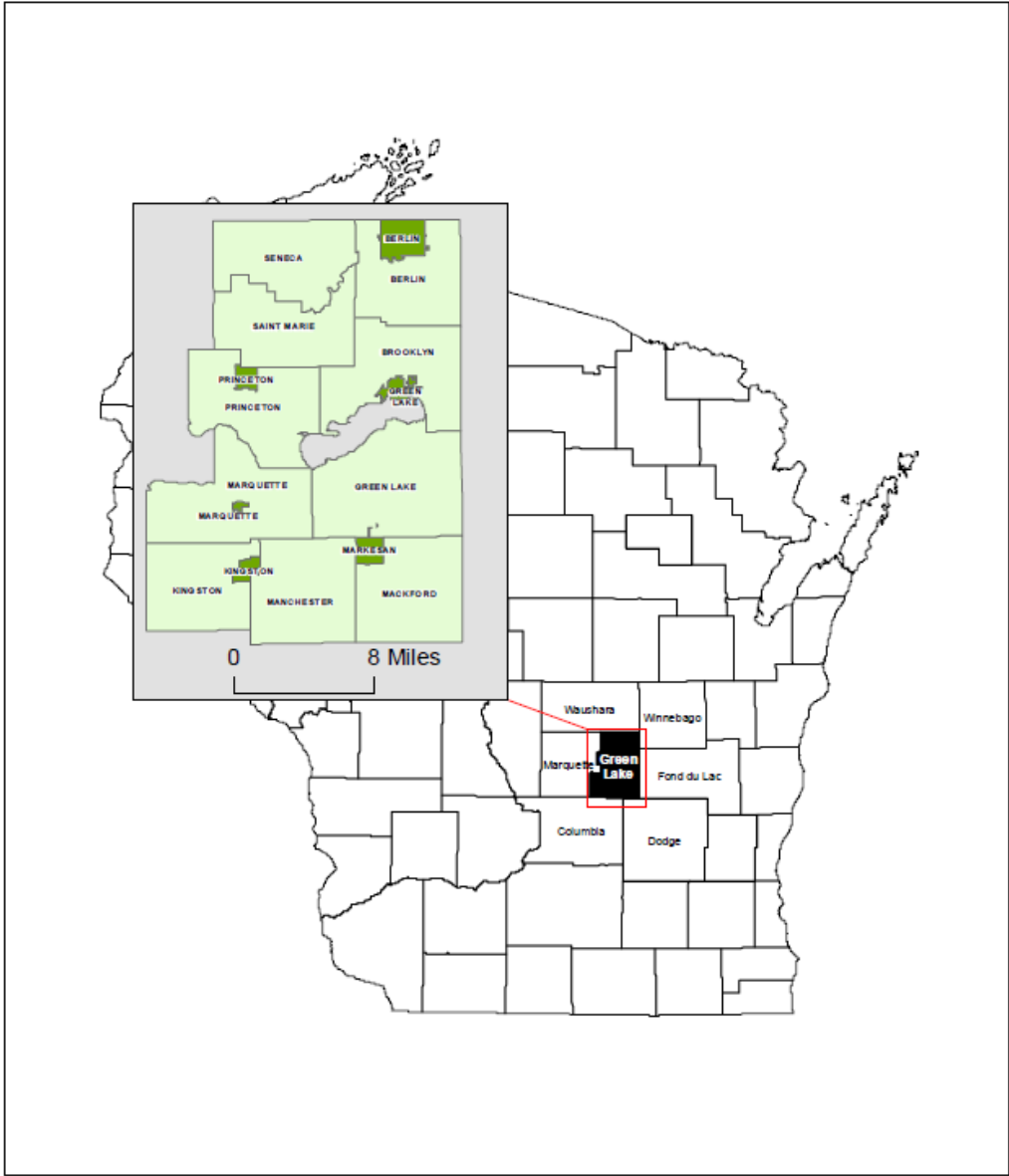
The plan is devoted to an inventory of outdoors recreation opportunities, available land, present and future needs, and recommendations to meet those needs. This plan shall be updated every five years and shall be submitted to the County Board for final approval. The plan addresses the needs of county parks from 2014-2019.

Specialized and other privately owned facilities are not included in this report, however they are listed as private enterprises.

Golf courses, greenways, historic sites, conservancy areas, and floodplains are examples of specialized recreation areas. Most of these have limited active recreation value, are either undeveloped for recreation, or are not always available for use by the public. These areas are not considered in the evaluations made for this section of the plan except in those instances where a potential for park development is identified. However, it must be realized that specialized areas are an important adjunct to a community and its park program.

## **GREEN LAKE COUNTY**

Green Lake County was established in 1858, and is located in the central part of Wisconsin. It is bordered by Waushara County to the North, Winnebago and Fond du Lac Counties to the East, Dodge and Columbia Counties to the South and Marquette County to the West. The Wisconsin Counties, Map 1, displays the location of Green Lake County within the state. The County has a land area of 226,739 acres, or approximately 349 square miles. Surface waters cover 17,120 acres, or about 8 percent of the county. . Total land occupied by farms is 154,595 acres of which 119,913 acres are under crop production.

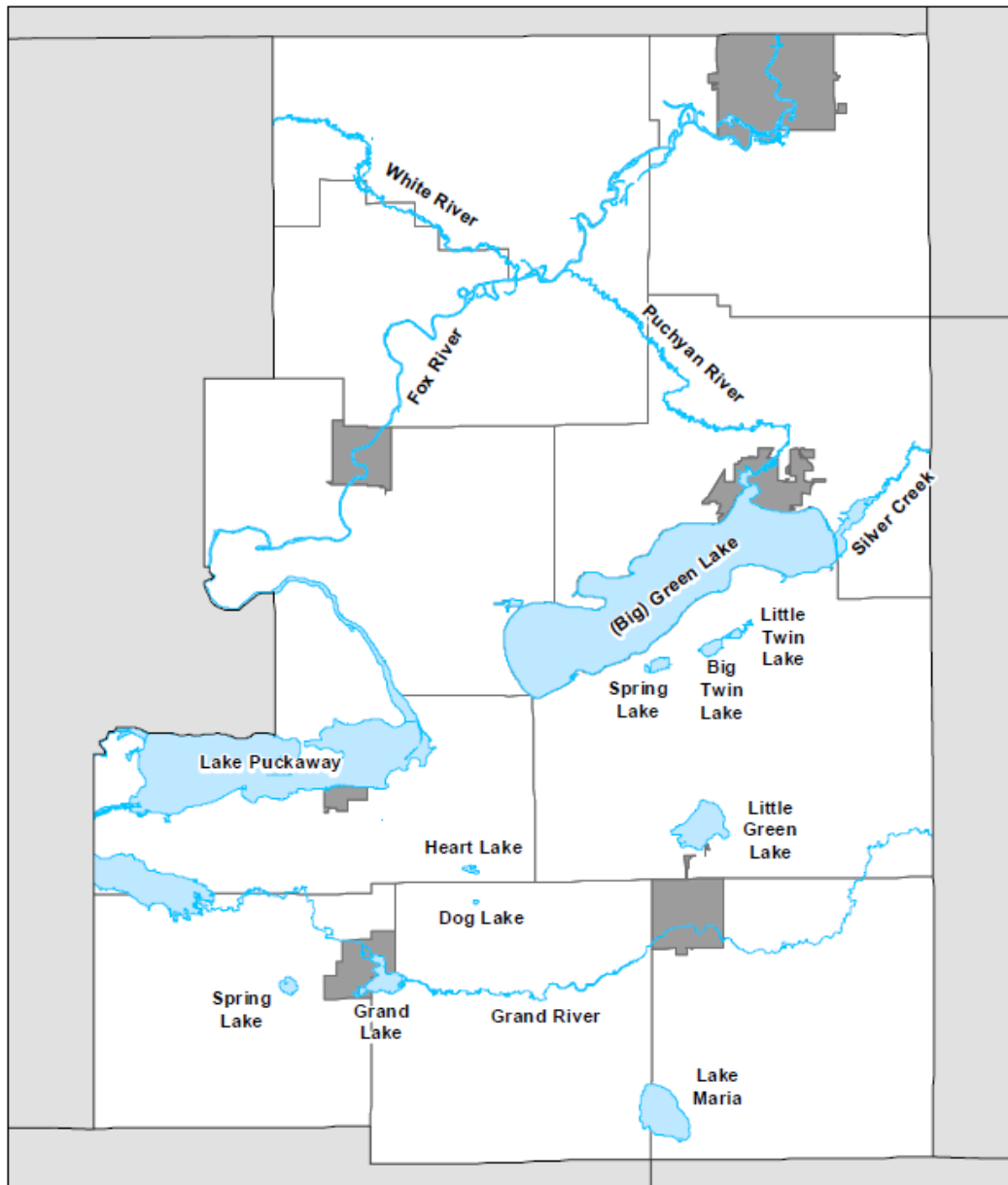

## Map 1: Green Lake County within the State of Wisconsin

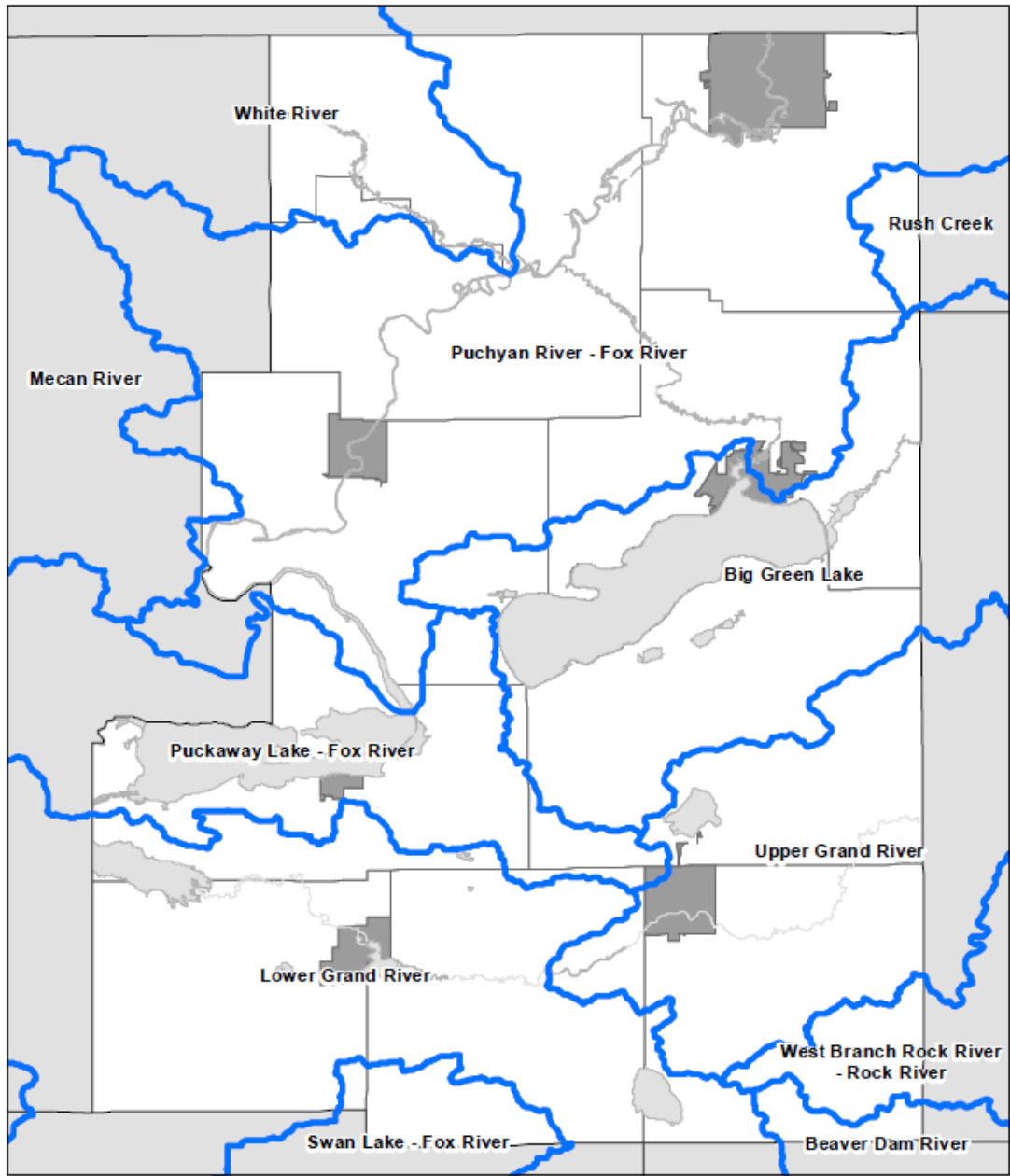
There are 36 lakes located in Green Lake County, 12 of which are named and 24 are unnamed. There are also 217.9 miles of streams and rivers. The primary rivers in the county are the White, the Puckyan, the Grand and the Fox (Map 2). All of the lands within Green Lake County drain to the Fox River, except for the extreme south-east corner of the county which drains into the Rock River (Map 3).

