Berlin Library December 2023 Report

Happy New Year everyone!

The Berlin Library is starting off the new year with a Winter Reading Challenge, which we are calling Leap Into Read, in honor of Leap Year! Our challenge will be for each participant to read 1000 minutes by February 29. Friends of the Library is sponsoring prizes, which will be gift certificates to local businesses. We are working on special programming to coincide with the reading program, so watch for more fun events to be added soon.

Dungeons & Dragons is returning to the library. One of our staff is a Dragon Master and is going to be leading this strategic program. For game lovers in our area, we are sponsoring an adult game night and a family game night in January. This has been popular during the winter months, so we decided to bring it back.

Youth programming in January includes a DIY take home STEAM kit to make Frost in a Can, sn after-school craft to make fake snow and Tiny Tots stories and songs for littles and storytime for pre-school age. For a special winter program, we are creating an indoor ice skating rink. But not worries, we will not be flooding the library. The kids will be skating on shaving cream! Yes, it might get a little messy, but we will be prepared. It should be a fun activity to wear off some energy. Another favorite programming making a comeback is a Stuffed Animal Sleepover and PJ Storytime. Children under 10 can participate in this fun adventure.

Our digitizing project is underway, with the microfilm having been sent out to get digitized. Once it is complete, the final details can be completed. Luckily, we have a temporary DVR employee who will be helping us with this time intensive part of the project.

Looking ahead to 2024, our staff is focusing on the needs of the Berlin community.

As I start to compile information for the library's annual report, I have a statistics snapshot to share:

- Our physical circulation of library materials was up 2% from 2022. The actual numbers are 37,332 in 2022 and 37,996 in 2023.
- Our digital circulation, specifically from Overdrive, skyrocketed over 15% from 2022 (7,973 checkouts) to 2023 (9,185).

While there are many other uses for library space and activities not recorded in such hard numbers, the above stats are two exciting indicators that our local community uses and enjoys our library services, many daily. Those numbers also tell us that while our community still enjoys physical materials options, digital services are continuing to be a quickly growing category.

For the new year we have some new program offerings in addition to our regular lineup. At the request of a few locals, and since it was always our favorite when we were students, join us by the fireplace for silent reading hour at the Silent Readers Book Club on January 17th. Here's what to expect: 2:00-2:30pm Get settled & say hello to fellow silent readers, snacks welcome, 2:30-3:30pm Silent reading hour, 3:30-4:00pm Optional socializing to wrap up.

To help with new Christmas presents or lingering issues with personal devices, we're offering Technology Help Sessions from 10-11am on Fridays in January. Classes are drop in, free, and open to all.

Programs:

Our card making events saw our normal dedicated attendees which we are hoping to build up with Crafternoon events in the next year. We are hoping that the library will be a place to get out of the house and have socializing time without having to brave the elements too much in the Winter months.

Our Santa Storytime event on Dec. 7th had 23 children and adults in attendance with special thanks to the National Honor Society, Officer Galkowski, Jill Worden, and Pamela Werth for volunteering with the event.

Author Chad Lewis joined us virtually for "Legends and Lore of Winter" which drew in 12 live attendees though there were likely more due to families sharing a computer. The recording will be made available on our website for anyone to view it. His presentation was very funny and many of our patrons enjoyed it immensely saying they were planning to rewatch it with more family members.

Collection Updating:

We have begun to expand our Library of Things by adding experience passes for the Milwaukee County Zoo, the Children's Museum of Fond Du Lac, and the Wisconsin Historical Society. These experience passes come with additional benefits to their respective venues such as reciprocal memberships and discounts at the gift shop and/or ticketed events.

Additionally, we have added more board and cards games to our collection which patrons have enjoyed playing both in the library and taking home to play with their families. These have been a big hit especially with the holidays on top of being something new that Markesan has not offered before. Programs

We were very pleased to host a local author's very first book signing! Savannah Whitemarsh-Hoffmann did a reading of her new juvenile fiction novel, "The Timebound Twins" on Sat. Dec. 16th. Unfortunately, I had Covid this week and missed it! Other successful programs this month included Mystery Book Club and our Winter Break Crafternoons.

Thank-Yous

On December 9th, the Friends of the Library held its annual Cookie Walk fundraiser. They raised over \$1,300! Many thanks to all who donated or shopped. This month we also owe thanks to:

- All those who donated items for the Green Lake County & Salvation Army Angel Tree Program, which provides gifts for kids in need. The angels of our community contributed three large totes worth of presents!
- Renard's European Bakeshop, which donated a lovely box of goodies and a \$500 check!

- Mrs. Burdick and the school student choir. They sang some wonderful carols for us on Thursday Dec. 21st. We treated the kids to cookies and candy canes before they went off to sing to the residents of Martha's Assisted Living. Good job, kids!



