Two weeks ago, we handed out close to 75 Tiny Art Show kits for anyone wanting to share their creativity. Artwork returned will be on display at the library for the month of December. The response to this Friends of the Library sponsored project has been wonderful. Stop in to view the art show if you are in the neighborhood.

Markesan – Happy Holidays from the Markesan Public Library. During November we helped at the 20th anniversary of Homespun Holidays by collaborating on the KidZone with holiday crafts, button maker and games. We also helped by hosting craft demos and setting up a display table to promote library services. It was a great opportunity to meet new people and to give back to the community at large.

In upcoming news, the library continues to offer book club, storytime, Play 'n Learn, and holiday craft make and takes. This December our big event is Santa Storytime with Santa, games, crafts, treat bags, and joy. Each year we also add a little something special to our decorations- this year it is a lighted Joy Sign out front. Many patrons have commented on how festive and welcoming the library has been looking.

The DVD labeling by genre project is well underway and we hope to get it completed in the next few months. After moving the DVDs from spinners to shelves, we have sorted them into alphabetical order by title. The next step will be to use color coded stickers to indicate major subjects or categories so our patrons can browse by action, family, comedy, drama, etc. We had several requests to change our DVDs for better browsing and hope that people will find this useful and increase circulation of the collection.

One other project will be to get our front lobby waxed. We plan to get it waxed over the new year holiday and are looking forward to a fresh start and shiny/protected floors.

Arthur our Axolotl (which we purchased through penny war funds) has been a hit with all ages in Markesan. The newspaper is planning to write an article about Arthur, and I've had several patrons tell me all kinds of interesting facts about Axolotls. Everyone is excited and doing their research. We've ordered several books on Axolotls and can't wait to schedule a program about the species.

Here are some facts about Arthur. "Axolotl is a species of salamander with a very unique genetic makeup. Due to a rare condition called 'neoteny', they retain most of their larval features into adulthood, so they have all the features of a tadpole – from feathery gills to a long, quill-like dorsal fin – even when they're fully mature.



Axolotls are carnivores, surviving on a diet of worms, insects, crustaceans, molluscs and some small species of fish. Until recent decades, they were at the top of the food chain within their distribution habitat, but today invasive species of perch and tilapia pose a threat and have contributed to a decline in their numbers.

Commonly mistaken for fish, axolotls are unique among the amphibian family in that they spend their entire lives in water. Indeed, axolotls are sometimes known as Mexican walking fish, on account of their appearance and adopted habitat." (bluereefaquarium.com.uk).

Princeton – We are very excited to officially announced the completion of our historic newspaper digitization project this month. Newspaper scans dating from the mid 1800s to 1993 are now searchable online! **Anyone can now go to https://archives.winnefox.org to search over 100 years of Princeton's headlines.**

Princeton had six newspapers over the years. The digitized scans include editions from:


- Green Lake County Democrat 1879-1885
- Princeton Republic 1867-1937
- Princeton Republic-Star 1905-1906
- Princeton Star 1902-1905
- Princeton Times 1935-1937
- Princeton Times-Republic 1937-1993

Users can search all of these at once, or only one, or whichever they choose. The newspapers can be easily searched by name, keyword, and date (or date range). A short instructional presentation about how to use the database will be given at the Princeton Public Library on Monday, December 12th at 1pm and again at 6pm. Attendees will be shown the best methods for searching, quirks of searching including OCI errors, and interesting articles and headlines.

To celebrate this achievement, anyone who wishes can request a free photocopy of a historic front page of the Princeton newspaper published on their birthday (or the closest date to it). Please contact the Princeton Public Library at ptplstaff@princetonpublib.org or 920-295-6777 to request your printout.

This project took over a year to complete, and cost about seventeen thousand dollars. 98,563 individual microfilm images had to be scanned, cleaned up, coded, uploaded to a library system server, and made searchable. This process involved the technical efforts of the Princeton Public Library staff, the Crowley Company of Frederick, Maryland, NMT Partners of Onalaska, Wisconsin, DC Johnson of Ripon, Wisconsin,

and Keetra Baker of the Winnefox Library System. The digitization was made possible with contributions from the Princeton Historical Society, the Princeton Public Library, the Caestecker (Green Lake) Library's Tom Gnewuch Memorial Fund, the Wisconsin Humanities Endowment, and the Winnefox Library System.



