Berlin – This month we will be celebrating our 120th Anniversary of our Carnegie Library during National Library Week. The celebration will take place on Saturday, April 22 from 1-3pm, with a ceremony at 1:30. Refreshments and hors' d'oeuvres popular in the early 1900's will be served.

It is quite an honor to have served the community's needs for so many wonderful years. Being the only Carnegie Library left in the Winnefox Library System and one of 22 left in the State of Wisconsin is also something very special to celebrate! We have displays in the library showcasing some of the historical items from the 1903 Carnegie Library. If you are in the area, please stop in to celebrate with us.

Another exciting event this month is the Green Lake County Reads program, which will be on Saturday, April 15 at 10am. This year's event will be held at the Caestecker Library. Our County Reads theme is kindness in the community and our keynote speaker, Krista Sobieski founder of Unimaginable Hope, is a perfect for this theme. Please join us to celebrate kindness with refreshments and good company.

Kids have plenty of fun things to do at the Berlin Library this month. We have an Easter Egg Scavenger Hunt, Life-size Board Game Day, and a few drop-in craft events.

Adults can sign up for a Charcuterie Class, craft night, and our knitting group. In honor of Money Smart Week, we have a program titled, Passing It On or Passing the Buck scheduled for Tuesday, April 18 at 10am.

Several other projects are taking place as well. Our roof was replaced with a portion coming from ARPA funds and our building fund. We have a group of volunteers helping create our Monarch Library Garden, which is showing signs of life already! And an exciting outside project that will be unveiled soon!

We never know what is around the corner or what the future holds, but one thing is for certain, the library will always provide services to meet the changing needs to better serve the community.

Green Lake Caestecker – A sweet story from Margie Roti Roti, assistant director of the Caestecker Public Library and Storytime champion:

"I read books to kids.... at the library and at our local school. This story is from last week's visit to our 4K classroom:

I start my class visits with some little quips about why books are important. Last weeks was the song "How do I know? I read it in a book." And I briefly taught the kids the chorus. Then we read the book *Say Hello Like This* by Mary Murphy which showcases how different animals greet each other. When we got to the beetle saying hello, I said I was surprised because I thought they'd communicate their tap tap with their feet (they have so many), but it was their antennae instead! So now I asked the children, "how do I know?" And the classroom shouted. "I read it in a book!"

One of the 4K children is deaf (she has an interpreter, amplification system, and the teacher uses sign language a lot with the whole class). But I don't know sign language, so I wear the microphone that runs through the amplification system, and she bears with my verbal stories. Thursday, she recognized when we were ending storytime, (I always end the class with the song Read a Book with Me) and she spontaneously led the song while vocalizing with sign for the whole class. It was a tear-up moment for me. So proud of her!"

Margie weekly reads to almost 100 children at the Green Lake school from 4K-3rd grade. She also leads our Storytime at the library by the boat in the children's room, which has been averaging 34 attendees in the past month (our highest storytime on record is 45 people in July of last year). The power of stories to teach, inspire, a build community is alive and growing with Margie's efforts!

In other service updates at the library, movie nights are now even easier because of your Caestecker Public Library card! You can now watch free streaming movies with Kanopy, the best video streaming service for quality, thoughtful entertainment for free! With an expertly curated collection of favorite, easy watching, and documentary films we think you'll enjoy, we're pleased to bring this streaming service to our community. Go to our website to get started today or download the Kanopy app to stream on your phone, tablet, or TV. Have your library card and pin number handy for logging in.

There are plenty of events scheduled this month that can be found at greenlakelibrary.org or on our Facebook page. The library will close at 1 pm on Friday, April 7 and be closed Sunday, April 9 for the Easter holiday. We will be open regular hours on Saturday from 9 am-1 pm. New materials are hitting the shelves every day and with access to apps like Kanopy, Hoopla, Libby, and Mango for digital materials there are options to keep you entertained and educated all year long no matter if our doors are open or closed, or from your couch to any vacation destination in the world.

Kingston Mill Pond – April is a super busy month for our library. Wednesday, April 5th starts our 6-week program "Planning Ahead for the End of this Life" which is being done in partnership with Green Lake County Extension. Topics covered will be handling financial changes, advance medical and legal directives, estate planning, choices in end-of-life care, final wishes, and understanding grief. This is a great program to help folks plan for the end of life to make things easier for family members.

