May 2021 Green Lake County Library Reports

Berlin – In April, the Berlin Library staff participated in the Berlin Community clean up event on Earth Day by helping pick up several municipal parking lots, as well as the area around the library. This was a wonderful community project we were proud to help with.

As mentioned in my last update, our library is beginning to move back to in-person programming. In April, our Stitching Together group met for the first time in over a year. We also re-introduced adult in-person crafts. Let me just say that patrons are thrilled to be back! Even with some restrictions, time slots are filling up quickly with enthusiasm. In May, we are bringing back children's crafts, laser tag, and a movie matinee. We know there will be some hesitation, so we will continue to provide make and take crafts for all ages. We are also continuing to offer curbside pick-up. Our goal is to provide library services to the entire community and respect everyone's comfort level in regard to health safety.

Later this month, Berlin Library will be hosting a plant swap. If you would like to add some variety to your garden, indoor or out, come see what we have to offer.

Later this month, Friends of the Library has a Vintage Book Sale that will be held from May 21 to May 29.

Offered in this sale are many vintage books donated by a generous patron a few years ago. Through the recent book sale held in March, Friends was able to sponsor several of the craft programs, library bags, and replenish the books for our 1000 Books B4 Kindergarten program.

Speaking of Friends, a former Friends president recently passed away and her family gave us a nice donation to be put towards books of her favorite genres: mystery and suspense. We will be adding books in her memory to our collection for many to enjoy. We are thankful for her many years of dedication to the Berlin Library and Friends.

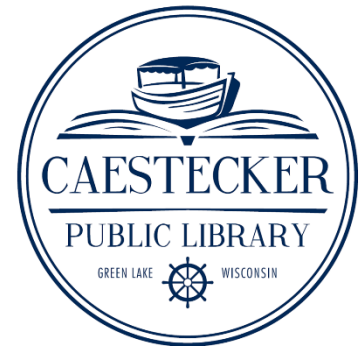
Our staff is beginning to plan for the 2021 Summer Library Program. At this time, we are hopeful we will be able to offer entertaining programs, both inside and out. We are also looking at collaborating with the schools and City Park & Recreation department. It is looking like it will be an exciting summer at the Berlin Library!

Chris Kalupa – Berlin Public Library Director

Green Lake – I am so excited about the changes we have been making at the library recently. Our new shelving project is coming to a close and the front sitting portion of the library has had a facelift. We moved the magazines to a smaller shelf and doubled the large print section's shelf space. The newspapers and Wisconsin magazines have a new display shelf that requires less floor space and brings the newspapers to eye level. We were also able to swap around some smaller shelving units and create some much-needed space in the DVD section. While we have been weeding and rearranging shelves, we have also been focused on using merchandising tactics to refresh the look of the shelves and catch the eyes of patrons. I think the changes have created a fresh look, increased access to our materials, and will increase circulation.

A few other updates have also been completed in April:

1. The main floor lights have been completely upgraded to LED bulbs. The lights are brighter, more energy efficient, and should last us for years.
2. Our new logo (see below) is finally finished! We will be working on rebranding efforts in the coming months and moving forward on a few projects and updates that I've been dreaming about since 2016 when I started at the Caestecker Library.
3. The front entry of the library is getting a few new additions—two very comfy bistro sets, some planters, and a new elevated gardening bed. It's going to be a very welcoming and inviting look when it's all complete after the weather warms up a bit more.



May brings more welcome changes and additions to the library, including a return to community programs and increased meeting room availability. Our regular groups will be coming back for their weekly and monthly meetings in the lower level, including two long time Green Lake area book clubs that previously met elsewhere. The Knitting Group had their first meeting, and their laughter could be heard through the library again. Story Time with Ms. Margie will start up at 10 am on Wednesday, May 12. Our Constant Reader Book Club will also meet on May 12, at 3 pm. Our regular Sunday Volunteers

(along with a few new helpers) have completed their training sessions and will return for Sundays in May and into the future. It's a delight to have our regular groups and volunteers back in the routine.