### Map 3: Watersheds in Green Lake County, WI

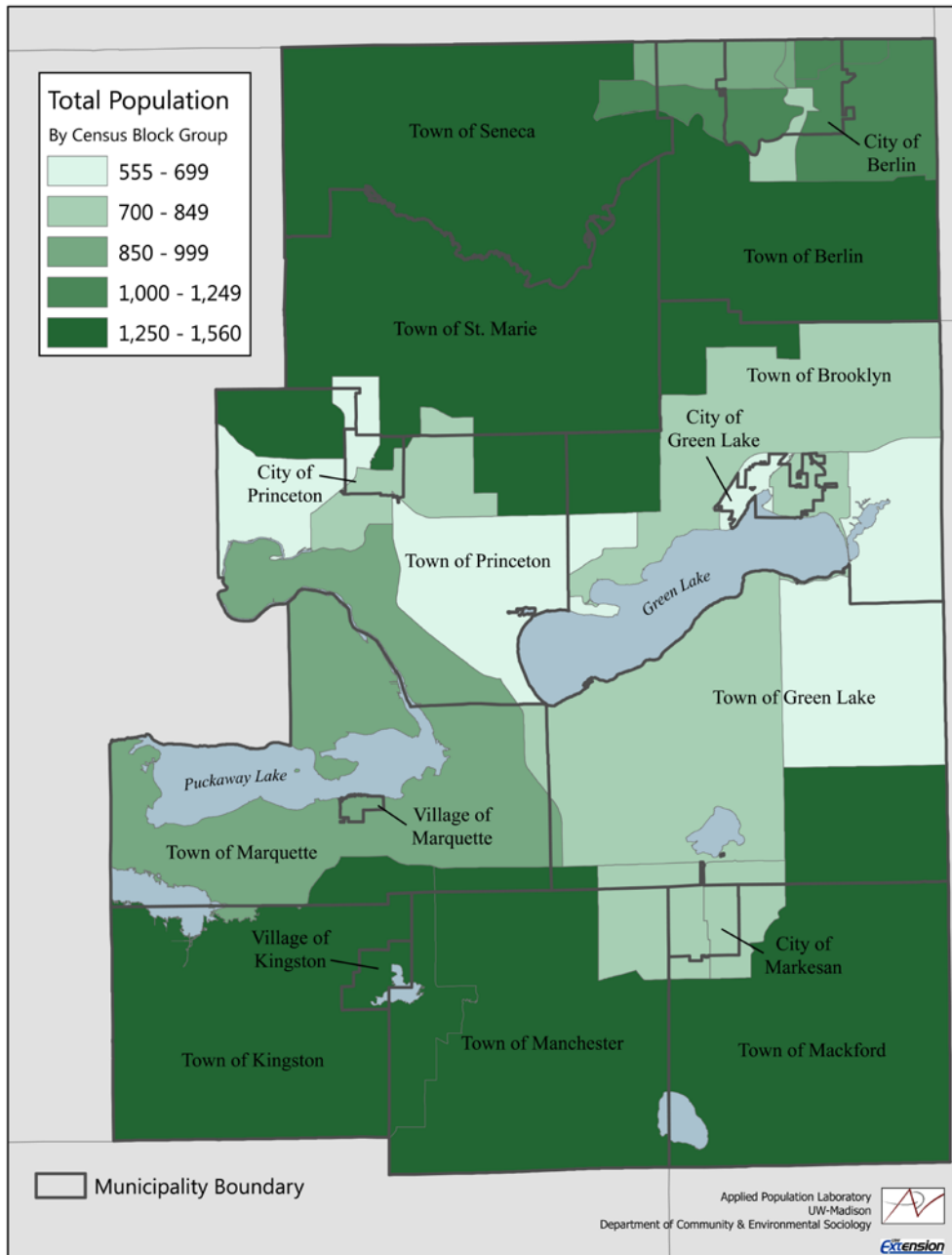
Green Lake is the largest lake in the county, occupying approximately 7920 acres, and is ranked as the seventh largest lake in the state (excluding man-made reservoirs). Being 236 feet deep, Green Lake is also Wisconsin's deepest inland lake. Lake Puckaway is the second largest lake in the county and ninth largest in the state. It covers approximately 5,013 acres.

Surface features of the county are largely the result of glaciation: ground moraine, with low hills and kettles interspaced with old glacial lakebeds and drainage ways. Bedrock escarpments and sand dunes give some diversity to this pattern. Elevations range from approximately 740 to 1080 feet above sea level.

Green Lake County contains four fourth class cities and two villages – Berlin, Markesan, Princeton and Green Lake, and Marquette and Kingston, respectively. Also ten townships – Berlin, Brooklyn, Green Lake, Kingston, Mackford, Manchester, Marquette, Princeton, Seneca and St. Marie. Table 1: displays historic and projected population estimates for Green Lake County. The 2010 Census reported that 19,051 persons were residing in the County.

## **DEFINITIONS**

### **Specialized Recreation Areas**

Golf courses, historic sites, conservancy areas, linear trails, multi-use trails (non-motorized), and floodplains are examples of specialized recreation open space areas. Most of these have limited active recreation value, are not developed for multi-purpose recreation, or are not always available for use by the public. Although such areas are not considered in acreage evaluations made for Green Lake County, it must be recognized that specialized areas are an important adjunct to a community and its parks program. As future evaluations of recreation opportunities are undertaken, it may become necessary to include consideration of specialized recreation areas.

### **County Park**

A County park is defined here as having good environmental quality and is greater in area than a community park with good accessibility by car, serving large portions of the county. These parks are usually within a half-hour drive of residents or 15 miles. It may provide a year around access for diversified multi-use recreation with a considerable amount of undeveloped land for people of all ages. It may also be developed in conjunction with some unique environmental, historical, etc. features of the county.

### **Regional Park**

A Regional Park is defined here as having unique environmental quality with good regional accessibility to surrounding counties, cities, and village residents. It usually provides year - round recreation of a passive nature with emphasis on the natural state for people of all ages.

Regional Outdoor Recreation is broken into three levels of responsibility – the State, County and Private.

### **The Role of the State**

The State's role is to provide 80 acres or 80 percent of the regional outdoor recreation. This quantity is divided into two types of open space.

1. State parks and recreation areas.
2. State forest, wildlife areas, scientific preservation areas, etc.

### **The Role of the County**

It is recommended that the counties provide 15 acres or 15 percent of the regional outdoor recreation. When land is provided by towns, basically rural in population, that land should be considered part of the county's portion to meet the standard. The County's lands are composed of two general types also:

1. County Parks
2. County forests, wildlife, or preservation areas

Although rural towns may help to meet county standards, the majority of that requirement is the role of the county.

### **The Role of the Private Sector**

It is recommended that the private sector is capable of supplying five acres per 1,000 population or five percent of regional outdoor recreation. This will not only help to satisfy the requirement of regional outdoor recreation, but will also be beneficial for economical gains. The private sector's portion is composed of golf courses, campgrounds, marinas, beaches, or conservation oriented areas.

## GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The function of all plans is to set measureable goals and objectives. Therefore, it is imperative that a community formulate goals (ends) which it hopes to attain. This section's purpose is to make explicit the goals and objectives of Green Lake County's Outdoor Recreation Plan.

Goals may be defined as general statements of desirable ends, while objectives are measurable statements of desirable ends. Objectives are usually specific, but at all times they are in harmony with stated goals. As desires and needs change, so too must goals and objectives. Goals and objectives should be subjected to a continuous refinement process.

### **#1. Outdoor Recreation**

Goal: To provide a planned system of Parks and Recreation Areas that contains a diversity of recreation activities and to maintain existing areas and park apparatus.

Objectives:

- To acquire and develop recreation lands necessary to meet the demand for recreational facilities for both permanent and seasonal Green Lake residents.
- To maximize the use of all public recreation lands within the county.
- To preserve or obtain public access to lakes, rivers, and streams and maximize their use for recreation.
- To provide shelter houses and convenience structures to support outdoor recreational activities.
- To maintain and beautify established parks through continued inspection and policing as necessary.
- To increase local recognition and pride, signs of uniform size and material should be installed at all parks and major thoroughfares leading to the parks.
- To maintain community support by providing affordable recreation programs.
- To provide facilities accessible to the elderly and handicapped.
- Multi-use trails

## **#2. Unique Natural and Cultural Resources**

Goal: To preserve scarce and valuable resources important to the ecological, sociological and economic life of the county.

Objectives:

- To encourage the preservation and enhancement of natural features of the county from encroachment by man-made development including intensive recreational development, commercial recreation and second homes.
- To conserve vegetation and trees needed to prevent erosion and floods and to protect air and water quality.
- To conserve lands with soils and terrain highly suitable for agricultural activity.
- To preserve wetlands necessary for continued fisheries and wildlife habitat and for groundwater recharge purposes.
- To conserve ecological areas with sensitive plant life or irreplaceable high quality plant and animal communities.
- To preserve unique or unusual geological features.
- To protect historic buildings, landmarks and archaeological sites significant to the heritage of Green Lake County.

## NATURAL AND CULTURAL RESOURCES

Green Lake County has a large inventory of natural and cultural resources. Some of these resources can be enjoyed without further development, while others will require improvements to achieve their full recreational potential. While these resources offer the major recreational opportunities in the county, their development must be carefully controlled so as not to destroy the very qualities that make them so unique in the first place.

### **Natural Resources**

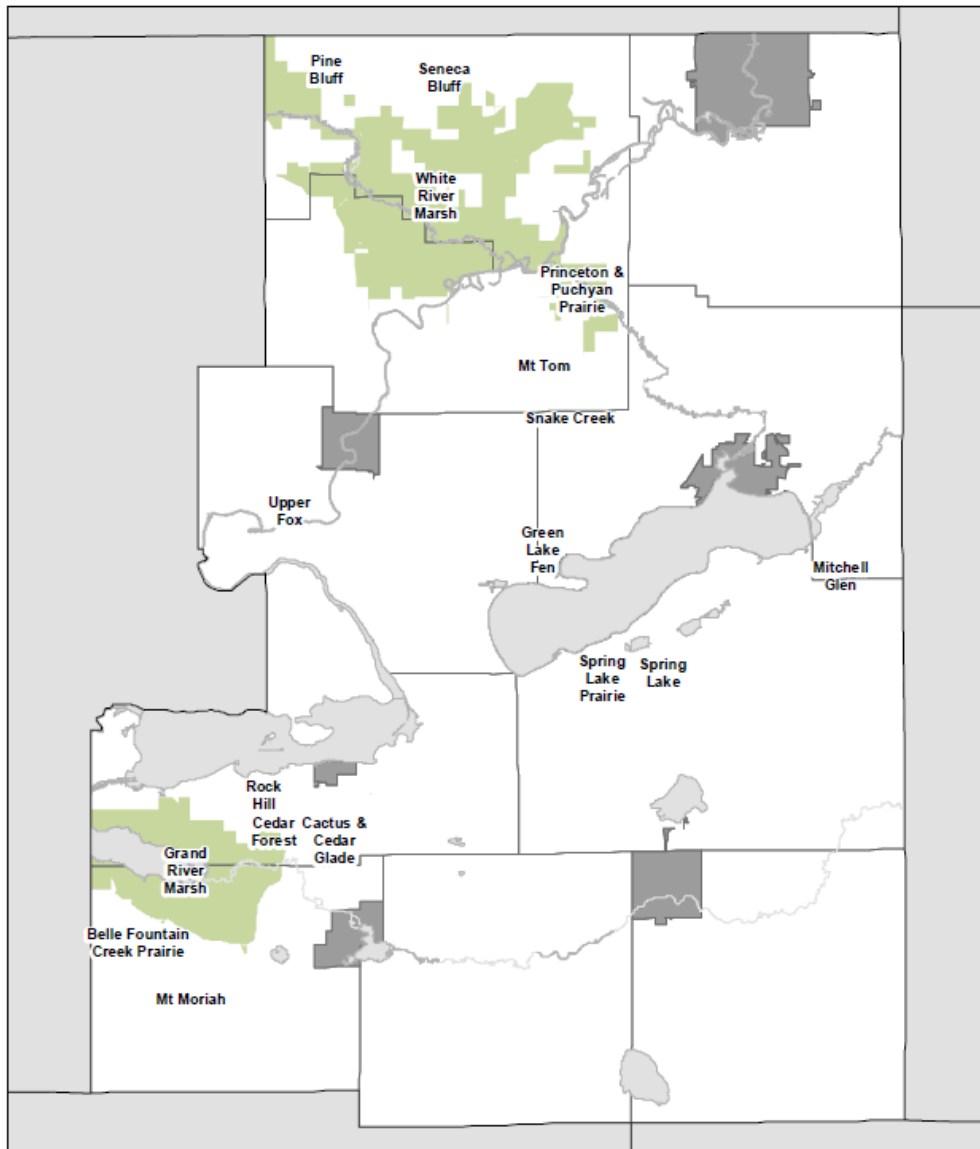
Important natural areas in Green Lake County have been identified by state and local officials and are further discussed in the Outdoor Recreation and Open Space Plan for East Central Wisconsin. Areas that have the highest environmental quality, good accessibility, and are potentially threatened by development pressures are generally viewed as the highest priority recreational and open space resources of the county.

Of the natural areas in the county, those areas having unique environmental characteristics, which the public should allow to remain as preservation areas are:

- The upper Fox River located southwest of Princeton has been identified as a regionally significant preservation area. This area, composed mostly of private ownership, should be kept in as natural a state as possible.
- The Snake Creek Corridor northwest of Green Lake has been identified as a regionally significant corridor. Methods such as conservancy zoning or floodplain zoning should be used by Green Lake County to ensure the preservation of the Snake Creek Corridor.
- The Mitchell Glen area located southeast of Green Lake has long been recognized as a natural resource preservation area. If investigation for acquisition as a public preservation area is not feasible, the private sector, which retains ownership, should be encouraged to protect the area from adverse development.

### **Cultural and Ecological Sites**

Appreciation of the unique geological, historical, ecological, and archaeological heritage of the county is a significant educational aspect of public outdoor recreation. Most locations are still unprotected and in private ownership. Many risk deterioration or destruction because of new development. Others have not been investigated since they were initially inventoried in the early part of the century and may already have been destroyed or built over. The geological, historical and ecological sites identified should be maintained in their existing condition due to their attractive unique characteristics. In Green Lake County these sites are composed of public hunting and fishing areas, geological areas, ecological areas, and historical structures or sites displayed in Map 4 and listed on Table 2.

## **EXISTING RECREATION AREAS**

Existing public recreational areas in the County total over 16,500 acres, or nearly 8 percent of the total area of the County. These areas can be divided into five major categories related to their use and ownership: conservation areas; water surface areas; county parks; community parks; and water-access areas, the largest portion of which is state owned public hunting and fishing lands (16,264.80 acres). The second largest portion is county owned recreation lands (314 acres of which 84 acres are developed). These facilities, in addition to private campgrounds, golf courses, and forest crop land, play a dominant role in supplying opportunities for outdoor recreation.