Thursday, April 13th we'll be doing a children's program for Money Smart Wisconsin week. Money Smart Wisconsin is a statewide awareness and educational campaign held in partnership with the Governor's Council on Financial Literacy and Capability. Story hour is every Thursday at 4:30pm and all ages are welcome.

We are also in the middle of our County-wide Read with the final program happening on Saturday, April 15th. The books that were picked for this Read are "The Five Wishes of Mr. Murray McBride" by Joe Siple and "A Drop of Hope" by Keith Calabrease. Both books remind us of the kindness we are all capable of. All five Green Lake County libraries have multiple copies of the titles available so stop in and check one out. Then join us on April 15th at 10am to hear Krista Sobieski, founder of Unimaginable Hope, a Berlin based non-profit focused on bringing random acts of kindness to life. The program is sponsored by the 5 Green Lake County libraries and is being held at The Caestecker Library in Green Lake. Refreshments will follow the program, along with copies of the books being raffled off.

Monday, April 17th starts a two-week silent auction for our "Spring Has Sprung" fundraiser. As of this writing there are 50 items to be bid on, with more coming in daily. There are some unique things this year. A set of 112 Louis L'Amour books is item #25, missing only the title "Last of the Breed" or this would be a complete collection of his works. Item #33 is a basket with everything you need to raise chicks, including a coupon for 4 to 6 live chicks that will be hatching around April 22nd. We are also helping promote the Let's Get Growing food pantry contest. We have set up a display with seeds and the registration forms that people can take. And we've been collecting lots of community health surveys for the Dept. of Health and Human Services department which will end on April 11th.

If you'd like to learn how to play bridge, the bridge club meets the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month at 1pm and is always looking for new players. And our Loosely Bound book club will be reading Lost City of the Monkey God by Douglas Preston this month and will meet to discuss it on Tuesday, April 25th at 2pm.

Markesan – With the arrival of Spring and a little warmer temperatures, we have seen an increase in patrons at our library. For this we are thankful.

All the various programs we had in March were a success. The children who attended the Marshmallow Rocket Program given by Morgan Martinez (Green Lake County 4-H Coordinator) were very happy with the rockets they constructed. Our Bunny Pageant brought in 21 decorated bunny entries. The library had many people coming in to look at the bunnies and vote. Danielle Boerson provided very good information and help at the Seed and Garden Program. Now we are ready to disperse the seeds that were ordered for the "Seed Share Program" to our patrons.

Students and teachers from Faith Lutheran School outside of Markesan came to tour the library on March 28. They then searched for books to help them with reports they were working on. It was nice to see so many children exploring all the library has to offer.

With April comes National Library week. The Markesan Library staff is busy planning various activities for the week. The Tuesday of that week is National Library Workers Day. It is a day to recognize the valuable contributions made by all library workers. As the Acting Director at the Markesan Library, I know I am very

thankful for the wonderful staff that works here. All are very pleasant to work with, enjoy the people contact with patrons and are very dedicated to making the library a success.

The 7th Annual Garden/Home Art auction will be coming up in May so we are actively seeking donations for this fund raiser. It has been successful in the past in raising funds needed for the children and adult programming at the library. The library is grateful to anyone who would like to contribute to this.

Nancy Stellmacher – Acting Director

Princeton – This month, all Winnefox system libraries got a new free movie streaming service, Kanopy. Patrons need to create an account to use Kanopy with their library cards.

Successful programs this month included our Dr. Seuss birthday party, Spring Break Crafternoons, Incubation Station, Smartphone Basics, and Planning Ahead for the End of Life. We still have our Incubation Station up and running, with egg candling on March 29th and hatching due to happen during the week before Easter. All 24 eggs had candy bets within two weeks, so we know families like this event and are participating. This month we also hosted an election training webinar, Bill's birthday, and Friends of the Library meeting.

At their meeting on March 8th, the Friends of the Library voted to give us \$1,000 for five cedar planters for the front of the library and \$250 for flowers. They also agreed to pay \$250 for patriotic decorations for Princeton's 175th celebration and \$450 for a summer reading program performer (Dino Dimensions).

The Friends will hold a book sale on Friday April 28th & Saturday April 29th during open hours. They are seeking donations of items for this sale and running a \$5/bag sale to clear out old inventory. The Friends and other volunteers will gather to work on our backyard project on May 19th and June 10th. The next Friends meeting will be May 10th at 5:30pm.