The two-day Garage Sale weekend book sale marathon was a big success, and many books were sold. It's a good thing too, the after-Garage Sale weekend book donations are already coming through the door and carts are steadily going downstairs to be emptied. Christina Lyon – Caestecker Public Library Director

Kingston – Our latest silent auction ended Saturday. "Let's Make Painting Contagious" raised a little over \$800.00 for the library. Thanks to all who helped us do that, the talented artists and all the bidders. We wouldn't be the library we are today without the great support from the community that we receive.

We have two patriotic displays at the library right now. The first was done by Kingston Historical Preservation Society members, & also Vietnam Air Force Veteran Bob Burdick and wife Janet. This patriotic display is especially fitting for the coming month of May, helping to celebrate Armed Forces Day on the 15th, and Memorial Day on the 31st. There are two parts to the display. The bottom shelf has "Caps & Hats of Valor & Service" and showcases a few military caps from various branches of the services worn during World War I. The second part of the display is "Symbolic Folds of Honor & Remembrance." If you've ever attended a military funeral, you have witnessed first-hand the final tribute to a Veteran, done in solemn silence for their final farewell. You will hear the rifle volley which is a customary tradition in which three volleys of shots are fired in honor of the deceased veteran by members of the honor guard company. Taps are played. And then 2 members of the honor guard, standing at attention and wearing their formal dress uniforms, slowly with meticulous military precision lift the flag from the coffin and fold it. Have you ever asked yourself what the meaning is behind the ceremonial folding of the flag? Each fold represents something different. When you stop to see the display, you will see each step of the folding, along with a definition. Upon completion only the field of blue, graced by the white stars, now forms "The Triangle" which is then presented to the family with the simple statement: On behalf of the President of the United States, (the United States Army, The United States Marine Corps, The United States Navy, or the United States Air Force) and a grateful nation, please accept this flag as a symbol of our appreciation of your loved one's honorable and faithful service.

The second patriotic display at the library is called "Remember". You will find books, both fiction and non-fiction, children's and adults, and DVD's, all to do with wars of the past. Stop by and take an item home, and "Remember" those who kept our country safe, sometimes with their lives.

Our Rummage for Reading table will be set up again later this month. If you have a sale and have leftover items, the library would take them for the table. Or if you are cleaning closets and DON'T want to have a sale, donate those items to the library for the table. All proceeds from sales go towards new books.

With summer right around the corner, we are beginning to plan our children's summer reading program. We will have two sessions each week, Wednesday mornings at 9:30 am starting June 16, and Thursday afternoons at 4:30 pm starting June 17. The program will run for four weeks and you can sign up for a particular day by stopping at the library, or giving us a call during open hours, 920-394-3281.

Now that the vaccines are available, and Covid numbers are starting to go down, the library is beginning to plan public programs once again that will start in September. Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

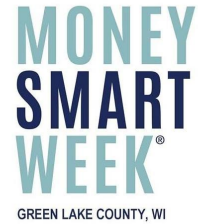
Virtual Money Smart Week – April 10-17, 2021

Green Lake County Financial Literacy Month – April 2021

Virtual Money Smart Week 2021 was held Saturday, April 10 – Saturday, April 17. The week-long free virtual public awareness campaign aims to help people better manage their personal finances with a focus on those hardest hit by the COVID-19 pandemic. Due to the nature of the online programming, organizations were not able to host their own Money Smart Week sites. Instead I chose to offer financial literacy classes in place of Money Smart Week for 2021 in Green Lake County. I taught three classes – basic budgeting, how to save a dollar when you don't have a dime to spare, credit & debt management - via Zoom and had 14 people attend. The following was collected in evaluation data:

- 86% learned a new method of tracking their spending
- 100% learned how to better manage their finances
- 93% learned how to read their credit report
- 93% learned which debts need priority over others

I am hopeful that 2022 will bring the ability for Green Lake County's Money Smart Week to resume in the successful fashion it had been prior to 2020.



Aging Mastery Program – Green Lake County/Inclusa Partnership

At the end of April, I met with Kari Enders from Inclusa to discuss a partnership in teaching another session of the Aging Mastery Program (AMP) via Zoom in Green Lake County. Inclusa manages the provision of a person-centered and community-focused approach to long-term care services and supports to over 15,500 Family Care members across its 68-county service region in Wisconsin. With the partnership with Inclusa developed, I can offer the AMP version for caregivers which will be something unique and different for Green Lake County. We will be the second area in the state to offer this AMP class. We will be teaching for 6 weeks – 3 hours per week, starting June 30 and ending August 4. Community speakers will still be utilized, which I think is the best part of the program. I will be sharing more as the session gets closer.



