#### January 2021 Green Lake County Library Reports

**Berlin –** The Berlin Library is welcoming the new year with a Winter Reading program for all ages from January 1 to February 28. We thought we had set our goal high by challenging our patrons to collectively reach 10,000 total hours read in the two months. As I write this recap, we already have 3,471 tallied, meaning more than 1/3 of the goal has already been reached. This is so exciting to see everyone jump on board with the program. We definitely have some avid readers!

The Stitching Together Community project: making hats for the ThedaCare Oncology chemotherapy patients, is also off to a great start. So far, we have taken in 29 hats. With other projects being planned, patrons can look for other ways to support the community and keep busy while stuck at home and in between reading books.

Our youth librarian is continuing to offer Storytime with limited space and safety measures in place. The small group attending is very appreciative to keep little ones busy and encouraging a structured literacy event.

Take and make projects have been a huge hit for all ages. We offer kits for adults, teens, and children monthly. Because we are unable to hold events in the library, we have extra budget to put towards these take-home craft kits. Friends of the Berlin Library will be sponsoring a few activities for our patrons as well.

The Berlin Senior Center reached out to see if we could help at their drive-up/take-home Christmas meal held last week because they were short-handed. Two of our staff helped put together and handout about 150 meals.

With recent patron donations, we will be updating seating by our newspaper and magazine browsing area. There is currently a 4-6 months waiting period for ordering new furniture, so our hope is that by the time it arrives, it will be safe for patrons to hang out at the library once again and enjoy the comfy new chairs.

The New Year brings hope that the next year will bring better opportunities to serve the needs of the community. If there is anything our library can help any of you with, please do not hesitate to let us know. Thank you for your continued support of the public libraries. It is greatly appreciated!!

**Green Lake –** We are starting off the month with a Friends Book Sale on Wednesday, January 6 from 1-4 pm and then another on Saturday, January 23 from 9am-noon. We had a very generous donation of only-read-once home library of hardcover books by popular authors. Carol, book sale coordinator extraordinaire, was delighted by the new arrivals and the tables downstairs are stocked to bursting.

Activity Packs and scavenger hunts will start again the second week of January. You just never know what we might have in there so stop back often or check our Facebook page for updates.

Later this month I will be working on the library's annual report to submit to the state Department of Public Instruction. The report typically measures circulation and program attendance as the two biggest numbers the library world looks at in measuring success. Before the pandemic, I am proud to say our circulation and program attendance numbers were steadily going up every month for the first time in many years. Hopefully that increase will help balance our numbers after the decline due to the pandemic. Within our library system, the Caestecker Library has not been as hard hit as many others and it's a testament to our local community support and dedication! Regardless, it is worth noting that DPI is taking into account all the challenges created by the pandemic and the report will be modified to reflect the changes 2020 brought to libraries.

The Winnefox annual meeting will be virtual this year and held on January 19. If you have any issues you would like me to bring to the system level, please let me know.

I have successfully completed my Advanced Public Library Administration class and am onto another for the spring semester. This time I will be working my way through a course on Organization and Management of Collections. Only one more to go after that to complete my certification.

**Kingston –** Our 22<sup>nd</sup> annual Cookie Walk in December raised \$1181.00 for the library, in spite of the bad weather and Covid. This month we will start working on our plans for 2021 fundraisers. Unlike most

libraries, our budget has a fundraiser amount included in it, that the board is committed to raising so planning starts early and goes all year long.

Our January display at the library is "New Books for a New Year". The display is right as you walk in the front door, so if you are looking for something you haven't read and don't feel like browsing the stacks, simply grab a book off the display table and you can be on your way.

We have already had a few calls about tax forms. Libraries in our area DO still offer paper copies of the forms. Some who do their taxes online, still like to fill out the paper copy first. We have some of the WI tax forms already, and are waiting on the Federal ones.

