WHEREAS, LWCDs assist Wisconsin's farmers in many ways, including supporting producer-led watershed groups, developing nutrient management plans, engineering manure storage and transfer systems, and applying conservation practices that promote soil health and build profitability; and,

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WHEREAS, the shared conservation work of LWCD professionals and landowners has major water quality benefits, including preventing soil erosion, protecting drinking water supply, increasing rainwater infiltration into groundwater aquifers, and restoring native habitat; and,

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WHEREAS, LWCD experts are trusted, technical advisors that consult with landowners to understand their land management goals and then propose customized solutions that includes project planning and contracting, engineering, quality control, and securing of cost-share funding to reduce project expenses to; and,

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WHEREAS, building a partnership based on trust and understanding with farmer and landowner clients cannot happen instantly, but rather, requires a sustained commitment over time from LWCD professionals; and,

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WHEREAS, LWCDs leverage cost-share funding from federal and private sources, providing a 2:1 return on the state investment, and spurring local economic growth in industries including agriculture, construction, tourism, forestry, and recreation; and,

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WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin codifies LWCDs' role in carrying out state conservation standards via Wis. Stats Chap. 92, defining a goal that the State fund staff positions in every LWCD at 100% of the first, 70% of the second, and 50% of each additional staff position; and,

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WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has not ensured baseline support of LWCDs by meeting this funding goal since its inception, and in the 18-year period from 2006 to 2024, base funding relative to LWCD staffing needs decreased by 24%.

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WHEREAS, supporting county LWCDs is a widely supported priority supported by conservation, environmental and local government groups alike; and,

Positive Youth Development Brandon Springer, 4-H Youth Development Educator, brandon.springer@wisc.edu

An activity (Green Lake County 4-H Ambassadors Meetings) for youth in grades 6 and up, where youth made goals for programs they would like to host/participate in at the county level. The goal is for youth to develop leadership skills including organizing, planning, and goal setting/management, and more. This allows youth to practice these leadership skills that are important throughout their life through school and their careers. Total Reach: 4 youth, 3 adult volunteers. (Brandon Springer)

An activity (**Scaling Up a New Project**) for youth grades 3-13 to learn about building scale models to for youth to explore a new spark and build skills in patience, organizing/planning, and problem solving which will support youth to thrive as they become adults. (**Brandon Springer**)

An event (**Super Saturday**) for youth grades K-13, where they can sign up for multiple sessions to learn a new skills/project. The goal is for youth to have a chance to explore new sparks and to encourage them to continue learning, so that they have skills including independence and willingness to try new things. Total Reach: 9 survey respondents (**Brandon Springer**)

A program (Snow Day at the Library) for youth in collaboration with the Berlin Library. The goal was to teach youth how snow is made and the impact of deicing salt on the environment so that youth can build an understanding of winter weather and how to reduce their impact on the environment. We also enjoyed making a frozen treat to help demonstrate how salt works on ice and a crat snowstorm in a jar to help visualize the snow. Total Reach: This program reached 10 youth total with 6 participants non-4-H members. (Brandon Springer)

Planning for an in-person overnight experience (4-H Summer Camp) for youth in collaboration with Area 14 Positive Youth Development Educators. The goal is to provide leadership opportunities for high school aged youth and exploratory opportunity for young members as they learn new skills that relate to archery, team building, swimming and canoeing in hope that they will discover a new spark and share new skills when returning to their county. Pesticide Applicator Training: April 11th, 2025, Waushara County Government Center Starting at 9am

Beef 101 -- Six-part virtual series for individuals new to beef production or dairy producers transitioning to beef production. Participants learned about various aspects of beef enterprises, including marketing strategies, cattle health, nutrition and reproduction, and cattle enterprises. The goal of this series is to enhance the economic sustainability of emerging beef producers. 100 registered attendees.