On March 21st, DRS Sound installed our new hearing loops at the front desk at in the presentation area (teen section). These devices will help anyone with a T-coil equipped hearing aid hear much more clearly.

All library directors attended the WALS meeting on the 21st. We discussed tech issues, cataloging, and standardizing labels, data entry and cataloging records, especially graphic novels. On Saturday March 25th, I closed the library due to the snowstorm. The late morning snow was thick, and plows did not come through until 11am.

Also in March:

- We just announced our May Day Tree Giveaway, sponsored by the Friends of the Library. 150 trees (white pine, red oak, and silver maple) will be available for adoption on May 1st.
- The front flower bed got bedazzled with Easter Eggs
- Preparations for our April 22nd Sturgeon Celebration are ramping up! The Chamber is donating a ton
 of prizes this year, many of them cash (Chamber Bucks)
- Lots of people are checking out puzzles
- We announced our Ugly Sturgeon Contest and Sturgeon Celebration!



Morgan Martinez Green Lake County 4-H Program Educator March 2023

This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the 4-H Program in March 2023.

Program Highlights

4-H Leaders' Association

Organized at the county level, the 4-H Leaders' Association works closely with the 4-H Program Educator. The group brings together volunteers to serve as a venue for volunteer leader training and an organizing mechanism in providing volunteer and financial support for county level educational opportunities for 4-H members and 4-H volunteers. At their March 2, 2023 meeting I provided education on the topics of 4-H summer camp and upcoming 4-H educational county and state opportunities.

Dalton Doers 4-H Club Visit

I attended the March 12, 2023 Dalton Doers 4-H Club meeting and served as one of the foods evaluator for their baking challenge. Throughout the afternoon I provided direct and written feedback to youth regarding their baked items while asking them reflections questions about their project and questions to spark exploration for future baking.



Five-County 4-H Summer Camp

I met with 4-H Educators in Area 14 (Adams, Green Lake, Juneau, Marquette, Waushara counties) to continue planning overnight 4-H summer camp June 11-14, 2023 at Camp Lakotah in Wautoma. During this meeting we reviewed camp counselor applications, camp chaperone applications, and began planning the educational and interactive camp sessions as well as camp counselor training session. 4-H Camp is for youth in grades 3-8 as campers and youth in grades 9-13 to serve as camp counselors.

Marshmallow Rocket Program

I facilitated this program on the following dates and locations:

- March 15, 2023- Markesan Public Library; 8 youth participants
- March 21, 2023- Berlin Public Library; 2 youth participants
- March 28, 2023- Caestecker Public Library; 5 youth participants Utilizing curriculum from National 4-H Council, Marshmallow Rockets program was designed for youth in grades 5K through 4th grade as an introduction to the basics of rockets, astronauts, and space exploration and included building a rocket out of marshmallows.



After participation in this workshop:

100% of participants can name the three parts of a rocket (fins, body tube, nose cone); 71% of participants can share what a rocket is used for; 100% can share with others how to build an edible rocket; and 71% shared this program helped them explore something new.

4-H Cooking & Healthy Living Program

On March 28 2023, seven youth in grades 3-6 participated in this program utilizing the 4-H Cooking 101 Curriculum to learn the basics of cooking skills, following a recipe, and exploring healthy eating. Youth worked in groups to explore the MyPlate, handling and cutting fruit, following a recipe to make a magical fruit salad, and most importantly tasting and reflecting upon what they made.

After participating in this workshop:

- 86% of participants shared they wanted to learn more about cooking and healthy living
- 71% of participants shared they will be able to take the information learned and feel confident to do it at home or in their 4-H Club
- 86% of participants felt they played an important role in their group
- 71% of participants indicated they strengthened their cooking & healthy living skills or knowledge

Networking within Extension and Professional Development Opportunities

Identifying and Welcoming New Volunteers Professional Development

On March 22 I participated in a professional development opportunity through University of Minnesota Extension focused on identifying and welcoming new volunteers within the 4-H Program. 4-H relies on volunteers to deliver quality programming that helps youth participants thrive. New research in volunteerism indicates that while the intention to volunteer is higher than ever, current and prospective volunteers are also experiencing record-high stress.