The Loosely Bound Book Club will be reading "The Heirloom Garden" by Viola Shipman for this month's meeting. Iris Maynard lost her husband in World War II, her daughter to illness and, finally, her reason to live. Walled off from the world for decades behind the towering fence surrounding her home, Iris has built a new family...of flowers. Iris propagates her own daylilies and roses while tending to a garden filled with the heirloom starts that keep the memories of her loved ones alive. When Abby Peterson moves next door with her family—a husband traumatized by his service in the Iraq War and a young daughter searching for stability—Iris is reluctantly yet inevitably drawn into her boisterous neighbor's life, where, united by loss and a love of flowers, she and Abby tentatively unearth their secrets, and help each other discover how much life they have yet to live. Starting this month the meetings will be held on the last Tuesday, at 2 pm. Come join us for some lively conversations!

**Markesan –** We had a pretty busy December here at the Markesan Library. We had a last-minute collaboration with the Fire Department and was able to bring Santa to the Library on a Fire Truck. Santa took pictures with the kids outside the library, and they all received treat bags. We had 70 kids attend. The adult Christmas crafts also continued to be very popular with every available craft kit being distributed. The ugly Christmas mask contest had about 9 participants making masks and many others voting for them. We had 17 participants in the Stuffed Animal Sleepover with many Facebook live views. We also received some wonderful donations. We had one patron give us \$300. He said he and his wife use the library a good deal and wanted to split their stimulus checks with us. It was a very kind gesture, and we plan to use the money for programming. Below is the article that we sent to the newspaper highlighting our upcoming January activities:

Daring bank robbers, vicious shoot outs, and notorious history awaits you in this incredible discussion.



For our younger patrons, grades 4-8<sup>th</sup>, the Library will be promoting bullets of an entirely different kind than those carried by gangsters—we will be making Bullet Journals! Take home everything you need, from instructions to supplies, to make

your very own bullet journal. Let everyday move forward in organized bliss and never be late again! These kits will be ready starting January 13<sup>th</sup>, call ahead at 920-398-3434 to reserve a kit as supplies are limited.

For our adult crafters we will have two new take home crafts. Paper napkin candles and TBA. Check our Facebook and website page for updates on when kits will be made available. Supplies will be limited so early sign up is encouraged. Similar to our holiday crafts, a small fee to help cover craft supplies may be charged.

Our new employee Trish has started and is doing well. Library work means a lot of little details, but she's catching on fast.

# Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

## Encouraging Financial Conversations Planning

I am partnering with area and regional colleagues to offer a professional development opportunity for individuals and organization leaders who work with community members in a variety of situations. Financial management is a very personal topic. Positive conversations around money are grounded in respect, confidentiality, and creating a judgment-free zone. Many helping professionals have on-going relationships with their clients and are in a position to provide resources to individuals who may not seek out financial education.

# Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

#### Farm Visits

Early on in the pandemic UW-Madison put a hold on in person visits. This moratorium made my job as an Agriculture educator a little more difficult as a large part of my job is getting out onto farms to consult with farmers and landowners directly. In order to still be effective in the community I have done what everything that I can to make sure that the citizens of Green Lake County know that even if I'm not onsite at the county building or able to come to them directly I am still available to answer calls, emails, and video chat if available.

#### General County Outreach

I have made sure that the citizens of Green Lake County know that even if I'm not onsite at the county building or able to come to them directly I am still available to answer calls, emails, and video chat if available. I have done that through keeping in touch with the local syndicate via a Focus Article. I have also become more active in posting materials and resources that the citizens of Green Lake County will find helpful on our Green Lake County UW-Extension Facebook Page. My post pertaining to where local foods could be sources had a reach of over 1300 views! In December I answered calls and emails in regard to FSA programs, grazing, soil testing, soil regeneration, soil fertility, farm succession, milk licensing, Paycheck Protection, and Pesticide Applicator Training.

Just like the Badger Crop Connect UW-Madison Division of Extension in light of COVID is currently and will be offering all workshops and courses online via webinar. # **Program Highlights**

## Green Lake County Livestock Council