A series of **phone calls and farm visits** in Adams, Green Lake, and Waushara counties to address concerns brought up by livestock producers. This effort is to design to assist livestock producers in providing research-based information for their use to help improve and maintain economic viability for their operation. Total Reach: 14

A workshop was held for beef producers to meet their need for obtaining their **Beef Quality Assurance (BQA)** certification that maintains their economic viability. Lomira—28 farms BQA certified and Manchester—8 farms BQA certified (**Adam Hartfiel**, Bill Halfman)

Livestock educators write **articles for beef producers** on best management practices and current research in livestock systems. These articles keep livestock producers up to date with local and regional livestock news, market trends, and production ideas to help increase the economic viability of producers. An activity, writing quarterly articles for beef producers about best management practices and current research. Building a More Resilient Cow Herd Webinar: Hosted by National Cattlemen's Beef Association

Natasha Paris, Regional Crops Educator — Adams, Green Lake, Marquette and Waushara Counties

The **Processing Crops Meeting** -- a meeting for farmers and agronomists where participants learn about recent developments in management of processing vegetables such as sweet corn and snap beans. Through this effort participants are equipped to use new tools and make better decisions for profitability and sustainability. Total Reach: 30 agronomists and farmers (Natasha Paris, Abby Augarten, Amanda Gevens, Mallika Nocco, Russell Groves, Steven Hall, Yi Wang). The processing crops industry is a niche within Wisconsin agriculture that is unlike commodity grain production as it is a fresh product that has very specific parameters for growth and harvest and working with processors to fill contracts. This event is held annually and is well attended by agronomists from the processing companies, input suppliers, and seed companies in addition to farmers. Of those who responded to the evaluation, 87% percent of all responses to the talks agreed that they learned something. The respondents indicated that they found specific value in learning about the Wisconsin Irrigation Scheduling Planner, the potential threat of Aster Yellows Phytoplasma, and management options for tar spot in sweet corn. These responses indicate that attendees will use what they learned to make more informed decisions to benefit financial and environmental sustainability in large scale vegetable production in Wisconsin.

Nutrient Management training sessions were conducted across the region for farmers, where participants learn about fertilizer and manure management and how to create a nutrient plan for their farm. Through this effort farmers are empowered to make decisions about their cropping systems that protect both the environment and farm finances. (Natasha Paris, Daniel Marzu, Jordan Kampa)

A special program at the Wisconsin Potato & Vegetable Growers Association Conference for college students to learn about the specialty crops industry in Wisconsin and their efforts to be sustainable. Through this effort students will have exposure to the breadth of careers and the science of sustainability available in the potato and vegetable industry. (Natasha Paris)

A series of **calls and farm visits** to assist farmers with their production questions, troubleshoot problems, or explore cropping options. Through these calls and visits farmers throughout the region are able to make better decisions for their financial and natural resource management. (**Natasha Paris**)

A series of **Pesticide Application Trainings** which included testing sessions for farmers so they may obtain their Private Applicator License. The purpose of this effort is so that farmers may apply pesticides to their crops safely for the safety of both farmers, the food supply, the environment, and the community. (**Natasha Paris**)

The Wisconsin Agriculture Climate Outlook -- a weekly report on weather and climate conditions for farmers and agribusiness professionals, which supplies readers with relevant information to make data-driven decisions about crop and livestock management. The purpose of this effort is to assist farmers and agriculture professionals with understanding our weather patterns, climatic conditions, and their relationship to agriculture so they can make decisions that protect the financial and natural resources of Wisconsin agricultural systems. Total Reach: Weekly reports with an average of 100 web hits each, plus distribution to a Plain faith community center. (Natasha Paris)

A series of newspaper articles for farmers and agricultural professionals on timely topics in crops to improve sustainability and profitability in agricultural systems. (Natasha Paris)

The **Growing Wisconsin Conference** for specialty crops growers featuring Extension-led sessions for vegetable, berry, grape, and apple growers, where participants

learned about management of these crops to improve their profitability and sustainability. Total Reach: 683 conference attendees (**Natasha Paris**, Amanda Gevens, Amaya Atucha, David Drake, Jed Colquhoun, Leslie Holland, Russell Groves, Yi Wang)

Working with several farmers in multiple counties on refining ideas and applying for **Nitrogen Optimization Pilot Program Grants**. If awarded, these projects will significantly contribute to answering questions related to nitrogen management in crop production to increase sustainability and profitability. Total Reach: 5 farms (**Natasha Paris**)

A facilitated discussion for Farmers of the Roche-A-Cri, a producer-led watershed protection group, and UW-Madison and UW-Extension Researchers where participants discussed current and future research in vegetable and potato production systems. The goal of this effort was for participants to identify current research, discuss gaps or support needed for on farm research, and collaborate on new and innovative practices to protect and improve water quality. This discussion provided an opportunity for producer-led group members to connect with researchers and identify potential projects and support for farm
