May 2022 Green Lake County Library Reports

Berlin – This month is filled with lots of activities that will keep our staff and patrons very busy. Last week we held our first Speed Puzzle Tournament and had 4 very enthusiastic teams sign up. The winning team of four completed their 1000-piece puzzle in 2 hours, which was 30 minutes before the tournament time cutoff. Two of the teams even had t-shirts made. We will definitely host this fun event again in the future!

Our Youth Librarian, Sam, has connected with middle and high school students to start up our Teen Library Club. Although the group is small right now, they have been eager to participate in programs. They will be developing an Escape Room and running a Pokémon card trading and game event on May 14. Being that teens are our most difficult group to connect with, we are very excited to get this group going again.

A Dungeons and Dragons event will be returning this Saturday and the registration is already full. We are planning to have this be a reoccurring event due to the popularity. This is another event that we are excited to be reaching out to a new group of individuals who have not used the library much in the past.

Throughout the month, we will be welcoming quite a few school classes for a visit to the library. The 4th grade will be coming to participate in a mini–Escape Room and scavenger hunt. Some of the Kindergarteners, 1st and 2nd graders will also be visiting, getting a tour, and checking out books to use in their last few weeks of school. This will be the first time having the public school classes in the library since before COVID. Also on the schedule is a visit from the 8th graders for a school project.

This week we are hosting our 4th annual plant swap, where we invite anyone to bring a plant and take a plant. We usually end with more coming in than going out, as everyone is very generous with their extras. In addition, we are also hosting other programs such as an adult game night, a teen laser tag, watercolor painting class, adult craft night, movie afternoon, book clubs, and storytimes. And in between all of that, we are putting together our Summer Reading Program with some very exciting things planned. Sam will also be visiting all the schools to promote the upcoming Summer Reading Program.

Markesan – New to us and new to you, the Markesan Public Library has some very exciting additions from Wi-Fi Hotspots to Wonderbooks to Children's furniture to fresh programming and a Silent Garden Art Auction.

Thanks to a generous grant from the American Rescue Plan Act, the Markesan Public Library now has two new wi-fi hotspots for patrons 18 and over to checkout. These wi-fi hotspots operate through cellular data provided by US Cellular. Wherever US cellular coverage is available there too will our wi-fi hotspots work to provide our patrons with free wi-fi service. Checkouts are good for two-weeks at a time.

Thanks to a generous grant from the Oshkosh Area Foundation and the Websters Foundation, the library now has a collection of Wonderbooks. "Every Wonderbook is a print book with a ready-to-play audiobook inside. Kids will press play to read along with their favorite books and then switch to learning mode for literacy learning and fun." (playaway.com). We have a total of 12 Wonderbooks and hope to expand the collection over time.

Thanks to all our local donors from the 2021 Chair Affair, the children's area now has a new Nugget for kids to enjoy. A Nugget is a play couch that can also convert into a fort or other builds. We purchased the Toy Story themed colored nugget. Thanks to Stacey Hein who donated her time and talent we also now have an updated, colorful book display. We will display all kinds of picture books along rotating themes in this refreshed book bin. Stacey also added a chalk board side and white board side to the unit so kids can engage their imaginations through art. Stacey also finished the colorful mural now gracing the walls (thank you to Ness Electric for use of your very, very tall ladder). Watch for more updates to the children's area in the future. We have big plans!

Programming counts continue to be healthy. We've been having a growing storytime with four families attending and 11 kids. The partnership we have with the Childrens Hospital Play & Learn will continue until the end of May. They visit the second and fourth Wednesday of the month and we incorporate their programming into our weekly storytime. We had a Bunny Pageant. National Library Week offered fine

forgiveness and refreshments. We are starting a Teen Friends of the Library group. Our book club is growing with 6 patrons attending our last meeting. Adult Craft kits continue to be vastly popular, and the school has also been receiving monthly craft kits for their teacher's group. Upcoming we have the UW-Extension 4-H offering fabulous STEM programming for our 3-7 graders. There will be planting a positive thought garden, building a robotic arm, and an herb garden workshop in May. We also will have an in-person Charcuterie Class for the adults led by Kathy McCarthy of Mill Street Haven Cooking School. And Zoozort will be at Markesan Elementary School on May 25 to kick off/promote for our Summer Reading Program "Oceans of Possibilities".

An important fundraiser is taking place now at our library. The Home & Garden Silent Auction. The handcrafted benches, planters, quilt runners, signs, wine glasses, along with original artists prints/sketches, gift baskets, and cute knickknacks must be seen to be appreciated. Library staff is very impressed by the beautiful and varied items up for silent auction this year. Bids start at \$5 and should be added in increments of \$1. Bids can be taken by phone up until 10am on Sat., May 14. The close of bids is at 11am on Sat. May 14th. All proceeds will go towards our children and teen programs. We are so thankful to our donors and our bidders.

And lastly onto building news, we are moving ahead with a boiler replacement. Our current boiler is approx. 23 years old and we had issues with it over the past few years. Just recently there has been a water leak in the boiler. We are working with city maintenance to complete this project. We may also have a faulty water softener. More than likely our invested donation funds which we use each year to help cover our budget will be utilized. I am also applying for other funding.

now we're working on all of the associated handouts and PR – reading logs, posters, flyers, Facebook events, website calendars, etc. The sturgeon spawned in Princeton, and we passed out educational flyers from the DNR and posters for our Sturgeon Celebration event on the riverbank. Many people were there to see the WI DNR, Georgia Fish & Wildlife, and Tennessee Aquarium catch sturgeon for various science projects. We invited everyone to the library to check out



books on these amazing, giant "dinosaur fish."

