Princeton – The Green Lake County budget has passed, and all libraries got the full funding request for 2022. We are grateful!

We have seen a substantial uptick in the number of people using our community/study rooms. Users include business people on attending virtual meetings, the Girl Scouts, social workers, a quilting club, people working remotely, and Big Brothers / Big Sisters. We have also seen very busy Monday mornings, and I am adding a staff member on for a couple of hours each Monday to compensate. We have also seen an increase in the number of people asking for help on the computer recently. People are looking for help applying for jobs online, printing forms, using email, scanning and sending documents, etc. Volunteer Richard May's computer classes may have encouraged more people to seek help. His classes were great, and we hope to have more in 2022.

At our last library board meeting, we agreed on a PC replacement schedule, and two new computers will be ordered for us through the Winnefox Library System. This is less expensive than going to a store and is just one more reason we love our library system!

The Friends of the Library and two staff members volunteered their time met on November 21. We decorated our windows, put up Christmas lights outside, set up the Christmas Sale fundraiser, set up the children's book giveaway, and made plans for the upcoming Cookie Walk. The Friends have agreed to buy the library a Silhouette Cameo cutting machine of our own, as we have been consistently borrowing one from the library system. The Friends also recently bought us about a dozen children's books and half the cost of an ad.

Our Local Native American History presentation with Julie Fleming was very well-attended. Christmas in Princeton events went very well too, with a large attendance of about 450+ people at the library over a 10 hour period.

On November 30, all of the librarians met virtually to discuss tech issues including patron-side ILS changes and upgrades, a problem with Libby, problems with staff accidentally over-writing items in the catalog, and a new way of cataloging story time kits.

We have some minor maintenance issues that I am dealing with, including lack of heat in the men's bathroom, a very slow drip in the janitor's closet, and drop ceiling tiles that were dislodged in the lobby.

The snowy season is here, and I am hoping that the DPW is in a better position to maintain our sidewalks this year. In the past we have had issues with unplowed and unsalted sidewalks, and this is a safety/liability issue, especially since we have so many senior citizen patrons.

I am considering holding a staff in-service day on Monday, January 17 (Martin Luther King Jr. Day). While we are normally open on this day, many people expect us not to be open. We would use this in-service day for training, cleaning projects, and tech issues. I would also like to see all staff learn CPR.

Laura Skalitsky – Princeton Public Library Director



This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the Health & Well-Being Institute in November of 2021. During the reporting period, the educator made 68 direct educational and professional contacts.

Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

Strong Bodies Aging Mastery Book Club Program, Virtual In November, a team of colleagues in Area 14 began co-teaching the Aging Mastery Program Book Club to 37 participants following their Strong Bodies class. The Aging Mastery Program is a program for those 55+ to learn skills and tools to live a long, healthy, thriving life. The Book Club version is a shortened lesson with emphasis on the participant reading the playbook prior to each class. The 37 participants are located throughout the state of Wisconsin and there are 3 Green Lake County participants.



Encouraging Financial Conversations, Central Region via Zoom

I am currently teaching six hour-long sessions of Encouraging Financial Conversations to 6 individuals via Zoom. I recently taught this with the Eastern Region group of colleagues as well. This group of participants brings more of a rural base which allows for different discussion and learnings. Encouraging Financial Conversations is a program designed for case managers, social workers, and other frontline staff to help empower clients to achieve their financial goals and manage their money. Participants learn techniques and strategies to help their clients create a financial goals action plan, build and maintain good credit, pay off debts, develop a spending and savings plan, and protect themselves from fraud and identity theft. Participants also learn coaching strategies that capitalize on a client's strengths and resources in coming up with solutions.

Safe & Healthy Food Preservation, Farmer's Wives Club, Dalton

In November I taught a lesson on safe and healthy food preservation to five women who are part of the Farmer's Wives Club in Dalton. The lesson focused on water boiling bath canning and pressure canner testing. In recent years, food preservation made a return to family life and is still important for many families today. Preserving home-grown or farmer's market purchased produce in season provides a cost-effective way for families to eat healthier.

Financial Coaching, Green Lake and Marquette Counties

In the month of November, I completed financial coaching with four participants – 3 from Green Lake County and 1 from Marquette County. Marquette County's Human Development and Relationships Educator is currently accepting individuals from Green Lake County with mandates to complete co-parenting into her classes. In return I am providing financial coaching to Marquette County residents who are mandated to take the course. I meet the individuals at the Princeton Library or via Zoom.

Fruits Lesson, Young Stars Daycare, Markesan

I taught youth (ages 2-3) at Young Stars Daycare in Markesan about fruits. We talked about fruits they like and fruits they don't like to eat, as well as, how fruits are good for our bodies. We did a taste test with red apple, green apple, yellow apple, kiwi, raspberry, and pomegranate. Each participant had to put a sticker on their chart under the happy face if they liked the fruit or a sticker under the sad face if they did not like the fruit. Everyone liked the red apples, yellow apples, kiwi, and pomegranate. A few did not like the kiwi or the raspberries.

Networking within Extension and Professional Development Opportunities

I made 113 contacts within the UW Extension system during the month of November. I continue to have a number of professional meetings scheduled with colleagues and mentors to continue to network and learn from my fellow Extension educators.

I attended the NEAFCS National Conference since it was moved to virtual. Ben Jenkins Green Lake County Agricultural Educator November 2021

UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN-MADISON **GREEN LAKE COUNTY**

This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the Agricultural Program in November of 2021. During the reporting period, the educator made 83 direct educational and professional contacts plus other unknown contacts through relevant social media postings and articles.

Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

General County Outreach

I have been posting to the county Facebook page any and all upcoming programs coming from UW Extension and its partners. I wrote a Focus Article for the Berlin News covering the questions that landowners need to be asking their farmer tenants. Concerns coming in in November included ideas for new enterprises, soil management, deer plots, land rent, cover crops, and fertilizer prices.

On Farm Research

I continued working with Carry Lebowski to conduct an on-farm research trial studying the effect of N rates on Rye cover crops. Todd Morris and I laid out the plots on and took soil samples from Jim Hebbe's Farm.

Winter Programming

Worked with colleagues in area 14 to plan for upcoming winter programming. We have started to line up speakers and topics for grazing and soil health days. These will be in person events within the county starting in January.







Networking within UW Extension and Professional Development Opportunities

Workgroups

During the month of November, I participated in the programing plan of work meetings for Farm Management and Crops and Soils to see in what ways I can work with colleagues on program topics that are of value to Green Lake County. This month I did planning work with colleagues from area 14 on local programming, the grazing workgroup, the farm succession workgroup, the entrepreneur work group. I have also opted to be a part of a work group that is trying to determine and quantify the value of soil health.

Badger Crop Connect

Badger Crop Connect is a monthly webinar that offers CCA continuing education credits and equips producers with the tools they need to tackle crop management issues. We met as a group in November to discuss whether or not we wanted to hold an emergency webinar on the increase in crop production expenses going into the 2022 growing season.

Morgan Martinez Green Lake County 4-H Program Educator November 2021

This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the 4-H Program in November 2021. During the reporting period, the program educator made 103 direct educational and professional contacts.

Program Highlights

Green Lake County 4-H Horse Club

The Green Lake County 4-H Horse Club is a single project club focused on providing horse education to the membership. I attended their meeting on November 1, 2021 providing guidance and leadership on establishing club bylaws, constitution, club policies and guiding the club as it transitions from a 4-H Group to a 4-H Club.