On Nov. 2nd, NABCO fixed our front door.

On Nov. 8th, we had a staff meeting, and discussed schedules, cataloging issues, and tasks for the next month.

On Nov. 8th I attended the Green Lake County Ag & Extension Subcommittee meeting to give the monthly report for all libraries in the county.

On Nov. 9th, the Friends of the Library met. We had about a dozen people attend, including a new member, Rayna, and the CEO of the nonprofit Oshkosh Area Community Foundation. The Friends voted unanimously to start an endowment fund with the OACF, using a recent \$10,000 donation and money from fundraisers they have saved up over the years. Christmas in Princeton plans were made.

On Nov. 17th, I went to Costco and bought the four folding tables that the Friends agreed to pay for, as well as cups, snacks, and other supplies for programs.

We were closed on November 23rd and 24th for Thanksgiving, and were open late on the 25th for Christmas in Princeton.

This month staff worked hard on our digitization service, but did not complete everyone's tapes before we had to send the kit on to the next library. Because this is such a popular service, I have purchased our own equipment so that we can keep it here from now on.

We hosted the Princeton Women's Club drive for Christine Ann (women's domestic abuse center), the Princeton Historical Society's Christmas centerpiece raffle and holiday card sale, and the Angel Tree for underprivileged children (a collaboration between Green Lake County Social Services and the Salvation Army). As usual, we are also a GLC Food Pantry donation location.

The monthly Green Lake County librarians meeting was held on the 10th at Markesan library. We discussed the topics of censorship, budgets, and next year's County Read project, which will feature two books and at least two motivational speakers.

Successful programs this month included Knitting Club, Story Time, our holiday movie, snacks, and crafts for families, and the Friends of the Library Children's Book Giveaway. Over 400 people came into the library on November 25th for these events! We decorated the library with penguins and the Friends marched in the Holiday Lights Parade as penguins, handing out candy, bookmarks, and other treats

This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the Human Development & Relationships Institute, as well as the Health & Well-Being Institute in November of 2022. During the reporting period, the educator made 102 direct educational and professional contacts.

Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

Planning AHEAD – In partnership with Waushara County Extension at the Berlin Library
Planning AHEAD is a series of 6 sessions for adults of all ages. Participants learn about advanced

directives, handling financial changes, estate planning, and arriving at decisions for the end of life. The program's goal is to help participants understand how to prepare for the end of life for themselves or a loved one, and why it's important to have a plan in place. Following the series, 100% of participants strongly agreed that they have greater knowledge of advance medical and legal directives, estate planning, choices in end-of-life care, final wishes, and understanding grief. Also, 100% of the participants said that they felt more confident in having conversations with loved ones related to end-of-life wishes and knowing where to find reliable resources for more information on end-of-life planning. All participants indicated that in the next three months they will update their end-of-life planning forms, encourage someone else to do end-of-life planning, and make end-of-life wishes known. Participants reported the following comments regarding this program: "Glad I participated!" and "Great class! I am so thankful to have taken it. It truly helped me in so many ways. Thank you for offering it. It made my outlook on death more positive."



Healthy Choices Program – Boys & Girls Club of the Tri-County Area, Berlin I taught 6 60-minute sessions of a program on making healthy choices including nutrition, physical activity, mental health, and sleep to the youth at the Boys & Girls Club. During this program over 120 students in grades kindergarten through 8th grade were reached. I am working with the Club to plan some programming during the Berlin School District spring break week. We are also looking at bringing back the parent workshops that we partnered to offer prior to Covid.



Planning for College & Paying for College Workshops – Green Lake County & Marquette County I am working with the Human Development & Relationships Educator in Marquette County to offer a two-part workshop for high school parents and students. The first workshop will focus on the readiness aspect – academics, options for post-secondary education, options for not pursuing post-secondary education, and planning for what's next. The second workshop will focus on the financial aspect – costs of college options, scholarships and financial assistance (FAFSA application and deadlines), saving and budgeting, and what other important paperwork do you need to have prepared. We are hoping to teach this program this spring at local schools and/or virtually.