Meetings

On December 5th, all Winnefox librarians met at Oshkosh to discuss major changes to our ILS (computer system). Part of the changes are changes to item records to our current system, which mean we will have to re-catalog most of our puzzles, games, and kits. These will soon be searchable under "Library of Things." We will also be re-cataloging many books, as Winnefox staff told us that using volume numbers isn't working. We also got a new feature in the catalog, the ability to make items "lost" instead of "missing." This should help clear up some of the difficulties we've been having. Finally, we got a preview of what it will look like when we change from our current software (Workflows) to BlueCloud. There is no current timeline on this, but we hope it will be a better system.

On Dec. 19th, I attended a brief City Council meeting.

2023 In Review

I have created a short (three minute) video with photos from the past year. It is available to watch on Facebook, on YouTube, and on our email newsletter. Here are some of our major accomplishments from 2023:

- We wrote a successful grant to install a Hearing Loop for the hearing impaired at our front desk and in our presentation area.
- The Friends of the Library held several successful fundraisers, including a book sale, flea market food booth, and cookie walk.
- The Friends of the Library bought us big, locally-made planters for the front of our building, and petunias to put in them.
- We hatched chickens in the library for the first time, kicking off a series of EGGcellent programs, including "Backyard Chickens."
- We received Princeton Chamber of Commerce sponsorship for our new Sturgeon Celebration event, which drew great crowds and was featured on WLUK-TV FOX 11 (click HERE to watch).
- We helped Princeton celebrate its 175th birthday with a big historic photo display, decorating materials and treats and face painting for the children's parade, and facepainting and treats and lots of games for the Kids Zone.
- We began hosting WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) mobile services for the first time.
- We began hosting Alcoholics Anonymous meetings for the first time.
- We wrote a successful grant to Webster's Marketplace and expanded our Summer Reading Program to include adults as well as kids.
- People can now check out puzzles and boardgames here.
- We introduced a new streaming video service, Kanopy.
- We started new annual traditions: a Halloween Party and an Art & Craft Supply Swap.
- We worked with the Princeton Women's Club, Green Lake County, the 175th Committee, Princeton Senior Center, and other community organizations to help people in need, including Christine Anne Women's Shelter, Martha's Assisted Living, the Green Lake County Food Pantry, and others.



Natasha Paris Regional Crops Educator Adams, Green Lake, Marquette, Waushara

- A meeting for farmers and collaborators participating in the Nitrogen Optimization Pilot Program in which farmers shared progress and insights from the first year of on-farm research. The purpose of this effort was to provide opportunities for feedback and collaboration on the program for participants as they partake in large on-farm research projects to improve nitrogen use and protect water quality.
- A meeting of the Tri County Produce Growers Cooperative in which I shared information as a wrap up of the 2023 growing season and provided insights into things to watch for entering 2024, as well as provided materials on how to access professional development opportunities in the winter of 2024. The purpose of this effort was to reach Amish farmers who do not have access to online resources and are unaware of events that are happening unless they are physically distributed to them, these events and this interaction serves to improve the skills and knowledge of the Amish produce growing community.
- Planning for the Wisconsin Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Conference, which hosts around 800 stakeholders that come from the state of Wisconsin and neighboring states to hear about very diverse topics. The Division of Extension helps plan the conference and the programming for the fruit and vegetable tracks. The purpose of this effort is to assist growers of specialty crops improve their practices for sustainability and profitability.
- Participation in the advisory panel of a local producer-led watershed group for farmers, conservationists and community members of the Roche-a-Cri watershed, by assisting with planning and facilitating activities geared toward increasing the awareness and adoption of conservation and ultimately water quality of the Roche-a-Cri and Wisconsin River watersheds.

O Green Lake has partnered with the other counties in Area 14 (all under Pat) to host a summer camp. We met last Friday over zoom to discuss a theme and we decided on "Let the SPARKS Begin" for our theme which is center around the Olympics. I will be working on drafting an ultimate goal for our summer camp that we can use to show families of why they should send their kids to camp. Some upcoming events around camp involve counselor training/ planning and an information session for participants ahead of camp.

Ambassador Programming

I am working with the Ambassadors to host a Super Saturday which provides multiple spark opportunities for youth to try new experiences. The goal here is to have a variety of new activities for youth to spark a new interest. This also allows for youth to have an opportunity to practice presentation and leadership skills as they have the ability to lead sessions on their sparks. This also allows for building youth-adult relationships that are key to youth development by allowing youth to learn from community adults sharing their sparks.

Partnerships:

- Met with the Boys and Girls Club to discuss partnerships for Green Lake and Berlin Sites. There is interest in any kind of programming from one off to a series of events. This is a great partnership because they can provide some facilities and access to more people to get involved in 4-H that might not otherwise be.