Technology

We dealt with a computer issue, backed up files on the staff computers, and worked through a lot of difficulties with our digitization project.

Programs

Our ongoing Easter egg hunt was once again a huge success. Families absolutely love being able to come to the library to hunt eggs no matter what the weather is outside, and they don't mind that not every egg has a prize. Michelle Golz and others donated some candy for this event. Over 30 kids participated.

National Library Week went very well. About two dozen people enjoyed the recycled paper flower crafts, many people got seeds from the Seed Library, and the I Spy display was enjoyed by all. Only a small handful of people took advantage of the Food for Fines drive. Many people simply donated items without asking for any fines to be waived. We sent an SUV full of food and hygiene items for the Green Lake Food Pantry!

Brian Podoll from the Ancestry genealogy and DNA company gave a fascinating talk on the 18th, and the story was reported in the Princeton Times-Republic.

The red oak tree adoption program was a little rough, but every one of the 40 trees found a grateful home.

The knitting club is having so much fun, they want to continue to meet twice per month for the rest of the year, even though winter is over. We've had several donations of yarn and knitting needles.

Staff

We dealt with lots of illness this month- everyone on the team including our cleaning lady and intern, was taken down at one point or another by colds, flu, and Covid-19. Fortunately, everyone is always great about being flexible and covering for each other.

We have been working hard on weeding reports, removing books that have not been checked out in two or more years and have had less than eight checkouts in their lifetime. These will be put on the book sale to make room for new materials.

All staff continue to do the Infosec security training provided by Winnefox.

At the monthly LAC meeting in Markesan, we all agreed to hold another "Penny War" fundraising drive in July. All money collected will belong to the library that collected it. Berlin currently holds the trophy for most money collected.

Friends of the Library

The Friends of the Library met on the 13th. They will be having their annual book sale on Saturday, May 7th (city-wide garage sale weekend). Many donations of like-new items have already come in, and even after switching out our old copies for new ones, there is a lot of great stuff that will be for sale! This includes a lot of DVDs, Bluerays, large print books, and a TON of cookbooks and quilting books. We are having to use the small conference room as storage for book sale items, and even that is getting full.

The Friends is looking to invest more than half of their current savings with the Oshkosh Community Foundation under their own account and asked me to get that process started. The idea is that it will earn more interest that way.

I talked to the Friends about some tentative plans for getting our backyard in shape and requested \$2,000 towards fencing. They gave it to us - thank you! The Friends will also be providing refreshments for our Sturgeon Celebration on May 14th and the Winnefox Library Board tour on May 25th.

Garden / Back Yard Project

On April 13th, I met with a small group to discuss the issues we're having in the back yard, and possible donations we'd need to get it in shape. This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the Human Development & Relationships Institute, as well as the Health & Well-Being Institute in April of 2022. During the reporting period, the educator made 98 direct educational and professional contacts.

Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

Be aMAYzing BINGO, Green Lake County & Marquette County

Since January, I have been serving on a sub-committee of the Community Health Action Team (CHAT) from ThedaCare – Berlin, which been working on a self-care challenge. With the recent pandemic, both Green Lake and Marquette Counties have seen a shift in the need for mental, physical and social health. Recent studies have provided evidence from the earlier stages of the COVID-19 lockdown, showing that

the higher perception of stress, the less self-care activities are adopted, and in turn the lower the beneficial effects on wellbeing. The Berlin Community Health Action Team (CHAT) decided to form a team to format and implement a Self-Care Challenge for the community. This challenge will support healthy habits to impact continued health and well-being in the community. The challenge will run for 4 weeks beginning in May and is called the Be aMAYzing Challenge. Community members in Green Lake and Marquette Counties will have the opportunity to participate in various activities that promote



self-care through medical access, mental health, healthy activities, and generosity. Wellness-specific prizes will be awarded to participants. The Self-Care Challenge project team, which derived from CHAT in Berlin, consists of representatives from Green Lake Public Health Department, Marquette County Health Department, City of Berlin, Town Square (Green Lake), and Green Lake County Extension.

Financial Wellness Workshops, Green Lake County Correctional Facility

At the end of April, I began teaching at GLCCF again. I have seven male inmates who are currently in the process of completing their financial wellness workshops. I taught two separate groups for 1 hour each for the first workshop, Building Credit and Managing Debt. All participants get a certificate of completion for each workshop. The final two workshops will be held in early May.

The Literacy Link, Green Lake County Correctional Facility

In April, I joined The Literacy Link (LL) team which makes GLCCF the 11th facility in WI to participate in this program. Research has shown that children of incarcerated parents are at risk for delayed cognitive



development, lagging literacy comprehension, and social emotional difficulties. The LL project is an approach that builds reading, communicating, and listening abilities with young children in justice-involved families. The emphasis is on building relationships and spontaneous engagement between children and their parents and caregivers through literacy. These relations hips serve as buffers to the elevated stress that justice-involved families experience. The program has worked closely with its county jail partners to remake physical space so environments nurture literacy interactions during jail visits.

LL connects children and parents in justice-involved families:

 to foster healthy family relationships by promoting positive, literacy-focused interactions between children and their justice-involved parents and caregivers • to promote language and literacy skills in children by creating literacy rich experiences in jail and justice settings that extend into the home.

Series facilitator Kayla Oberstadt is the Older Youth Leadership Program Specialist at Ohio 4-H Youth Development and the co-chair of the LGBTQ+ Youth/Community Champion Group within the Access, Equity and Belonging Program Leaders Working Group.