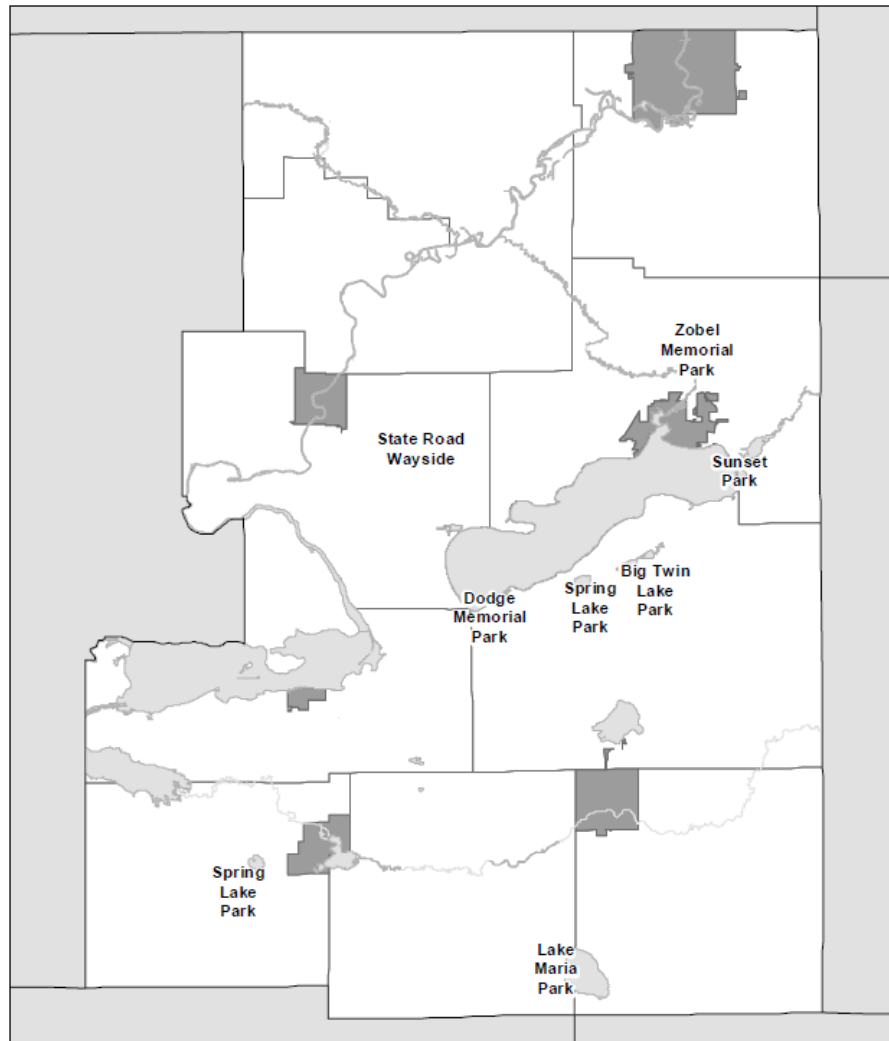
### **Conservation Areas**

Two larger conservation areas, under development by the State Department of Natural Resources, cover over 16,000 acres in the County. The White River Marsh is located in the northwest part of the County; a major portion of the Grand River Marsh is located in the southwest part of the County. The objective of both projects is the propagation of waterfowl and their harvest through controlled hunting. A smaller state wildlife area (73 Acres) is also located at Heart Lake. In recent years, Operation Migration as established their whooping crane breeding and training operations within White River Marsh . The bird once faced extinction.

### **County Parks**

The County maintains seven multi-purpose park areas providing a variety of recreation facilities and in addition, the County maintains several water-access sites. The largest of the parks is Dodge Memorial Park, on the south shore of the lake, which provides approximately 14 acres developed for intensive recreation and additional large undeveloped land and water acreage (approximately 230 acres). Spring Lake Park, located west of Kingston, is much smaller in size (totaling only four acres), but does provide beach and picnic facilities in addition to boating access. Zobel Park, containing 40 acres north of Green Lake, provides picnicking, hiking, sightseeing and nature related activities. Sunset Park on the east end of Big Green Lake is a relatively narrow park bordering County A. The park offers semi-improved boat landings, shore land fishing opportunity, restrooms and a covered picnicking shelter. The County Parks on Map 5 shows the location of each of the parks. Other parks include State Road Wayside, Big Twin Park, and Lake Maria Park.

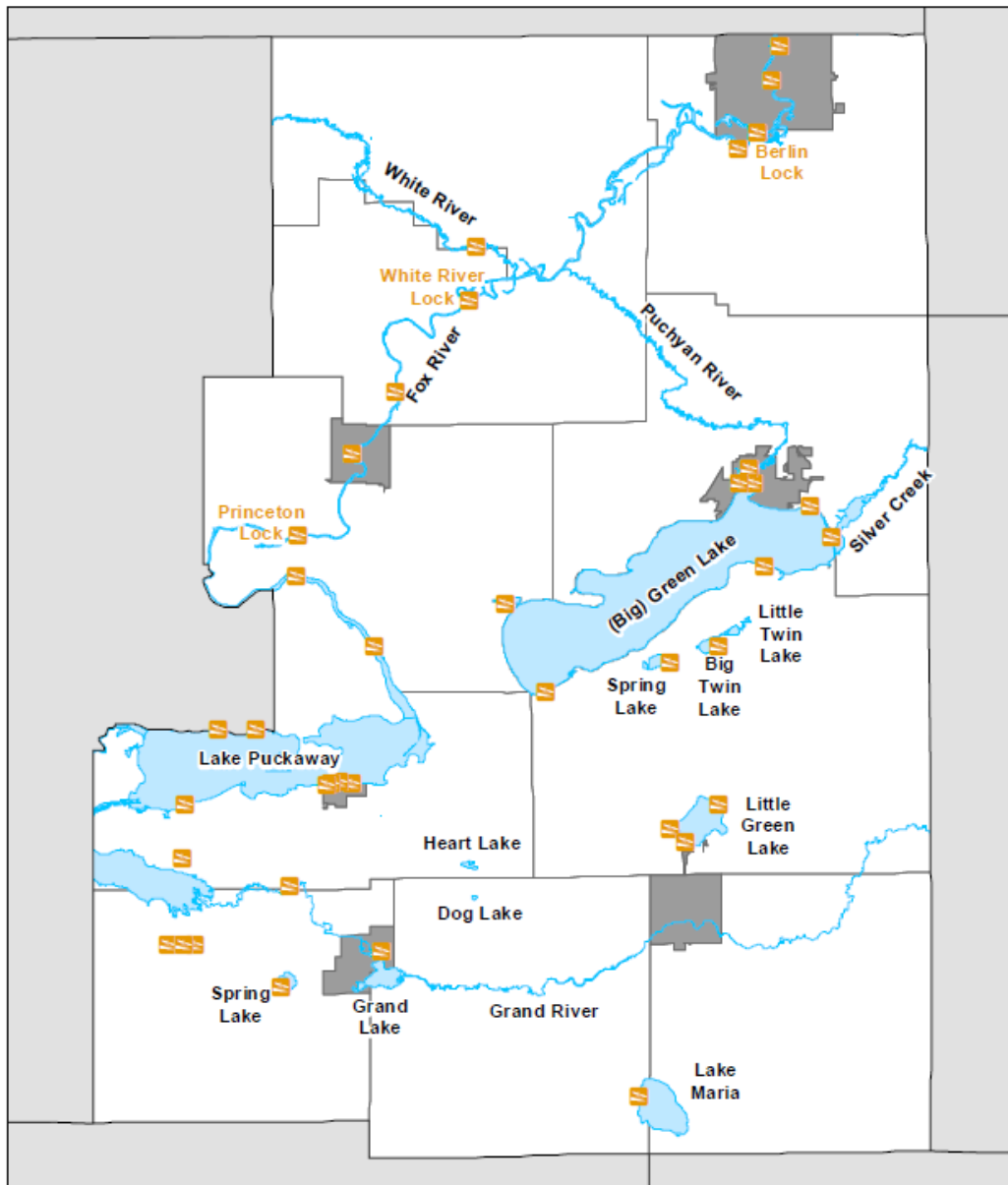

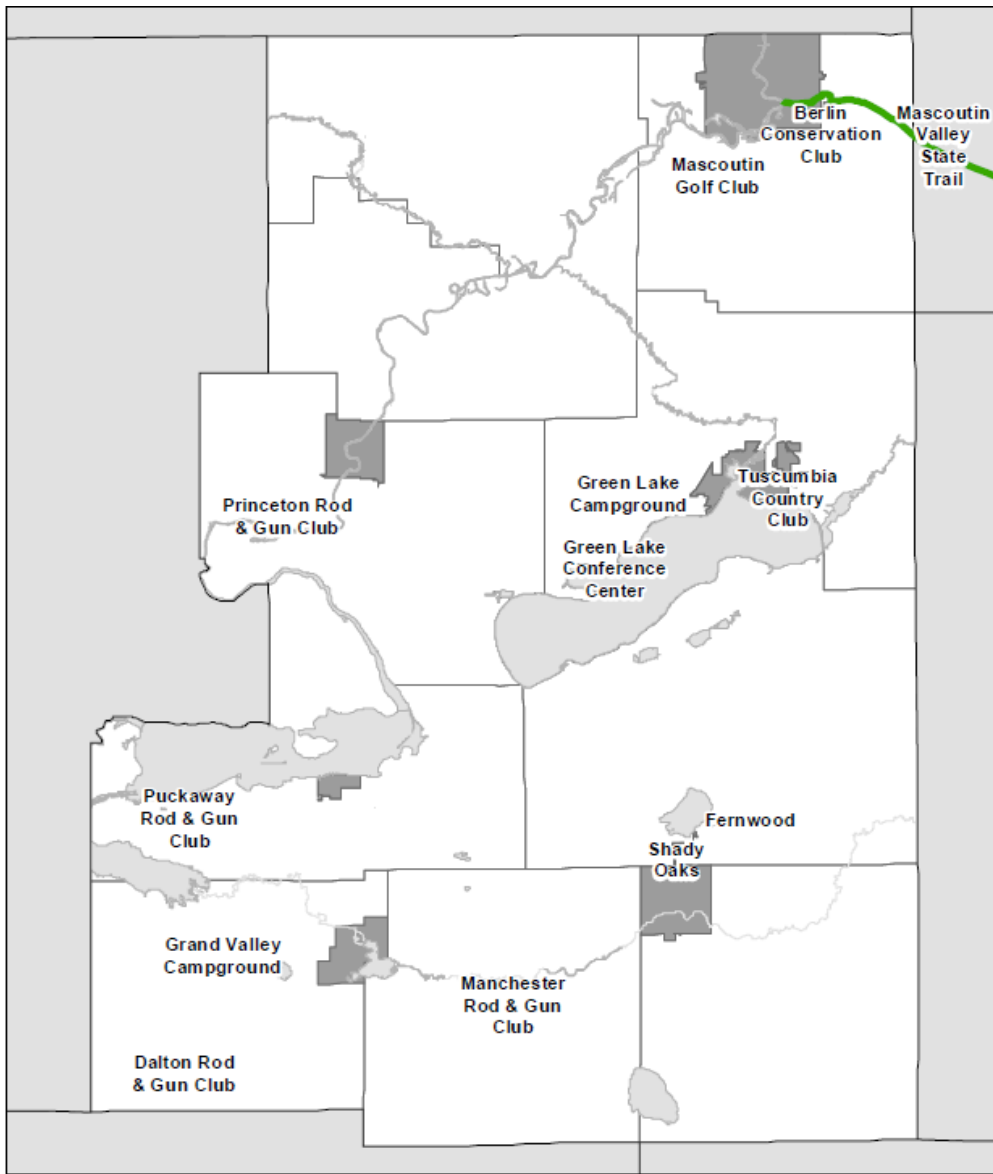

## **Public Access Areas**

In addition to the multi-purpose parks, there are a number of public areas devoted to providing boating access. Green Lake, Puckaway, and the Fox River have the largest number of such access points. Most are under the jurisdiction of township units of government. See Map 6, Boat Landings and Locks for their locations.

## **Recreation Action Program**

As previously noted in this plan, Green Lake County has had a relatively constant population over time. In 2010, Green Lake County had a population of 19,051; the County population is projected be 19,201 by 2020. It's estimated that the already substantial seasonal population has increased in the county from 30,000 in 2000 to 34,000 by the year 2010, placing further pressure on county recreational facilities.

### **Present Demand**

Extensive acreage devoted to recreation in Green Lake County is satisfactory to meet residential population demands. However, it fell below recommended standards in 2000 when you consider summer residents and tourists. One can only suggest that if the county is able to reasonably acquire additional parkland or one of the recommended preservation areas, that it be seriously considered.

Surpluses were available for activities such as camping, boating, fishing, canoeing and golfing. Private facilities are a major resource to meet many of these needs, particularly those such as golf, and camping. Fulfilling demand generated by seasonal residents and tourism depends to a great extent on development of private facilities.

### **Future Demand**

According to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, 20 percent of recreation demand in Green Lake County is generated by the resident population of the County; while 80 percent comes from tourism and seasonal development generated by proximity to Chicago, Milwaukee and the lower Fox River Valley. This demand tends to be concentrated in certain activities such as pleasure driving, boating, swimming, fishing, picnicking, sightseeing, and in the future is expected to increase the demands for hunting, fishing, camping, nature study, and biking hiking and multi-use trails.

### **5 Year Plan - Specific Recommendations** (See Appendix I)



### **General Recommendations for Existing Facilities**

- Additional picnic facilities (tables, benches, and grills) should be added to all county parks and accesses.
- Additional development facilities that may be considered are, dependent on available resources: improved boat landings, shelters, restroom facilities, parking lot improvements, landscaping and safety lighting.
- Town owned public lake accesses should be considered for improvements to the access roads and boat launch areas. This might entail new gravel and blacktopping. Units of government might in addition to the above consider the addition of picnic tables, grills and restroom facilities at these accesses, if feasible.

### **Areas that are identified as valuable county resources should be preserved.**

- Areas, corridors and sites that contain unique environmental qualities offer great potential for satisfying many outdoor recreational needs simultaneously. The preservation of these areas will be of major significance in controlling scattered development patterns, preserving wetlands and other environmentally sensitive areas for wildlife habitat and passive recreation, preserving recognized scientific areas, and serving as learning resource centers. These areas were identified in the prior section on Natural and Cultural Resources.
- For the recommended preservation areas, the county should consider maintaining all these areas in their natural state. In maintaining and, in some cases, improving these natural resources, the county should consider establishing these policies:
  - Require an evaluation of the impacts of future recreational development or other development on the natural resources of the county prior to the approval of such development.
  - For all major development projects, evaluate water quality impacts on the Upper Fox River and its tributaries to insure that such development is compatible with the maintenance of water quality standards.
- In future land acquisition activities, the county may consider one of these sites or encourage the private sector to preserve these areas through enforcement of the aforementioned policies.