Financial Coaching – Green Lake County Circuit Court/Drug Court

In the month of April, I have had 9 mandated financial coaching clients from the circuit court system through child support and drug court. I've met with each client for an initial hour-long session at which they learned knowledge and skills to set a financial goal, build a spending plan, look for spending leaks, and manage debt. Each client also has a follow-up meeting after they've put the skills they've learned into practice. Following that session, I decide if they can graduate from the coaching program or if they need more sessions. If they graduate it is their responsibility to provide their certificate of completion to Judge Slate.

Networking within Extension and Professional Development Opportunities

I made 32 contacts within the UW Extension system during the month of April. I continue to have a number of professional meetings scheduled with colleagues and mentors to continue to network and learn from my fellow Extension educators.

Human Development and Relationships Educator – Marquette County Interview Committee

I served on the Marquette County interview committee for their Human Development and Relationships (HDR)

Educator. This was a good opportunity to help hire an educator who will be a good fit for a rural county and their needs. The candidate who is hired will partner with me in Green Lake County to assist with the limited number of co-parenting mandates (2019 – 2, 2020 – 1) that Judge Slate makes on an annual basis.

This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the Agricultural Program in April of 2021. During the reporting period, the educator made 93 direct educational and professional contacts plus other

unknown contacts through relevant social media postings.

Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

Foxhead RAP!

During the month of April I worked with the Foxhead Regenerative Agriculture Startup to provide educational opportunities related to the goals of that group. Some of the information provided include articles on conservation leases and information concerning meat processing. Although in its infancy this group could potentially provide a meaningful service to the community as well as agriculture at large. I look forward to doing more work with this organization.

Green Lake Sanitary District

In April I began a working relationship with the Green Lake Sanitary District. The sanitary district is working hard to help curb the nutrient loading into Big Green Lake. I am encouraged by their willingness to utilize UW-Madison Division of Extension to address this problem. I look forward to offering my services as the Agriculture Educator to help bridge relations between the Sanitary District and agricultural producers in the watershed.

Land and Lake Families Field Day

After a year hiatus both farmers and property owners are looking forward to the Land and Lake Families field day. Planning for the event has already begun. For my part I am already strategizing about material to present as well as helping line up speakers.

General County Outreach

In April I wrote a focus article on the enterprise matching tool that I built with some of my colleagues. The focus of the article was to show how the tool could be useful in helping a farm looking to transition find a new enterprise that would be right for them. I have been posting to the county Facebook page any and all upcoming programs coming from UW Extension and its partners. With the weather warming up there was an uptick in public concerns. Concerns coming in in April included land leases, ideas for new enterprises, tree pruning, tree planting, direct marketing, produce safety, emerald ash borer, tree recommendations, guidance on when to plant and government programs.



Networking within UW Extension and Professional Development Opportunities

UW-Madison Division of Extension ZOOM Meetings

I tune in to the Monthly update brought to all of Extension by Dean Karl Martin. Dean Martin keeps us up to date on the decisions being made in Madison and how it will look on a practical county level once implemented. I also tune in once a month to the Ag Institutes updates so stay abreast of policy and news related specifically to the Ag Institute. I also participate in the monthly area 14 ZOOM to stay current with our surrounding counties. I have been keeping up to date with the other program areas by attending the Friday morning ZOOM meetings. This allows me opportunity to see what the program areas that are not in my designation are working on. Without this I won't be aware of any collaborative opportunities that may be coming up.

Crops and Soils

In trying to align my work with UW-Madison's objectives I have been continuously working to update my plan of work. During the month of April I participated in the programing plan of work meetings for Farm Management and Crops and Soils to see in what ways I can work with colleagues on program topics that are of value to Green Lake County. As such I have begun to plug into the rotational grazing work group and the cover crops work group.

Solar

To keep abreast of this emerging topic I attended three professional development webinars on solar energy. Topics within the webinars ranged from construction to cost of implementation.