### **Continued maintenance of all county parks and public water accesses with periodic replacement or upgrading of equipment and access facilities is desirable.**

- Existing facilities are serviceable and attractive and well located for residents of the county.

### **Provide a public snowmobile trail system through implementation of a Green Lake County Snowmobile Trail Plan.**

- A snowmobile trail plan that will meet county needs and at the same time link up with a region wide system should be continued and maintained. Note: the snowmobile clubs have the plan.

## **OTHER RECREATION FACILITIES**

In addition to the state and county lands, which together account for the largest proportion of parkland in Green Lake County, two other types of facilities supplement the recreation needs in the county.

### **Municipal Parks**

Each urban community within the County should continue to provide active recreation facilities for its residents. These facilities for active recreation supplement the state and county park and wildlife areas which are generally designed for passive or nature study recreation, or certain activities such as hunting or boating which draw from a wider area. Existing facilities are serviceable, generally attractive, and well located for the residents of the individual community. Continued maintenance of these parks along with periodic replacement of equipment and access facilities is desirable.

As stated earlier, there is currently a deficit of available recreational area due to the increased number of summer residents and tourists. Often these persons congregate in the municipal parks and recreation areas. This being the case it is recommended that if a municipality has the opportunity to purchase new or expand/improve existing recreational areas the county would hope they do so. These actions will allow more people to enjoy Green Lake County and will help to alleviate the deficiency in available recreational land.

### **Quasi-Public Recreation Facilities**

Since the private recreation areas in Green Lake County presently provide the only facilities for activities such as camping, skiing and golfing, continued maintenance and development of private facilities will be essential if the County is to meet recreation needs generated by tourism and seasonal residents. In particular, the County should continue to encourage the development of high quality private campgrounds to meet future needs for this activity.

## RESOLUTION No 7-2015

### Adopting the Green Lake County Service Animals Policy

The County Board of Supervisors of Green Lake County, Green Lake, Wisconsin, duly assembled at its regular meeting begun on the 19th day of May, 2015, does resolve as follows:

**WHEREAS**, in accordance with the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA), Green Lake County will not discriminate against qualified individuals with disabilities on the basis of disability in its service programs or activities; and

**WHEREAS**, the Americans with Disabilities Act does not require Green Lake County to take any action that would fundamentally alter the nature of its programs or services, or impose an undue financial or administrative burden; and

**WHEREAS**, Green Lake County is required to permit the use of a service animal by a person with a disability, unless doing so would result in a fundamental alternation of the services provided, or the safe operations of the County facility would be jeopardized; and

**WHEREAS**, Property & Insurance Committee recommends adoption of an Service Animals Policy to meet the ADA guidelines; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that Green Lake County Board of Supervisors hereby adopts the attached Service Animal Policy for Green Lake County.

## ANIMALS – SERVICE ANIMALS IN COUNTY FACILITIES

### OVERVIEW

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) prohibits discrimination against people with disabilities by public entities including any state or local government and any of its departments, agencies, or other instrumentalities. Under the ADA, the County is required to permit the use of a service animal by a person with a disability, unless doing so would result in a fundamental alteration of the services provided, or the safe operation of the County facility would be jeopardized.

### POLICY

1. "Service animal" is defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) as a dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for a person with a disability. Examples of such work or tasks include guiding people who are blind, alerting people that are deaf, pulling a wheelchair, alternating and protecting a person who is having a seizure, reminding a person with mental illness to take prescribed medications, calming a person with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) during an anxiety attack, or performing other duties.

Under Wisconsin law, a service animal means a guide dog, signal dog or other animal that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of a person with a disability.

Miniature horses that have been individually trained to do work or perform tasks for an individual with a disability is a service animal for which the County may be required to permit into its facilities subject to certain limitations.

2. Service animals are working animals, not pets.

The work or task a dog has been trained to provide must be directly related to the person's disability. Dogs whose sole purpose is to provide emotional support, well-being, companionship or comfort to an individual do not qualify as service animals under the ADA.

3. If it is not obvious what service the animal provides, only limited inquiries are allowed. County employees may ask two questions:

- Is the animal a service animal that is required because of a disability?, and
- What work or task has the animal been trained to perform?

County employees may not ask about the person's disability, require medical documentation, require a special identification card or training documentation for the dog, or ask that the animal demonstrate its ability to perform the work or task.

4. A service animal may accompany an individual with a disability to all areas of County facilities where the public is normally allowed to go. An individual with a disability may not be segregated from other customers.

If a service animal is assisting an employee who has a disability, the service animal will be permitted where employees are allowed access for purposes of employment, such as the individual's office or work area.

5. Service animals shall be vaccinated against diseases common to that type of animal. Dogs must wear a rabies vaccination tag. Green Lake County ordinance, following state law, requires all dogs to be licensed by the time they reach 5 months of age. Service dogs receive the license at no cost. Dogs must also wear a current dog license tag.
6. Service animals shall be kept under control by the owner and shall not disrupt the workplace or other activities in County facilities.

A service animal must be harnessed, leashed, or tethered, unless these devices interfere with the service animal's work or the individual's disability prevents using these devices. In that case, the individual must maintain control of the animal through voice, signal or other effective controls.

An owner must ensure the immediate clean up and disposal of animal waste.

7. A person with a disability may be asked to remove his/her service animal from a County facility is:
  - a. The animal is out of control and the owner does not take effective action to control it, or
  - b. The animal's behavior poses a direct threat to the health or safety of others, or
  - c. The animal is not housebroken.

For example, any service animal that barks or growls at other people, is disruptive during a court proceeding, or displays vicious behavior towards employees or customers may be excluded.

8. When there is a legitimate reason to ask that a service animal be removed, the individual with a disability who uses the service animal may be given the option of remaining on the premises without the service animal.
9. County employees are not permitted to provide care or food for a service animal.
10. County employees are not allowed to make assumptions about how a particular animal is likely to behave based on past experience with other animals, but instead must consider each situation individually.
11. Service dogs in training: Wisconsin law allows service dogs in training to be admitted to facilities open to the public. Service dogs in training must wear a harness OR leash and special cape and the trainer must present credentials for the dog issued by a school for dog training.

**WHEREAS**, the agreement between Green Lake County and the Central Wisconsin Housing Consortium was adopted by Resolution 10-2012; and

**WHEREAS**, Green Lake County has an identified need in the Central Wisconsin Housing Consortium to provide decent housing, and

**WHEREAS**, Green Lake County contemplates submitting jointly with Central Wisconsin Housing Consortium an application for funds under the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) housing program of the Wisconsin Division of Housing (DOH) for the purpose of meeting those needs, and



**WHEREAS**, Green Lake County and Central Wisconsin Housing Consortium desire to and are required to, enter into a written cooperative agreement with each other to participate in such CDBG program, and

**WHEREAS**, Green Lake County and Central Wisconsin Housing Consortium understand that Juneau County will act as the applicant and will have the ultimate responsibility to assume all obligations under the terms of the grant including assuring compliance with all applicable laws and program regulations and performance of all work in accordance with the grant contract.

**WHEREAS**, it is understood that the Department of Housing and Urban Development and DOH have access to all participants' grant records and authority to monitor all activities,

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, pursuant to Wisconsin Statutes 66.0301, Green Lake County and Central Wisconsin Housing Consortium agree to cooperate in the submission of an application for such funds, and agree to cooperate in the implementation of the submitted CDBG program, as approved by the Department of Administration.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that Green Lake County Board Chairman appoints a representative to serve on Consortium Housing Committee.

Nothing contained in this agreement shall deprive any municipality of any power or zoning, development control or other lawful authority which it presently possesses.

## **RESOLUTION NUMBER 12 - 2015**

Current law provides more severe penalties for battery committed under certain circumstances against certain government officials, employees and agents; and

**WHEREAS**, among those covered under these "special circumstances battery: provisions are law enforcement officers, fire fighters, and probation, parole, and aftercare agents. A person convicted of intentionally causing bodily harm to these employees is guilty of a Class H felony and may be fined not more than \$10,000 or sentenced to a term of imprisonment of not more than six years, or both; and

**WHEREAS**, proposed legislation extends the special circumstances battery provisions to a person who is employed by, or under contract with, a court, a county department of human or social services, a tribal child welfare agency, or the department of children and families to provide intake, dispositional, or other services relating to child welfare or juvenile justice workers.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, the undersigned members of the Health & Human Services Board recommend adoption of the following resolution.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Green Lake County Board of Supervisors does support proposed legislation extending the special circumstances battery provisions to a person who is employed by, or under contract with, a court, a county department of human or social services, a tribal child welfare agency, or the department of children and families, to provide intake,

A. ~~Findings and declaration of policy.~~

- ~~(1) The Green Lake County Board of Supervisors finds that storage of animal waste in storage facilities not meeting technical design and construction standards may cause pollution of the surface and ground waters of Green Lake County and may result in actual or potential harm to the health of County residents and transients; to livestock, aquatic life and other animals and plants; and to the property tax base of Green Lake County.~~
- ~~(2) The Green Lake County Board of Supervisors further finds that the technical standards developed by the United States Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service and adopted by the Green Lake County Land Conservation Committee provide effective, practical, and environmentally safe methods of storing animal waste.~~

C. ~~Purpose. The purpose of this section is to regulate the design and construction of animal waste storage facilities in order to prevent water pollution and thereby protect the health of Green Lake County residents and transients, prevent the spread of disease, and promote the prosperity and general welfare of the citizens of Green Lake County. It is also intended to provide for the administration and enforcement of the section and to provide penalties for its violation.~~

D. ~~Applicability. This section applies to the entire geographical area of Green Lake County.~~

E. ~~Interpretation. In their interpretation and application, the provisions of this section shall be held to be minimum requirements and shall be liberally construed in favor of Green Lake County and shall not be deemed a limitation or repeal of any other power granted by the Wisconsin Statutes.~~

F. ~~Definitions. As used in this section, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:~~

**~~PERMIT~~**

~~The signed, written statement issued by the Department of Land Conservation under this chapter authorizing the applicant to construct, install, reconstruct, enlarge or substantially alter an animal waste storage facility.~~

**PERMITTEE**

Any person to whom a permit is issued under this section.

**PERSON**

Any individual, corporation, partnership, joint venture, agency, unincorporated association, municipal corporation, county or state agency within Wisconsin, the federal government or any combination thereof.

**TECHNICAL GUIDE**

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Soil Conservation Service Technical Guide as adopted by the Green Lake County Land Conservation Committee.

**WATER POLLUTION**

Contaminating or rendering unclean or impure the ground or surface waters of the state, or making the same injurious to public health, harmful for commercial or recreational use, or deleterious to fish, bird, animal or plant life.

- G. General requirements. Any person who constructs, installs, reconstructs, enlarges, or substantially alters an animal waste storage facility, or who employs another person to do the same, on land subject to this section, shall be subject to the provisions of this section.
- H. Permit required. No person may undertake an activity subject to this section without obtaining a permit from the Green Lake County Surveyor/Land Development Director prior to beginning the proposed activity.
- I. Exception to permit requirement. Emergency repairs such as repairing a broken pipe or equipment, leaking dikes or the removal of stoppages may be performed without a permit.
- J. Fee. The fee for a permit under this section shall be \$100.
- K. Compliance with permit requirements. A person is in compliance with this section if he or she follows the procedures of this section, receives a permit from the Green Lake County Surveyor/Land Development Director before beginning activities subject to regulation under this section, and complies with the requirements of the permit.
- L. Standard for earthen animal waste storage facilities. The standards for design and construction of animal waste storage facilities are those in Standard 425 of the Technical Guide.
- M. Standards for animal waste storage facilities. The standards for design and construction of animal waste storage facilities are those in Standards 313 and 425 of the Technical Guide.
- N. Animal waste storage facility plan required. Each application for a permit under this section shall include an animal waste storage facility plan. Technical assistance for plan development shall be made available to applicants upon request through the Land Conservation Committee and/or its staff.

## **ORDINANCE NUMBER 1118-2015**

### **An ordinance to amend the Code of the County of Green Lake by adding Chapter 336, to be entitled ANIMAL WASTE MANAGEMENT**

The County Board of Supervisors of Green Lake County, Green Lake, Wisconsin duly assembled at its regular meeting begun on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of August, 2015, does ordain as follows:

The Code of the County of Green Lake is hereby amended by adding thereto a new chapter, to be Chapter 336, Animal Waste Management.

#### **CHAPTER 336: ANIMAL WASTE MANAGEMENT ORDINANCE**

#### **Article I Introduction**

#### **Section 336-1 Authority.**

This ordinance is adopted under authority granted by Wisconsin Statutes Sections: **59.54 (6)** (*Public protection and safety.*); **59.70(20)** (*Environmental protection and land use.*); **92.07** (*Land conservation committee, powers.*); **92.09** (*Land conservation committee staff.*); **92.15** (*Local regulation of livestock operations.*); and **92.16** (*Manure storage facilities.*). This ordinance regulates design, construction, abandonment and maintenance of animal waste storage facilities, animal feeding operations including processed wastewater, and nutrient management.

#### **Section 336-2 Title.**

This chapter shall be known as, referred to and may be cited as the "Animal Waste Management Ordinance", Green Lake County, Wisconsin and is hereinafter known as the Ordinance.

#### **Section 336-3 Findings and Declaration of Policy.**

1. The Green Lake County Board of Supervisors finds this ordinance is designed to protect and promote our agricultural industry and also to promote and enhance the aesthetic conditions and general health and welfare of the people and communities within Green Lake County.
2. The Green Lake County Board of Supervisors also finds that storage of animal waste and manure in storage facilities not meeting technical design and construction standards may cause pollution of the surface and groundwater of Green Lake County, and may have the potential to result in harm to County residents and transients; to livestock, aquatic life and other animals and plants; and to the property tax base of Green Lake County.
3. The Green Lake County Board of Supervisors also finds that improper management of storage facilities and utilization for animal waste and manure, including land application of stored animal waste, may cause pollution of the ground and surface waters of Green Lake County.



4. The Green Lake County Board of Supervisors further finds that the technical standards developed by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and adopted by the Green Lake County Land Conservation Committee (LCC) provide effective, practical, and environmentally safe methods of storing and utilizing animal related waste and manure.

#### **Section 336-4 Purpose.**

The purpose of this ordinance is to protect the groundwater and surface water resources of Green Lake County by regulating the location, construction, installation, alteration, design and use of animal waste storage facilities and animal feeding operations so as to protect the health and safety of residents and transients; prevent the spread of disease and promote the prosperity and general welfare of the citizens of Green Lake County. It is also intended to provide for the administration and enforcement of the ordinance and to provide penalties for its violation.

#### **Section 336-5 Interpretation.**

In their interpretation and application, the provisions of this ordinance shall be held to be minimum requirements and shall be liberally construed in favor of Green Lake County, and shall not be deemed a limitation or repeal of any other power granted by the Wisconsin Statutes.

#### **Section 336-6 Severability Clause.**

If any section, provision or portion of this ordinance is ruled invalid by a court, the remainder of the ordinance shall not for that reason be rendered ineffective.

#### **Section 336-7 Applicability.**

This ordinance applies only in unincorporated areas of Green Lake County.

#### **Section 336-8 Effective Date.**

This ordinance shall become effective upon adoption by the Green Lake County Board and publication as provided for in the Wisconsin Statutes.

## **Article II Definitions**

#### **Section 336-9 Definitions.**

Definitions herein are to conform to the provisions set forth in ATCP 50 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code and this ordinance.

1. ***"Abandonment"*** – A livestock waste storage facility is no longer being used for its intended purpose, and is no longer receiving animal wastes, has not received any animal wastes for a period of two years and, based on available evidence, will not receive animal wastes from an active livestock operation within the immediate future.
2. ***"Agricultural Waste Management Field Handbook (AWMFH)"*** – A manual that provides specific guidance for planning, designing, and managing systems where agricultural wastes are involved as published by the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service.
3. ***"Animal"*** – Domesticated and other types of animals together with fish and birds.
4. ***"Animal Feeding Operation"*** – A feedlot or facility, other than a pasture or grazing area, where animals have been, are or will be fed, confined, maintained or stabled for a total of 45 days or more in any 12-month period. New animal feeding operations are those that are established after the effective date of this ordinance. Two or more animal feeding operations under common ownership or common management are single operations if at least one of the following is true:
  - a) The operations are adjacent.

- b) The operations utilize common systems for the land spreading of manure or other wastes, including a manure management plan or land spreading acreage.
  - c) Manure, barnyard runoff or other wastes are commingled in a common storage facility prior to land spreading.
- 5. ***"Animal waste storage facility"*** – Concrete, steel or otherwise fabricated structure and earthen animal waste storage facility used for temporary storage of animal waste or other organic waste.
- 6. ***"Applicant"*** – Any person who applies for a permit under this ordinance.
- 7. ***"County Conservationist"*** – The director of the Land Conservation Department.
- 8. ***"Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP)"*** – Wisconsin state agency responsible for food safety, animal and plant health, protecting water and soil and monitoring fair and safe business practices.
- 9. ***"Direct Runoff"*** – A discharge of a significant amount of pollutants to waters of the state resulting from any of the following practices:
  - a) Runoff from a manure storage facility.
  - b) Runoff from an animal lot that can be predicted to reach surface waters of the state through a defined or channelized flow path or man-made conveyance.
  - c) Discharge of leachate from a manure pile.
  - d) Seepage from a manure storage facility.
  - e) Construction of a manure storage facility in permeable soils or over fractured bedrock without a liner designed in accordance with the Field Office Technical Guide (FOTG), Standard 313 (Waste Storage Facility).
  - f) Runoff from processed wastewater.
- 10. ***"Design Storage Volume"*** – The sum of the following:
  - a) Manure, bedding, waste-water, and other wastes.
  - b) 25-yr., 24-hr. precipitation on the surface of the facility.
  - c) Normal precipitation less evaporation on the surface of the facility.
  - d) Normal runoff volumes from the drainage area.
  - e) 25-yr., 24-hr. runoff volume from the drainage area.
- 11. ***"Earthen animal waste storage facility"*** – A facility constructed of earth dikes, pits or ponds used for temporary storage of animal waste.
- 12. ***"Engineering Field Handbook (EFH)"*** – A manual of engineering technical data published by the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service.
- 13. ***"Existing Storage Facility"*** – A storage facility which has been installed and placed in use at a livestock operation in Green Lake County prior to the adoption of this ordinance or prior Animal Waste Management ordinance.
- 14. ***"Feedlot"*** – A lot or building, or combination of contiguous lots and buildings, intended for the confined feeding, breeding, raising or holding of animals and specifically designed as a confinement area in which animal waste may accumulate, or where the concentration of animals is such that a vegetative cover cannot be maintained within the enclosure. For purposes of these parts, open lots used for feeding and rearing of poultry (poultry ranges) and barns, dairy facilities, swine facilities, beef lots and barns, horse stalls, mink ranches and domesticated animal zoos shall be considered to be animal feedlots. Pastures shall not be considered animal feedlots unless the area is actually an exercise lot in which vegetation cover cannot be maintained.

15. ***"Field Office Technical Guide (FOTG)"*** – The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Field Office Technical Guide that is currently in effect, and as amended from time to time.
16. ***"Land Conservation Committee (LCC)"*** – A committee made up of members of the Green Lake County Board of Supervisors and others who, by authority from Chap. **92.06** (*Land conservation committees.*), Wisconsin Statutes, determine policy and give direction for soil and water conservation activities. The LCC also provides direction for the LCD. The LCC shall be the decision making committee for purposes of this ordinance.
17. ***"Land Conservation Department (LCD)"*** – The department of Green Lake County government, which is responsible for enforcing, and providing technical and administrative support for this ordinance and soil and water conservation activities in Green Lake County.
18. ***"Malfunctioning Storage Facility"*** – An animal waste storage facility which is no longer functioning as originally intended, as determined by the FOTG, AWMFH, or the EFH (defined per Section 336-9), and poses a potential threat to any person, the groundwater, any stream, lake or river, or any other component of the environment.  
A malfunctioning storage facility includes, but is not limited to the following:
  - a) A storage facility in which the sidewall(s) or side slope(s) have been damaged or eroded, which may weaken the structure of the storage facility.
  - b) A storage facility in which there has been damage, erosion, or deformities that may contribute to environmental or safety hazards.
  - c) A storage facility in which the waste and manure is significantly leaking.
  - d) A storage facility in which any other serious deformity or activity that is not consistent with the design and function of a storage facility as determined by the FOTG, AWMFH, or the EFH (defined per Section 336-9).
19. ***"Manure"*** – Material that consists primarily of livestock, poultry or other animals' secretion and other materials such as bedding, soil, hair, feathers, rain or other water, and other debris normally included in manure handling operations. Manure includes material mixed with runoff, bedding contaminated with litter or excreta, or processed wastewater.
20. ***"Mismanaged Animal Waste Storage Facility"*** – An animal waste storage facility which is not functioning properly due to neglect or carelessness and poses a potential threat to any person or the environment. A mismanaged storage facility includes, but is not limited to the following:
  - a) An animal waste storage facility that is being operated improperly and is inconsistent with the recommended operating methods as determined by the FOTG, AWMFH or the EFH (defined per Section 336-9).
  - b) An animal waste storage facility in which the safety devices are absent or are nonfunctional.
  - c) An animal waste storage facility that fails to comply with the operations and maintenance plan.
21. ***"Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)"*** – An agency of the United States Department of Agriculture which, for purposes of this ordinance, provides Green Lake County, LCC, and LCD, and private landowners with technical assistance and information on the design criteria, size, shape, engineering strength and other necessary technical data for the proper and safe installation or closure of a storage facility.
22. ***"NRCS Certified Engineering Job Approval"*** – A complex process of review and certification by qualified NRCS or DATCP engineers to determine the capability and technical competence of subordinate personnel to design, review, provide construction supervision, and certify construction for various soil and water conservation practices to be constructed under the terms of this ordinance and which may be modified from time to time based upon work experience, educational training, employment status, and competence of those subordinates (see USDA-NRCS National Engineering Manual Title 210, Part 500).
23. ***"Nutrient Management Plan (590)"*** – A plan that outlines the management and crediting of nutrients from all sources, including legumes, manure, and soil reserves for the application of manure and commercial fertilizers.

Management includes the rate, method, and timing of the application of all sources of nutrients to minimize the amount of nutrients entering surface and groundwater. This practice includes manure nutrient testing and routine soil testing.

24. **"Pasture"** – Land with a permanent, uniform cover of grasses or legumes used as forage for livestock. Pastures do not include areas where supplemental forage feeding is provided on a regular basis, but can allow limited areas of bare soil as long as they are not significant sources of pollution.
25. **"Permit"** – The signed, written statement issued by the Green Lake County Land Conservation Department under this ordinance authorizing the applicant to construct, install, reconstruct, enlarge or substantially alter an animal waste storage facility or animal feeding operation.
26. **"Permittee"** – Any person to whom a permit is issued under this ordinance.
27. **"Person"** – Any individual, corporation, partnership, joint venture, agency, unincorporated association, municipal corporation, county, or state agency within Wisconsin, the federal government, or any combination thereof.
28. **"Processed Wastewater"** – means wastewater from the production area directly or indirectly used in the operation of animal feeding operations that results from any or all of the following:
  - a) Spillage or overflow from animal or poultry watering systems.
  - b) Washing, cleaning, or flushing pens, barns, manure pits, or other animal feeding operation facilities.
  - c) Direct contact swimming, washing, or spray cooling of animals or dust control.
  - d) Water that comes into contact with any raw materials or animal byproducts including manure, feed, milk, eggs or bedding.
29. **"Repair"** – A structural replacement or alteration of a storage facility or structure that corrects or maintains the integrity of the approved manure storage facility or structure.
30. **"Safety Devices, Storage Facility"** – Devices which are designed to protect people and animals from the hazards associated with a waste storage facility. Safety devices shall be designed and installed as required by NRCS Technical Standard 313. At a minimum, safety devices shall include:
  - a) Fences, gates, grates, or covers to restrict access of animals or people, and signs where access is possible.
  - b) Ventilation for covered waste-holding structures to prevent the inhalation of poisonous gases, asphyxiation, or explosion.
  - c) Safety stops, gates, or both installed at push-off ramps and load-out areas of vertical walled structures to prevent accidental entry of machinery.
  - d) Ramp slopes designed to be consistent with the equipment intended to be used, with curbs or safety bars installed on access ramps.
  - e) Other like devices deemed necessary by an agricultural or civil engineer registered in the State of Wisconsin, or DATCP or NRCS or LCD agricultural engineering practitioner, the FOTG, AWMFH or EFH (defined per Section 336-9).
31. **"Stop Work Order"** – An order to cease any activity in the operation of, or construction of an activity subject to regulation.
32. **"Substantially Altered"** – A change initiated by an owner or operator that results in a relocation of a structure or facility or significant changes to the size, depth or configuration of a structure or facility including:
  - a) Replacement of a liner in a manure storage structure, or
  - b) An increase in the volumetric capacity or area of a structure or facility by greater than 20%, or
  - c) A change in a structure or facility related to a change in livestock management from one species of livestock to another such as cattle to poultry.

33. ***"Unconfined Manure Stack"*** – A quantity of manure that is at least 175 cubic feet in volume and which covers the ground surface to a depth of at least 2 inches and is not confined within a manure storage facility or structure, livestock housing facility or barnyard runoff control facility or covered or contained in a manner that prevents storm water access and direct runoff to surface water or leaching of pollutants to groundwater.
34. ***"Waters of the State"*** – Those portions of Lake Michigan and Lake Superior within the boundaries of Wisconsin, and all lakes, bays, rivers, streams, springs, ponds, wells, impounding reservoirs, marshes, water courses, drainage systems and other surface water and groundwater, natural or artificial, public or private within the state or its jurisdiction, except those waters which are entirely confined and retained completely upon the property of a person as defined by Wisconsin Statutes Section 283.01(20) pollution discharge elimination, definitions.
35. ***"Water Pollution"*** – Contaminating or rendering unclean or impure the ground or surface waters of the state, or making the same injurious to public health, harmful for commercial or recreational use, or deleterious to fish, bird, animal, or plant life.
36. ***"Water Quality Management Area"*** – Any of the following:
- a) The area within 1,000 feet from the ordinary high-water mark of navigable waters that consist of a lake, pond or flowage, except that, for a navigable water that is glacial pothole lake; the term means the area within 1,000 feet from the high-water mark of the lake.
  - b) The area within 300 feet from the ordinary high-water mark of navigable waters that consist of a river or stream.
  - c) A site that is susceptible to groundwater contamination; which means any one of the following:
    1. An area within 250 feet of a private well.
    2. An area within 1000 feet of a municipal well.
    3. An area within 300 feet upslope or 100 feet downslope of a direct conduit to groundwater.
    4. A channel that flows to a direct conduit to groundwater.
    5. An area where the soil depth to groundwater or bedrock is less than 2 feet.
    6. An area where the soil does not exhibit one of the following soil characteristics:
      - (a) At least a 2-foot soil layer with 40 % fines or greater above groundwater and bedrock.
      - (b) At least a 3-foot soil layer with 20 % fines or greater above groundwater and bedrock.
      - (c) At least a 5-foot soil layer with 10 % fines or greater above groundwater and bedrock.

[Percent (%) fines is the percentage of a given sample of soil which passes through a #200 sieve (generally consisting of clay and silt)].

  - 7. An area that has the potential to be a direct conduit for contamination to reach groundwater; which means wells, sinkholes, swallets, fractured bedrock at the surface, mine shafts, non-metallic mines, tile inlets discharging to groundwater, quarries, or depressional groundwater recharge areas over shallow fractured bedrock.
37. ***"Waste Transfer (634)"*** – A mechanism designed to transfer the animal waste and manure from a barn or feedlot where livestock are kept to the storage facility and/or the loading location. The transfer system generally consists of, but is not limited to, a pump or gravity flow collection basin and a pipe leading to the storage facility and/or a pump or gravity flow system used to empty the storage facility.
38. ***"Working Day"*** – A calendar day, except Saturdays, Sundays and state and federal recognized legal holidays, on which weather and other conditions not under the control of the contractor or the county will permit construction operation to proceed with normal work force.
39. ***"Waste Facility Closure (360)"*** – The decommissioning of facilities, and/or the rehabilitation of contaminated soil, in an environmentally safe manner, where agricultural waste has been handled, treated, and/or stored and is no longer used for the intended purpose.

40. ***“Waste Storage Facility (313)”*** – Also referred to as “Animal Waste Storage Facility” and “Manure Storage Facility” – a concrete, wooden, steel or otherwise fabricated structure, or an excavated or earthen impoundment, pit or pond used for temporary storage of manure. Installation of a manure reception tank, and/or discharge pipe will be considered a manure storage facility or structure for purposes of this ordinance. Other components used in the handling of manure, such as gutters, barn cleaners, manure spreaders and livestock housing are excluded from the definition of a manure storage facility or structure.

### **Article III Activities Subject to Regulation**

#### **Section 336-10 General Requirement.**

Any person who removes, closes, locates, constructs, installs, moves, reconstructs, extends, enlarges, converts, or substantially alters or changes use of an animal waste storage facility or parts thereof, or who employs another person to do the same, on land subject to this ordinance, shall be subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

#### **Section 336-11 Construction of New or Modifications of Existing Manure Storage Facilities.**

New or substantially altered waste storage facilities shall be designed, constructed and maintained to minimize the risk of structural failure of the facility and to prevent leakage of the facility in order to comply with Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources groundwater protection standards and maintain a margin of safety of at least one foot of freeboard storage or adequate freeboard storage to the equivalent volume of a 25-year, 24-hour storm, whichever is greater.

#### **Section 336-12 Malfunctioning and Mismanaged Storage Facility.**

Malfunctioning or mismanaged storage facilities are a menace to the health and general welfare of the citizens of Green Lake County; are declared to be nuisances, and may be subject to forfeiture and any injunction provisions of this ordinance.

##### **1. Malfunctioning Storage Facility**

A waste storage facility found to be malfunctioning shall be replaced or repaired to a condition meeting the current Technical Standards of NRCS within a time frame established by the LCD. The time frame will not exceed one (1) year and compliance may include temporary emergency repairs prior to actual standard compliance as determined by the LCD. The decision of the LCD may be appealed to the LCC.

##### **2. Mismanaged Storage Facility**

A waste storage facility found to be mismanaged shall be brought into compliance with the ordinance within a time frame as determined by the LCD depending on the severity of mismanagement. The time frame will not exceed one (1) year and compliance may include clean-up of the waste as determined by the LCD. The decision of the LCD may be appealed to the LCC.

#### **Section 336-13 Waste Facility Closure.**

1. Closure of a waste storage facility shall occur in those cases where the facility ceases operation, or manure has not been added or removed from the facility for a period of 24 months. Waste storage facilities shall be closed in a manner that will prevent future contamination of groundwater and surface waters.
2. The owner or operator may retain a facility and consider it idle for a longer period of time by demonstrating to the LCD that all of the following conditions are met:
  - a) The facility is designed, constructed and maintained in accordance with Section 336-11 of this ordinance.
  - b) The facility is capable of storing the manure and all accumulated precipitation for a period of time longer than 24 months.
  - c) Future retention of the facility is warranted based on anticipated future use.
3. Any person who owns an animal waste storage facility that has been determined to be idle shall:

- a) Lower the level of the animal waste in the facility to an elevation of one foot above the floor of the facility, as determined by the LCD, within a period of one (1) year from the date the facility was determined to be idle.
  - b) Spread removed waste in accordance to a 590 Nutrient Management Plan.
  - c) Require inspection and verification of adequacy by the LCD staff or a Professional Engineer licensed in the State of Wisconsin prior to reuse as a waste storage facility if no manure had been added or removed for a period of 24 months or longer.
4. Exception to closure provision – This provision may be granted to an individual if all the following conditions are met:
- a) The facility can be breached or modified so that it no longer can impound waste or water.
  - b) The facility is determined by the LCD not to be an environmental or health hazard.

#### **Section 336-14 Failing and Leaking Existing Facilities.**

Waste storage facilities that may pose an imminent threat to public health or fish and aquatic life or that are causing a violation of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources groundwater protection standards shall be upgraded, replaced or closed in accordance with this ordinance.

#### **Section 336-15 Agriculture Performance Standards and Prohibitions.**

##### **1. Manure Management Prohibitions**

Any person owning or managing a livestock operation within Green Lake County shall manage their operations so as to prohibit any of the following:

- a) The overflow of manure storage structures.
- b) Any unconfined manure stacking (piling) within water quality management areas (adjacent to stream banks, lakeshores, and in drainage channels.)
- c) The direct runoff from feedlots or stored manure to waters of the state.
- d) The unlimited livestock access to waters of the state where high concentrations of animals prevent adequate sod cover maintenance.

##### **2. Processed Wastewater Handling Performance Standard**

- a) There may be no significant discharge of processed wastewater to waters of the state as determined by the LCD.

##### **3. Human Waste Prohibition**

Human waste and associated wastewater shall not be discharged into animal waste storage facilities unless permitted by applicable federal, state, or local regulations for the disposal of human waste and wastewater.

### **Article IV Technical Standards**

#### **Section 336-16 Standards, Specifications and Policies.**

The standards of the Field Office Technical Guide are adopted and by reference made a part of this article as if fully set forth therein. Any future amendments, revisions or modifications of the standards incorporated herein are made a part of this article, unless otherwise acted upon by the LCC. A copy of these standards can be obtained from the LCD or viewed on line at [www.wi.nrcs.usda.gov/technical/](http://www.wi.nrcs.usda.gov/technical/).

#### **Section 336-17 Standards for Waste Storage Facilities.**

The standards for design and construction of a manure storage structure or facility are those found in the most recent version of Standards: 313 (Waste Storage Facility) and 634 (Waste Transfer) of the Field Office Technical Guide, as

amended or supplemented. Construction Specifications referenced within the above listed standards shall also be adhered to.

#### **Section 336-18 Standards for Land Application of Manure.**

The standards for management and utilization of manure through land application with regard to preventing water pollution is found in the most recent version of Standard 590 (Nutrient Management) of the Field Office Technical Guide.

#### **Section 336-19 Standards for Waste Facility Closure.**

The standards for closure of a manure storage facility is found in the most recent version of Standard 360 (Waste Facility Closure) of the Field Office Technical Guide, as amended or supplemented.

#### **Section 336-20 Standards for Construction Site Erosion Control.**

The standards for controlling soil erosion from construction sites are found in the most recent version Chapter 284 of the County Code, as amended or supplemented.

#### **Section 336-21 Standards for Processed Wastewater.**

The standards for design and construction of a processed wastewater system are found in the most recent version of Standards: 629 (Waste Treatment), 634 (Waste Transfer), and 635 (Vegetated Treatment Area) of the Field Office Technical Guide, as amended or supplemented.

### **Article V Application For and Issuance of Permits**

#### **Section 336-22 Animal Waste Storage Facility Permit Generally.**

No animal waste storage facility, or parts thereof, may be constructed, substantially altered, or closed without:

1. An animal waste storage facility permit as provided in this article and,
2. Compliance with the provisions of this ordinance.

The requirements of this article shall be in addition to any other ordinance or administrative rule regulating manure storage or applicable technical standards. In the case of conflict, the most stringent provisions shall apply.

#### **Section 336-23 Exceptions for Pre-existing Waste Storage Facilities.**

The following constitute exceptions to the requirement under this ordinance to obtain a permit:

1. Pre-existing waste storage facility, except where substantially altered, or closed.
2. Operation and maintenance on a waste storage facility.
3. Emergency equipment repairs on a waste storage facility.
4. Emergency repairs such as repairing a broken pipe, or equipment, leaking dikes, or the removal of stoppages may be performed without an animal waste storage facility permit.  
If repairs will substantially alter the original design and construction of the facility as determined by the LCD, a permit will be required.
5. An exception to closure provision is granted.
6. Other required corrective action is from feedlots, animal feeding operations, or processed waste facilities.

#### **Section 336-24 Permit Fee.**

Any person who by this ordinance is required to obtain a permit, shall pay a fee for such permit to help defray the cost of administration, inspection, and processing of permits. The amount of the fee shall be established from time to time by the LCC.

#### **Section 336-25 Animal Waste Storage Facility Plan Required.**



Each application for a permit under this ordinance shall include an animal waste storage facility plan. The plan shall be in accordance with the current Technical Standard 313 (Waste Storage Facility) and 634 (Waste Transfer). The plan shall specify:

1. A management assessment is required. As part of this assessment an initial determination will be conducted to demonstrate that suitable land base is available for utilization of waste.
2. The number and kinds of animals for which waste storage is provided, the duration for which storage is to be provided, or daily gallons and/or cubic feet of waste and manure produced.
3. A plan view of the facility and its location in relation to waste transfer inlet, all buildings, roads, wells, lot lines, and other features within three hundred (300) feet of the proposed facility. The plan view shall be drawn to scale, with a scale no smaller than 1 inch = 100 feet.
4. The structural details, including but not limited to dimensions, cross-sections, and concrete thickness, concrete joint design and placement, design loads, design computations, reinforcement schedules, thickness and placement of groundwater protection liners, and all material specifications.
5. The soil test pit locations and soil descriptions to a depth of at least five feet below the planned bottom of the facility.
6. The elevation of seasonally high groundwater or bedrock if encountered in the soil profile and date of any such determination.
7. Provisions for adequate drainage and control of runoff to prevent pollution of surface water and groundwater. If waters of the state lie within 500' of the facility, the location and distance to the body of water shall be shown. Any flood plains and/or wetlands shall be located also.
8. The scale of the drawing and a north arrow.
9. A time schedule for construction of the facility.
10. A description and construction plan of the method *to be used* in transferring animal waste into and from the facility.
11. A 590 Nutrient Management Plan: the plan shall specify the utilization of the animal waste, including the amount of land available for application of waste, identification of the areas where the waste will be used, crops, crop rotation, pastures, application rates, soil types and any limitation on waste application due to soil limitations, type and proximity of bedrock or water table, slope of land, and proximity of surface water.

A nutrient management plan agreement shall be completed by the landowner. The agreement states that the plan shall be submitted to the LCD no later than March 15<sup>th</sup> of the year following installation of the animal waste storage facility and that the plan shall be updated annually for the life of the waste storage or as long as the cropland and/or pasture are receiving sources of nutrients.

12. Other additional information required by Field Office Technical Standard 313 (Waste Storage Facility) or LCD staff to comply with this ordinance.

### **Section 336-26 Closure Plan Required.**

Each application for a closure permit under this section shall include a closure plan.

The plan shall be in accordance with the current Technical Standard 360 (Waste Facility Closure), and specify:

1. A description of the type and size of the manure storage facility and an estimate of the amount of manure in the facility.
2. A description of how and where the manure and soil saturated with manure will be land applied in accordance with the current Field Office Technical Standard 590 (Nutrient Management).
3. A description of how the liner, if any, will be disposed of.
4. A description of how the waste transfer system will be removed or permanently plugged.
5. A description of how the excavated area will be filled in and where the clean fill will come from.
6. A plan view showing the final grade, the area to be reseeded, and how rain and runoff will be diverted away from the site.
7. Other additional information required by the Field Office Technical Standard 360 (Waste Facility Closure) or LCD staff to comply with this ordinance.

### **Section 336-27 Review of Application.**

The LCD shall receive and review all permit applications and shall determine if the proposed facility meets required standards set forth in this ordinance or applicable regulations. Within thirty (30) working days after receiving the completed application and fee, the LCD shall inform the applicant in writing whether the permit application is approved or disapproved. If additional information is required, the LCD shall notify the permit applicant. The LCD has thirty (30) working days from the receipt of the additional information in which to approve or disapprove the application. If the LCD fails to approve or disapprove the permit application in writing within thirty (30) working days of the receipt of the permit application or additional information, as appropriate, the application shall be deemed approved, and the permit issued for the project as described in the permit application.

### **Section 336-28 Permit Conditions.**

All permits issued under this ordinance shall be issued subject to the following conditions and requirements, or as specified by the LCD:

1. Activities authorized by permit shall be completed within two (2) years from the date of issuance after which such permit shall be void.
2. Animal waste storage facility and its waste transfer system design, construction, management and utilization activities shall be carried out in accordance with the animal waste facility plan and applicable standards specified in this ordinance. The plan shall be certified as meeting the requirements of this ordinance by a Professional Engineer licensed in the State of Wisconsin, or DATCP or NRCS or LCD agricultural engineering practitioner (defined per Section 336-9).
3. Animal waste storage facility removal or closure shall be carried out in accordance with the animal waste storage facility closure plan and applicable standards specified in Section 336-26 of this ordinance. The plan shall be certified as meeting the requirements of this ordinance by a Professional Engineer licensed in the State of Wisconsin, or DATCP or NRCS or LCD agricultural engineering practitioner (defined per Section 336-9).
4. The permittee shall give five (5) working days written notice to the LCD before starting any construction activity authorized by the permit.
5. Approval in writing must be obtained from the LCD prior to any changes or modifications to the approved animal waste facility plan.
6. Prior to use, a Professional Engineer licensed in the State of Wisconsin, or DATCP or NRCS or LCD agricultural engineering practitioner (defined per Section 336-9) and the permittee and if applicable, the contractor, shall certify in writing on forms provided by the LCD that the storage facility was installed as planned, including as-built dimensions and changes or modifications as authorized during construction per Section 336-27 (5) of this ordinance.
7. The LCD and/or NRCS shall provide on-site inspection. Final approval signature for all projects under this ordinance shall be provided by the LCD.

### **Section 336-29 Permit Revocation.**

The County Conservationist or that person's representative may revoke any permit issued under this ordinance if the holder of the permit has misrepresented any material fact in the permit application, animal waste facility plan or nutrient management plan, or if the holder of the permit violates any of the conditions of the permit.

## **Article VI Administration and Enforcement**

### **Section 336-30 Administration.**

1. **Delegation of Authority**  
Green Lake County hereby designates the Green Lake County Land Conservation Department to administer and enforce this ordinance.
2. **Administrative Duties**

In the administration and enforcement of this ordinance, the LCD shall:

- a) Keep an accurate record of all permit applications, animal waste storage facility construction and abandonment plans, permits issued, inspections made, and other official actions.
- b) Review permit applications, construction plans, "as-built plans" and issue permits in accordance with this ordinance.
- c) Inspect manure storage facility construction to ensure the facility is being constructed according to plan specifications.
- d) Inspect manure storage facility closure to ensure the facility is being closed according to plans and specifications.
- e) Investigate complaints relating to compliance with this ordinance.
- f) Perform other duties as specified in this ordinance.
- g) Provide technical services to the applicant to the extent resources are available.
- h) Monitor and inspect a minimum of every three (3) years the adequacy of manure storage systems including compliance with nutrient management plans.

3. **Inspection Authority**

- a) The Green Lake County LCC and their agents being the LCD are authorized to enter upon any lands affected by this ordinance to inspect the land prior to or after permit issuance to determine compliance with this ordinance. If permission cannot be received from the landowner or their authorized representative, entry by the Green Lake County LCD shall be according to Wisconsin Statutes Section **92.07(14)** (*Land conservation committee, powers.*).
- b) Entry by the County Conservationist or a designated representative may also be according to Wisconsin Statutes Section **66.0119** (*Special inspection warrants.*). Refusal to grant permission to enter lands affected by this article for purposes of inspection may be grounds for denial of the permit or revocation thereof.

**Section 336-31 Enforcement.**

1. **Enforcement Authority**

- a) The County Conservationist, or that person's representative is authorized to post an order stopping work upon land which has had a permit revoked or is currently undergoing activity in violation of this ordinance. Notice shall be given by both: posting, upon the land where the violation occurs, one or more copies of a poster stating the violation; and, by mailing a copy of the order by certified mail to the landowner and/or their authorized representative whose activity is in violation of this ordinance. The order shall specify that the activity shall cease and/or be brought into compliance within a specified time period.
- b) Any permit revocation or order stopping work shall remain in effect unless retracted by the LCC, the County Conservationist or a designated representative, or by a court of general jurisdiction; or until the activity is brought into compliance with this ordinance. The County Conservationist is authorized to refer any violation of this ordinance or of an order stopping work issued pursuant to this article to the Corporation Counsel for commencement of legal proceedings.

**Article VII Violations**

**Section 336-32 Penalties.**

Any person who intentionally violates, neglects, or refuses to comply with or resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this article shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than \$100.00 nor more than \$1,000.00 plus the costs of prosecution for each violation. An unlawful violation includes failure to comply with any standard of this article or with any condition or qualification attached to the permit. Each day a violation exists shall be a separate offense.

**Section 336-33 Enforcement by Injunction.**

As a substitute for or in addition to forfeiture actions, the county may seek enforcement of any part of this ordinance by court actions seeking injunctions or restraining orders.

## **Article VIII Appeals and Variances**

### **Section 336-34 Appeals.**

#### **1. Authority**

Under authority of Wisconsin Statutes Chapter **68** (*Municipal administrative procedure.*), created under Wisconsin Statutes Section **59.70(19)** (*Environmental protection and land use.*), and acting as an appeal authority under Wisconsin Statutes Section **68.09(2)** (*Review of determination.*), LCC is authorized to hear and decide appeals where it is alleged there is error in any order, requirement, decision or determination by the LCD in administering this ordinance.

#### **2. Who May Appeal**

Appeals may be taken by any person having a substantial interest that is adversely affected by the order, requirement, decision or determination made by the LCD.

#### **3. Procedure**

The rules, procedures, duties and powers of the LCC and provisions of Wisconsin Statutes Chapter **68** (*Municipal administrative procedure.*), shall apply to appeals under this article.

- a) A request for an appeal shall be filed with the LCD within (thirty) 30 days of action or decision to be appealed. The appeal request shall specify whether an interpretation of this ordinance or a variance is sought and the grounds thereof.
- b) The appeal shall be heard by the LCC at a regularly scheduled meeting with public notice as required by Wisconsin Statutes Section **19.81** (*Declaration of policy.*). The appeal shall be heard within sixty (60) days of the date the appeal is filed with the LCD. A copy of the meeting notice shall be sent to the applicant. The LCD shall transmit to the LCC all documents constituting the record from which the appeal was taken.
- c) A written decision regarding the appeal shall be made within forty-five (45) days of appeal hearing.
- d) The final decision on an appeal shall be in the form of a written determination signed by the chairperson or vice-chair of the LCC. The determination shall state the specific facts that are the basis for the LCC's decision and shall affirm, reverse, vary or modify the order, requirement, decision or determination appealed, in whole or in part; deny the appeal for lack of justification; or grant or deny the application for a variance. The reasons or justification for granting an appeal that was demonstrated by the applicant in the case of a variance shall be clearly stated in the recorded minutes of the LCC meeting.
- e) The decision of the LCC may be appealed to the circuit court as set forth in the Wisconsin Statutes Section **68.13** (*Judicial review*).

### **Section 336-35 Variances.**

The LCC may upon appeal authorize a variance from the requirements of this article when, upon showing by the applicant, unnecessary hardship would result from literal enforcement of this ordinance. The granting of a variance for unnecessary hardship shall:

1. Be consistent with the spirit and purpose of this ordinance as stated in Section 336-4 of the ordinance.
2. Not permit an activity or practice that may fail structurally or otherwise and cause significant water pollution or other off-site impacts.
3. Be due to unique circumstances and not to the general conditions of the area.
4. Not be granted for a self-created hardship.
5. Not be granted unless it is shown that the variance will not be contrary to the public interest and will not be damaging to the rights of other persons.
6. Not be granted solely on the basis of economic gain or loss.
7. Not be granted solely on the fact that certain conditions existed prior to the effective date of the ordinance.

The LCC may authorize a variance from the requirements of this article contingent on the applicant's receiving a variance from the technical standards through the Natural Resource Conservation Service or other qualified

engineering authority. The LCC may also authorize a variance from the requirements of this ordinance contingent on the LCC receiving a variance from the state performance standards through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

**RESOLUTION NUMBER 13-2015**

Relating to Supporting Assembly Bill 210 – Local Transportation Revenues

The County Board of Supervisors of Green Lake County, Green Lake, Wisconsin, duly assembled at its regular meeting begun on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of September, 2015 does resolve as follows:

**WHEREAS**, on Monday April 20<sup>th</sup>, 2015 Representative Dean Knudson and Senator Tom Tiffany introduced legislation entitled Assembly Bill 210 – Local Transportation Revenue; and

**WHEREAS**, this legislation allows for the following provisions in law:

- That if the voters in a county or municipality approve it at a spring or fall general election, the county or municipality may levy a 0.5 percent sales tax for the purpose of maintaining and repairing roads.
- The tax may not last longer than four years, but may be renewed at referendum.
- The measure may only appear on the ballot in a spring or fall general election.
- The money collected may only be used for road repair or maintenance.
- The bill includes maintenance-of-effort language based on a three-year rolling average of previous spending on road repair.
- If the tax is allowed to expire, or is rejected by voters, there is a mandatory one-year “cooling off period” before the county or municipality can place the proposal on the ballot again; and

**WHEREAS**, the Legislative Reference Bureau provided the following analysis as it pertains to this proposed legislation:

- Under current law, a county may impose sales and use tax at the rate of 0.5 percent of the sales price of tangible personal property, goods, and services sold or used in the county. The county sales and use tax may be imposed only for the purpose of reducing the county’s property tax levy.
- Under the bill, with the approval of the electors in the county at a referendum, a county may impose an additional sales and use tax at the rate of no more than 0.5 percent of the sale price of tangible personal property, goods and services sold or used in the county for maintenance of streets and highways.
- A municipality may also impose the tax for the same purpose. The county or municipality may impose the tax for four years. If the county or municipality wishes to extend the tax, it must be approved again at a referendum. Finally for each year in which a county or municipality imposes the tax, the county or municipality must expend on highway or street maintenance and repair **no less than\*** an amount equal to the average of the amount it spent for each purposes in the previous five years; and

**WHEREAS**, the Wisconsin Counties Association and the League of Wisconsin Municipalities are in support of this measure.

**WHEREAS**, that the Wisconsin Counties Association, in conference assembled, does hereby support this legislation, as proposed by Representative Knudson and Senator Tiffany, with the additional provision that all expenditures associated with this legislation be “lock-box-only” for enumerated highway projects as contained in the municipality’s yearly-approved highway or street budget.



**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that Green Lake County Board of Supervisors hereby supports the legislation allowing the county to apply a 0.5 percent sales tax, which will be used for highway improvement projects.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Chairman of the Green Lake County Board of Supervisors be directed to disseminate this resolution to Governor Walker's Office and Representatives Keith Ripp and Joan Ballweg and Senator Luther Olsen.

The Administrative Manual be amended as follows (all changes added in ***bold italic***):

##### **Amend –Section IV Recruitment and Hiring, C. Vacant Positions.**

The County acknowledges that there may be situations when specific levels of staffing are required to meet ~~local~~, state and/or federal requirements. When specific levels of staffing are required, these levels of staffing may be maintained and will not require the position review process. The Department Head/Administrative Coordinator must provide the governing committee and Personnel Committee with evidence of the minimum staffing requirements in order to move forward with the hiring process without a position review. ***The Sheriff's Office 24/7 Communications and Corrections Personnel have met this minimum staffing requirement. Vacancies in those positions may be filled immediately without authorization.***

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED** that this Ordinance shall become effective upon posting and publication.

#### **ORDINANCE NUMBER 1120 -2015**

##### **Relating to an Ordinance Amending the Code of Green Lake County, Chapter 187 Parks and Recreation: Hunting, Trapping and Enforcement**

The County Board of Supervisors of Green Lake County, Green Lake, Wisconsin, duly assembled at its regular meeting begun on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of September, 2015, does ordain as follows:

Chapter 187 Article III "Green Lake County Parks and Recreational Areas Ordinance" be amended to prohibit hunting in all County parks, to prohibit trapping on County owned lands including County parks, to permit hunting on County owned lands that are not County parks, to modify pet provisions in Green Lake County Parks and to establish enforcement provisions for violations of all Chapter 187 regulations.

The amendment to the Green Lake County Parks and Recreational Areas Ordinance is made in the public interest.

**See attached language for proposed amendments.** Regular font will remain. **Bold** font is the amended language. ~~Strike through~~ font will be deleted.

### Article III: Park Rules and Regulations

#### § 187-5 Authority.

This article is adopted in consonance with the provisions of § 27.075, Wis. Stats.

#### § 187-6 Title.

This article shall be known as the "Green Lake County Parks and Recreational Areas Ordinance."

#### § 187-7 Jurisdiction.

This article shall regulate all County-owned and operated parks and recreational areas, to include public landings and accesses.

#### § 187-8 Regulations established.

A. Park hours for swimming at Margaret Dodge Memorial Park and Spring Lake Park in the Town of Kingston shall be from sunrise to 9:00 p.m. daily from Memorial Day to Labor Day. All swimming is at the individual's own risk.

B. Any group or organization using park facilities is required to have adult supervision in charge of the group while on park premises.

C. Park hours in all County-operated parks shall be from sunrise to 9:00 p.m. daily. Requests for variation from these hours shall be made in writing to the County Clerk at least 10 days prior to the intended date of use.

D. The public is requested at all times to keep all park and other recreational areas clean and sanitary.

E. No privately owned equipment for recreation facilities shall be stored in park buildings.

F. No intoxicating beverages, except for beer or ale in metal containers no larger than 16 ounces, is allowed on park or recreational area grounds at any time. Use of larger beer or ale containers will need to be approved in advance by obtaining a permit from the office of the County Clerk.

[Amended 8-18-1998 by Ord. No. 671-98]

G. No profane language is allowed on park or recreational area grounds.

H. All ice fishing shanties shall be removed from County park property by April 1 of each calendar year.

I. No excessive noise or amplified music is allowed on park or recreational area grounds. Musical instruments and/or bands may not be played without prior approval by the Property and Insurance Committee of the County Board of Supervisors.

J. No pets are allowed in Green Lake County parks. from Memorial Day to Labor Day. At all other times the pets shall be leashed or under the control by the owner of the pet. **Exception is provided for a guide dog, signal dog, or other animal that is individually trained to accompany persons with disabilities and law enforcement K-9 animals.**

K. No carnivals or other money-making enterprises shall be permitted on any park or recreational area grounds except for the sale of merchandise by the concessionaire at Margaret Dodge Memorial Park. Disc golf will be allowed at Zobel Memorial Park, and fund-raising will be allowed to support the disc golf course.

L. No camping or house trailers or vehicles are allowed on park or recreational area grounds except in designated parking areas. No overnight parking and/or camping is permitted.

M. Boat loading and unloading operations shall be restricted to those areas developed and designated for the same and should be restricted to 15 minutes or less so that ramps and piers do not become obstructed. Boat trailers shall be parked only in designated areas provided for that purpose.

N. Overnight camping by organized youth groups, e.g., Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts, Campfire Girls, etc., may be authorized only at Zobel Memorial Park upon written application to the County Clerk's office at least 10 days in advance stating the name of the group, the number of campers, the responsible adults (at least two required to be present at all times) and the date(s) requested.

O. All persons using County parks and recreational areas are expected to use the rest room facilities provided at each such location for their intended purpose.

P. No person shall bring in or dump, deposit or leave any bottles, broken glass, ashes, paper, boxes, cans, dirt, rubbish, waste, garbage or refuse or their trash. No refuse or trash shall be placed in any waters in or contiguous to any park or left anywhere on the grounds. All rubbish or waste shall be carried away from the park by the person responsible for its presence and properly disposed of elsewhere.

Q. No person shall in any manner display or cause to be displayed any sign, placard, picture or other depiction concerning any political candidate or proposal, any commercial display, showing or event, or any religious activity in any Green Lake County park or recreational area.

#### **§ 187-8.1 HUNTING AND TRAPPING**

##### **A. HUNTING PROHIBITED IN COUNTY PARKS**

**Hunting or causing the discharge from any firearm, sling shot, bow and arrow, crossbow, air rifle or any other weapon within, from, into or across the boundaries of Green Lake County parks shall be prohibited at all times.**

**Green Lake County's parks are Zobel Park, Margaret Dodge Memorial Park, Sunset Park, Spring Lake Park (Town of Green Lake), Kingston Spring Lake Park, Twin Lakes Park and Lake Maria Park.**

**Constructing any shed, hunting stand, blind or other private structure within, on or over any park is prohibited.**

**B. Hunting permitted on County owned lands that are not parks in accordance with Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources regulations.**

**Hunting stand, blind or other private structure within, on or over any park must conform with Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources regulations.**

**C. Trapping or laying of traps within all County owned lands including County parks is prohibited at all times.**

**D.**

**In all Green Lake County Parks, no person other than a duly authorized law enforcement officer shall fire or discharge any firearm or air rifle within the parks. Neither shall any person, except as allowed through a properly issued valid concealed carry permit, have in his or her possession or control of any firearm or air rifle within the confines of the County parks, unless it is unloaded and knocked down, or unloaded and enclosed within a carrying case or other suitable container. Nor shall any person have in his or her possession or control a bow or crossbow within the confines of the County parks, unless that bow does not have an arrow nocked or the crossbow is not cocked or is unloaded and enclosed in a carrying case.**

**E. The prohibitions contained in this ordinance do not apply to County employees or agents engaging in live trapping to benefit the County by removing nuisance animals in the County parks. Further the hunting prohibitions of this ordinance**

**do not apply to those licensed persons engaged in Falconry as defined and regulated in Chapter NR 18 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code.**

§ 187-9 Violations and penalties.

**Any person who violates regulations set forth in §187-8 and §187-8.1 may also be required, upon conviction for first offense, to forfeit not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$250 plus the costs of prosecution of the action; and upon conviction of second and subsequent offenses, to forfeit not less than \$50 nor more than \$500 plus the costs of prosecution of the action.**

**A person in default of payment of forfeiture and costs of prosecution shall be imprisoned in the County jail until payment in full but not to exceed thirty days.**

**Any person damaging County property may also be ordered to pay restitution.**

The Department also assumed that the caseload sizes would decrease in 2012 allowing for more efficiency within the Consortia; and

This year the counties in our consortia have seen an increase in caseload unlike what the Department assumed. Green Lake County has seen a 3% increase this past year. The current caseload size per worker in Green Lake County is 780 cases.

**WHEREAS**, In order to fulfill the State/County Income Maintenance and Child Care Contract responsibilities and to re-distribute the increasing case load of current workers this position is needed.

#### **AN ORDINANCE AMENDIING CHAPTER 160, ARTICLE IV, IMPLEMENTS OF HUSBANDRY**

The County Board of Supervisors of Green Lake County, Green Lake, Wisconsin, duly assembled at its annual meeting begun on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of November 2015, does ordain as follows:

**WHEREAS**, 2015 Wisconsin Act 15 made a number of changes to the framework of 2013 Wisconsin Act 377 which regulated the operation of agricultural vehicles on highways. These changes modify requirements for implements of husbandry, agricultural CMVs, potato harvesters, the sale of farm equipment, trailering or farm equipment, and the no fee permitting system; and,

**WHEREAS**, Green Lake County passed Ordinance Number 1102-2014, which adopted the requirement under Wis. Stat. §348.15(3)(g) for Category B implements of husbandry defined in Wis. Stat. §340.01(24)(a)1.b. to comply with the axle weight limitations established under §348.(3)(g) for operating any implement of husbandry on county highways under its jurisdiction; and,

WHEREAS, the changes which resulted from the passage of 2015 Wisconsin Act 15 require an update to the County's ordinance to continue the protection of the County's highway system; and,

WHEREAS, the Green Lake County Board of Supervisors finds, after due consideration, that regulating the weight of implements of husbandry on a per axle basis is more appropriate for maintenance purposes of all highways under the jurisdiction of Green Lake County.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED:**

Section 1. Section 160-13 of the Green Lake County Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read:

§ 160-13. Compliance required.

A. No person shall operate an implement of husbandry on roads under the jurisdiction of Green Lake County, including a Category B implement of husbandry, defined in § 340.01(24)(a)1.b., Wis. Stats., , all category 1 agricultural commercial vehicles as defined in §348.01(1o)(e)1., or for a 2-vehicle combination transporting by trailer or semitrailer either one of these two types of vehicles from farm to field, from field to field, or from farm to farm, which exceeds state vehicle weight limits set forth in § 348.15(3)(g), Wis. Stats., unless the person operating said vehicle is in possession of a valid permit issued by the Green Lake County Highway Commissioner under authority granted by § 348.27(19), Wis. Stats.

B. No fee shall be charged for the application for a permit under this section.

Section 2. Section 160-14 of the Green Lake County Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read:

§ 160-14. Applicability.

A. Permits issued under this section shall not apply to state or other local municipality roads.

B. In the event an application for a no-fee permit is granted for a Category B implement of husbandry, as defined in § 340.01(24)(a)1.b., Wis. Stats., a Category 1 agricultural commercial vehicle as defined in §340.01(1o)(e)1., or any 2-vehicle combination transporting by trailer or semitrailer either one of these two types of vehicles from farm to field, from field to field, or from farm to farm, the County may not deny the application but may modify and approve the application to provide an approved alternate route or map of highways other than those specified by the applicant for purposes of operation. The alternate route may include highways that are not under the jurisdiction of Green Lake County only if prior approval has been given by the jurisdiction(s) over which the alternate route travels, except that no prior approval is required with respect to a highway on which these vehicles may be legally operated or transported without a permit or as authorized by the other jurisdiction.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon enactment and publication as required by law, but no earlier than January 1, 2016.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect permanently until either duly amended or repealed by the Green Lake County Board of Supervisors or until January 1, 2020, as mandated by Wis. Stat. §348.15(9)(g).

Section 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with or in contradiction of the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 6. A copy of this Ordinance shall be provided to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation prior to January 20, 2016, to be posted on its website.

## **ORDINANCE NO. 1130 -2015**

### **Relating to Ordinance amending the Code of Green Lake County Chapter 103 Animals**

The County Board of Supervisors of Green Lake County, Green Lake, Wisconsin, duly assembled at its regular meeting begun on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of December, 2015, does ordain as follows:

Chapter 103 Animals Article III “Restricted Animals” be created to restrict the keeping of certain animals.

See attached language for proposed amendments.

## **Chapter 103. Animals**

### **Article III. Restricted Animals**

#### **§103-27. Definitions.**

As used in this article, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

#### **ANIMAL**

Means any mammal (excluding humans), bird, reptile, amphibian, mollusk, or arthropod or any egg of any bird, reptile, amphibian, mollusk or arthropod, **or fish**.

#### **ANIMAL WITH VICIOUS OR DANGEROUS PROPENSITIES**

(A) Means any animal that when unprovoked bites, injures, kills, or attacks a human being or domestic animal on either public or private property.

(B) The following are exceptions to the definition of a “vicious animal”

- a. No animal may be declared vicious if death, injury or damage is sustained by a person who, at the time such was sustained, was committing a trespass of the dwelling upon the premises occupied the owner of the animal, or was teasing, tormenting, abusing or assaulting the animal or was committing or attempting to commit a crime or violating or attempting to violate an ordinance which protects person or property.
- b. No animal may be declared vicious if death, injury, or damage was sustained by a domestic animal which, at the time such was sustained, was teasing, tormenting, abusing, or assaulting the animal.
- c. No animal may be declared vicious if the animal was protecting or defending a human being within the immediate vicinity of the animal from an unjustified attack or assault.
- d. No animal may be declared vicious for acts committed by said animal while being utilized by a law enforcement agency for law enforcement purposes while under the control and direction of a law enforcement officer.

#### **DOMESTIC ANIMAL**

Means any species that has been selectively bred for hundreds of generations to accept humans or live with humans so as to live and breed in a tame condition, depend on humankind for survival, and are commonly considered to be domesticated in the United States. Domestic animals include companion animals and livestock.

#### **HARMFUL WILD ANIMAL**

Means any other animal designated as a harmful wild animal under Wisconsin Statutes or the Wisconsin Administrative Code, including but not limited to:

- (a) Members of the species *felis concolor* (commonly known as cougars);
- (b) Members of the family *ursidae* (commonly known as bears);
- (c) Wild and feral swine (as defined in Wis. Admin. Code NR §16.11(3)),
- (d) *Anatidae* (the species *anserinae* *Cygnus*, commonly known as mute swans),
- (e) *Canidae*, hybrids of the species *Canis lupus*, *C. Lycaon*, of *C. rufus*, (commonly known as wolves) and the species *Canis familiaris*, domestic dogs, and subsequent generations from such matings. These animals are commonly called wolf-dog hybrids or wolf dogs;

#### **WILD ANIMAL**

Means any animal of a wild nature that is normally found in the wild and that is not a domestic animal.

#### **§103-28. Authority.**

This ordinance is enacted under the authority contained in §169.43 Wisconsin Statutes.

#### **§103-29 Keeping of certain restricted animals.**

(a) Except as otherwise provided herein, no person within the unincorporated areas of Green Lake County shall own, keep, maintain, harbor, or have in his or her possession, or under his or her control, any wild animal, harmful wild animal, or animal with vicious or dangerous propensities including, but not limited to, any of the following animals :

- (1) Poisonous or venomous animals and reptiles including snakes that are capable of causing serious injury to humans or other animals;
- (2) Apes: Chimpanzees (Pan); Gibbons (Hylobates); Gorillas (Gorilla); Orangutans (Pongo); and Siamangs (Symphalangus);
- (3) Baboons (Papoi, Mandrillus);
- (4) Bears (Ursidae);
- (5) Cheetahs (Acinonyx jubatus);
- (6) Crocodilians (Crocodilia);
- (7) All snakes not indigenous to Wisconsin. Exception: a boa constrictor or ball python up to four (4) feet in length or any other snake which does not exceed three feet in length are allowed;
- (8) Coyotes (Canis latrans);
- (9) Elephants (Elephas and Loxodonta);
- (10) Game cocks and other fighting birds;
- (11) Hippopotami (Hippopotamidae);
- (12) Hyenas (Hyaenidae);
- (13) Jaguars (panther onca);
- (14) Leopards (Panthera pardus);
- (15) Lions (Panthera leo);
- (16) Lynxes (Lynx);
- (17) Monkeys, old world (Ceropithecidae);
- (18) Piranha fish (Characidae) exceeding six inches in length;
- (19) Pumas (Felis concolor); also known as cougars, mountain lions, and panthers;
- (20) Rhinoceroses (Rhinocero tidae);
- (21) Sharks (class Chondrichthyes) exceeding six inches in length;
- (22) Snow leopards (Panthera unicia);
- (23) Tigers (Panthera tigris);
- (24) Wolves (Canis lupus);
- (25) Wolf-dog hybrids;
- (26) **Poisonous or venomous biting insects; except beekeeping is allowed**
- (27) Poisonous tarantula and poisonous or venomous biting spiders;
- (28) Wolverines, fishers, martens, wild Russian boars bobcats or ocelots;
- (29) Any other wild animal not native to Wisconsin and not controlled by game farm licensure;
- (30) Any hybrid or crossbreed of any of the above with a domestic animal.

(b) Any restricted animal listed in §103-29 above, owned, possessed, harbored, kept, or maintained in violation of this section may be impounded and destroyed by the county, or its agents, at the expense of the violator.

- (1) Any law enforcement, humane or public health officer shall have the authority to enforce the provisions of this section, including, but not limited to, seizing any animal that the officer reasonably believes is being possessed, harbored, owned, kept, or maintained in violation of this section.
- (2) Any such animal or creature seized pursuant to this section shall be held in a facility designated by the County until the animal or creature is identified as to genus and species to ascertain if the animal is an endangered species identified as such in the Wisconsin Statutes. At any time after such identification, the county may destroy the animal as provided herein.
- (3) The animal seized shall be impounded. The county may require the appealing party to post bond in an amount sufficient to satisfy the cost of holding and identifying the animal. If it is determined that the animal has been owned, possessed, harbored, kept, or maintained in violation of this section, the costs incurred by the county for impounding, holding, and identifying the animal shall be paid by the violator. Anyone found to be in violation of this section shall, in addition to the penalties provided, forfeit the prohibited animal to the County for destruction or disposition as deemed proper. Prior to such forfeiture, the county may direct a transfer of the animal to a qualified zoological, educational, or scientific institution or qualified private propagator for safe keeping, with the cost thereof being assessed and paid by the violator.

- (c) This section shall not apply where animals are in the care, custody, or control of: a veterinarian for treatment; agricultural fairs; shows or projects of the 4-H Clubs; a display for judging purposes; an itinerant or transient carnival, circus or other show; dog or cat shows or trials; public or private educational or medical institutions; a department of natural resources licensed animal rehabilitation facility; or licensed pet shops; provided that:
- (1) The location conforms to the provisions of the zoning ordinance of the municipality in which the property is located;
  - (2) All animals and animal quarters are kept in a clean and sanitary condition and so maintained as to eliminate objectionable odors;
  - (3) Animals are maintained in quarters so constructed as to prevent their escape.

§103-30. Enforcement.

- (a) The provisions of this article shall be enforced by the Green Lake County Sheriff, the Green Lake County Department of Public Health, and/or other persons authorized by the Green Lake County Sheriff or the Green Lake County Department of Public Health. This article may be enforced by citation, injunction or civil forfeiture. The Green Lake County Corporation Counsel and District Attorney are also authorized to bring an action to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.
- (b) The Green Lake County Sheriff and those designated by the Sheriff are authorized to catch and impound restricted animals at large with such authorization to include the pursuit of restricted animals upon non-animal owner private property. It shall be a violation of this article to interfere with the law enforcement officer, public health officer or designee, trained individual or Green Lake County Sheriff's Office employee in the performance of their duties.

§103-31. Penalties.

Any person violating any provisions of this article shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$1,000.00 together with all court costs. If any violation be continuing, each day's violation shall be deemed a separate violation.
